KLCC RANKED FIFTH IN NATION - KLCC is ranked as the fifth most popular public radio station in the country in a just-released listing of the 30 stations qualified for funding from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. The comparison by CPB is based on the percentage of each station's metropolitan listening area population which listens to the station each week. In the Eugene-Springfield area, 7.9 percent of the population listens to KLCC each week. this means," says KLCC Program Director, Jon Schwartz, "is that we don't have more listeners than some New York City or Los Angeles public stations, but that KLCC has a greater percentage of listeners in Eugene than do the public radio stations in either of those two cities.'

## Schafer interprets November tax base proposal

The TORCH asked LCC President Eldon Schafer to prepare this week's forum. Dr. Schafer responded to questions posed about the LCC Tax Base Proposal appearing on the Nov. 4 ballot. Why does LCC have a tax base

election on the November ballot, so soon after winning levies at the Sept. 16 election?
Schafer: We're most appreciative

of the fine voter support on Sept. 16, but that money only takes care of this year's budget. The "A" and "B" levies are for one year only; now, we've got to plan for next year, and the year after. Since tax bases can be placed before voters only at primary and general elections, Nov. 4 is our last chance until 1982.

If the college receives a favorable vote on Rov. 4, what will the

Schafer: The 1976 tax base will be updated to last until 1983. Inflation and growth in enrollment have left the existing base of \$5.9

million far behind.

How much money is the college asking for in the new base?

Schafer: LCC seeks a new base of \$9.4 million. That's up \$1.5 million from the old base and the one-year levies which fund this year's operations.

What advantages would the new base offer?

Schafer: An important one is the reduction of uncertainty for both students and taxpayers. You'll recall that neither the college nor the students knew exactly how many courses we could afford to offer until just before classes for fall term. Those who registered on Sept. 16 could not be permit-ted to sign up for some 200

classes until the election results were known.

Isn't there a lot of staff time wasted in connection with elections?

Schafer: Yes. We had to place budgets before voters three times this year before our levies were approved. The new tax base will permit us to avoid the use of staff time on budget revisions rather than instruction. We must have lost more than a thousand hours this summer to redoing the budget.

Will the new base eliminate some of those elections?

Schafer: We would plan to live within the base for two years. That would make budget elections unnecessary in that time and could save up to \$75,000 in election costs. election costs.

What would the new base cost

taxpayers? Schafer: This year's tax rate of 93 cents per thousand dollars of the cash value of property is the lowest in 13 years. We estimate that the rate under the new base would be at or below this year. