COMPUTER WORKSHOP - Bakersfield College and the League for Innovation have received a \$117,000 grant from the National Science Foundation to conduct a four-week workshop on instructional computing in the community college. The project is designed for full-time League community college faculty in physical sciences, life sciences, engineering, mathematics and social sciences. No previous background in computer use is required. The workshop, scheduled for June 15-July 10, 1981, will instruct participants in assessment and adaptation of computer programs for their own instructional use, and development of their own CAI materials. Participants will be paid a stipend and receive partial living and travel expenses. Application deadline is Dec. 15. 

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

"I must express my objection to the paragraph in the Daily of Oct. 2 relating to the level of participation of the staff in in-service.


The implication was that inservice only occurs in workshops provided by staff development, and that if one does not attend those, one is not committed to Lane Community College. In my own department, staff were working very hard: some attended workshops; some trained others to teach a new class; and others held dept. meetings. No one was showing signs of not being committed to LCC.

The circulation of that Daily to the general public could be quite destructive to the image of LCC, and in my opinion, is quite misleading in its description of the general level of activity happening here.

Please keep in mind that the workshops were advertised as voluntary, and therefore you must accept the fact that some do not volunteer."

DEAN RASMUSSEN RESPONDS - "Since the Daily chose to ask a question, "Did you get your money's worth?", I assume it wanted an answer. In any case, many department heads expressed agreement with Ron Mitchell's answer to that question and requested that I respond to the Daily on their behalf. The answer is yes! There was a great deal of useful and exciting staff development work that occurred within departments and also a good deal of staff development occurring as individual faculty prepared for the beginning of Fall Term.

From my own perspective an earlier question bothers me even more. The question was "Is the staff committed to Lane Community College?" The answer is obviously yes. No college, no matter what else it does right, could have justly earned its reputation for excellence unless its staff has a commitment."

FIGURE INCLUDED SALARIES - The Staff Development report on Inservice gave an approximate cost for inservice activities as \$30,000 a day. For those who expressed surprise at this figure--it should be noted that faculty salaries were included in the total cost.

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



COMMENDED - The KLCC Advisory Commission has sent to President Schafer a letter of commendation for Gina Ing, Development Director for the station. The letter cites Gina's contributions to improving the station's image in the community, the value of her contacts with staff members at NPR and CPB, and her work on the NTIA grant proposal last spring that brought KLCC a \$92,000 award for equipment. The letter also cites the fact that, in the 22 months since Gina was hired as Development Director, KLCC has raised about 40-45% of its operating budget. In the past, the College has paid about 90% of the total operating budget for the station.

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

ELECTION ANALYSIS - Eugene and Springfield School Districts--the keys to LCC election success--carried the College to its two levy wins in the September 16 election. An analysis of the precinct printouts indicates that Eugene 4J voted 64% yes on the A ballot and 60% yes on the B measure. Some 74 of 83 Eugene 4J precincts supported the A (89%) and 66 supported the B (80%). Without the latter support, the B would have been defeated, as only 4J, Blachly and Marcola districts supported it. Spectacular highs were registered in the precincts worked by LCC Advocates, including yes percents of 97, 92, 88, 85, 83, etc. Springfield School District voted 53% yes on the A, but dropped to 46 on the B. Support continued to be weak in the rural areas, particularly in Siuslaw School Dist. That area voted 38% yes on the A and 35% yes on the B, with all 5 precincts voting a majority of no on both measures.

ENROLLMENT - Dean of Students Jack Carter advises that Fall Term enrollment, if continued at the same level all year, would produce about 9,500 FTE students. That's several hundred more than budgeted for and well above the 7,512 that the state is partially supporting. The number of full-time students is up about 250 and the number of part-timers is down from last fall. Community Education self-improvement course enrollment is down and enrollment in night classes is down. Math, Science and Social Science enrollments are up. That's as of the second week of classes; the official numbers will be based on fourth week counts.

TONIGHT - The LCC Board of Education meets at 7:30 in ADM 216. On the agenda are an access ramp for the lower levels of the P.E. and P.A. buildings; 3 course approvals; reports on enrollment, accidents, Center Building remodeling, site acquisitions for Construction Tech., and elections; and a resolution opposing Ballot Measure 6 in the November election. The meeting is open to the public.

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

SWEET SIXTEEN - LCC will have existed for 16 years as of October 19, 1980. The election approving establishment of the college was held that long ago. Classes, however, were begun on July 1, 1965. (This is the final word because Bert Dotson and Larry Romine insist that they were there all night when the founding election was held and waited for rural paper votes in locked boxes to roll in through the dawn.)

LIMIT - The proposed new tax base for LCC on the November 4 ballot would keep property tax increases for the College 4 percent **BELOW** the average increases approved by voters over the last 7 years.

WINNERS - Numbers may trip up some of us, but not members of the Mathematics Department. They've gone 7 years and 6 months without an on-the-job accident, reports Bill Mansell, who administers the College safety program. Other departments doing better than average: Study Skills, 3 years 9 months; Home Economics, 2 years 11 months; Personnel, 2 years 7 months; and Counseling, 2 years 4 months. Bill says the two-year accident tally for 1978-80 is 101 accidents costing \$48,647 and 785 lost work days. This comparatively low record has kept LCC's accident cost ratio lowest among Oregon community colleges. Worst record last year, however, was compiled by clerical employees, who recorded 9 accidents costing \$12,000 or 43 percent of the dollar losses.

'CHAIR' IS SUGGESTED - The publication, On Campus with Women, suggests in its Summer 1980 issue that "chair" be used to refer to persons presiding at meetings. "Chair" is the oldest of terms generally used, having made its entrance in the year 1647. "Chairman" dates from 1654 and "chairwoman" from 1699. A review of the history of parliamentary procedure and Robert's Rules of Order suggests that the use of "chair" is clearly acceptable, the publication says.



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BALLOT MEASURE 6 - Reports of polls showing BM6 passing in Oregon make it appropriate for The Daily to remind staff that this limitation on property tax would chop 5 percent of community college local tax support. That's the word from the State Department of Education. Dean of Administrative Services Bill Berry says that means a cut for LCC of about \$4.4 million next year and \$5.5 million the year after. They need the money to get the word out as to potential impact if this measure is approved at the November 4 election.

Wallace, Mechanics instructor; and Elizabeth Boyington, Senior Companion Project Director, Adult Ed.
- (2) Accepted the resignation of Nancy Kelsey, instructor in Study Skills, who will pursue a master's degree program in California.
- (3) Authorized allocation of up to \$9,350 from uncommitted plant funds to construct an access ramp in the P.E./Performing Arts area.
- (4) Approved three new courses: Introduction to Social Science Research Methods, Soc 292; Streamlined Sewing, CT 215; and Blazer Construction, CT 217.

TRAINING COMPLETED - Sharon Moore, CWE Coordinator for Business, has received a certificate of completion for her participation in the Oregon Extern Program for 1979-80. The Extern Program, sponsored by Oregon State University in conjunction with the Oregon Dept. of Education, is a vocational and career education leadership training program. Participants make on-site visits to outstanding vocational training programs throughout the state, and gain exposure to a wide variety of vocational and career education roles. Last year was the first time community college vocational educators were included in the program.

RECEIVES SPECIAL THANKS - Carl Horstrup, Coordinator of Apprenticeship Programs, was honored last month at the Regional Meeting in Cottage Grove of Boy Scouts of America. The special recognition came as a result of his work last year in updating the Scouts' Masonry Merit Badge Book. Carl says the book hadn't been updated since 1952, and when he pointed this out to Boy Scout officials, "they took me up on it." Carl and LCC are included in the acknowledgements of the book, which is internationally distributed. Carl was presented a token of recognition by Joseph Merton, National Director of Boy Scouts of America.

LCCEA DUES - Proposed dues on the LCCEA (local) ballot provide for a \$5 increase--from \$20 to \$25. If passed, the new dues will be pegged to the average annual salary. They will not be on a sliding scale. Dues will be the same for all full-time faculty. Pegging the fee does provide for increased printing and labor costs in coming years.

TAX BASE - The following news release, sent out recently to local media, is reprinted here for LCC staff members--to answer your questions on the tax base and to help you answer the questions of others:

Lane Community College's 1976 tax base will be updated to last through 1982, if the college receives a favorable vote at the November 4 election.

"Inflation and growth in enrollment have left the existing base of \$5.9 million far behind," says LCC President Eldon Schafer.

The college asks a new base of \$9.4 million, up \$1.8 million from the base and a one-year levy which fund this year's operations.

Schafer says the new base offers advantages to citizens as well as the college.

"It reduces uncertainty for both students and taxpayers," he says. "It will enable us to plan ahead so that everybody has a better idea as to what courses we can afford to offer. And staff can use their time to work on instruction rather than budget revisions."

The new base would limit growth, he says.

"Our tax rate this year is the lowest in 13 years, and we estimate it will stay at or below about 93 cents per \$1,000 true cash value for the next couple of years, if the base is approved.

"We know times are tough and therefore we've kept our proposed tax increase well below the average approved for LCC by voters over the past 7 years," Schafer says.

By living within the base for the next 2 years, the college would assure that LCC taxes are eligible for up to 30 percent homeowner-renter state tax relief.

Funding elections would be avoided in the 2-year period, saving up to \$75,000.

"Our cost per student is second lowest among Oregon institutions of higher education," Schafer said, "so I believe LCC represents a pretty good buy for the taxpayer. We may well serve up to 35,000 local people this year in spite of cuts in our state funding."

CORRECTION - The 1% property tax limitation proposed by Ballot Measure 6 would mean a loss of 56 percent of local tax support for LCC, not a mere 5 percent as reported in Friday's Daily. That amounts to about \$4.4 million next year, and \$5.5 million the year after.

LCC'S FUTURE DIRECTION - The College Board of Education will meet in a work session Wednesday night to talk about how and where enrollment might be limited if funding shortfalls continue. It's a discussion that should get to future philosophy and mission of the institution. Also on the agenda are a report on intramurals, a tour of the student government facilities and a tour of recently remodeled areas in several buildings. The tours start at 7, with the Board to meet about 8 p.m. in ADM 216. The public is welcome to attend.

STUDENTS APPROVE HSC PROGRAM - A study conducted by School District 4J last school year reveals that LCC High School Completion students are pleased with both courses and instruction in the HSC Program, and think their HSC instructors are more personable and individualistic in their interaction with students than were the students' public high school teachers. The questionnaire data was taken from 106, or 60%, of the 4J students who were enrolled in the HSC program during the early spring of 1980. The study also shows that students who transfer to the HSC program usually enroll shortly after leaving their high school or not at all, and that they frequently are discontented with the public school system and the lack of understanding of personal difficulties and needs, primarily on the part of high school teachers.



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



ALLOCATION - LCC gets \$109,026 of the October 17 Legislative Emergency Board allocation of \$471,000 to state community colleges. The money goes into the Board's contingency fund. The total from the state is a partial restoration of the \$5.1 million cut from community college allocations in August. All 13 colleges and the Treaty Oak Center at The Dalles got a piece of the restoration, based on overenrollment last year, the August cut, and recent enrollment experience. Allocations ranged from Lane's high to a low of \$5,238 for Treaty Oak.

AVAILABLE - Copies of a four-page President's Report for 1979-80 will be available Monday at the office of Diane Dann, publications manager, ADM 211. The report by President Schafer recaps the conflicting pressures of the year--increasing enrollment and budget uncertainties--and a solid list of achievements by staff at all levels.

ELECTED - Dr. Charlene Curry, vice chair of the LCC Board of Education, has been elected chair of the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) Pacific Region Caucus. She also is a member of ACCT's Board of Directors. Her election came at the group's recent convention in Honolulu. One of her primary responsibilities is to plan and preside at the Pacific Region meeting next June 24-27 at Portland. Charlene also spoke at the Honolulu meeting on "The Board Chairman--An Expert Politician."

LCC BOARD MEETING - Wednesday night, the Board toured the student government facilities on the 4th floor of the Center Building and remodelling projects in the Forum, Mechanics, Art, P.E., Administration, and Center Buildings, then met in the Boardroom for a work session. Agenda items included reports on the college's election plans and the intramural program, and a discussion of the impact of reduced state funding. The Board agreed the college should do everything possible to continue to offer a comprehensive program including vocational training, college transfer courses, and adult education.

MAKING REQUIREMENTS CLEARER - Are there hidden prerequisites in some courses? Are term papers required fall term while students aren't taught how to write papers until winter term? These are the questions asked in the new innovation abstract, "Discovering Hidden Prerequisites: The Interface Project." Read it at offices of instructional department heads.

INTRAMURALS GROWING - Intramurals Coordinator Mitch Allara reported at Wednesday night's Board meeting that participation in Intramurals has increased about 20% each year since 1977-78. An attempt has been made to respond to a Board concern expressed earlier this year that the Intramural program not take a secondary position to athletics; figures for Intramurals growth and funding indicate this concern is being met.

DUES INCREASE APPROVED - The LCCEA Executive Committee voted overwhelmingly to approve a dues increase for LCCEA members from \$20 to \$25. The increase passed by a vote of 5 to 1.



GROWTH - State Department of Education figures for last year's state community college enrollment show 51,149 reimbursable FTE students. That was up 6 percent from 1978-79. Nine colleges showed enrollment gains; four had declines. Umpqua was up 15 percent, Lane was up 14 percent, Central Oregon and Linn-Benton up 12 percent, Blue Mountain up 11 percent, and Chemeketa and Clackamas up 8 percent. Declines were registered at Clatsop, Rogue, Southwestern Oregon and Treasure Valley. Growth statewide this year could be up another 6 percent.

EFFICIENCY - LCC's growth in operating cost per student was held last year to about a third the rate of inflation.




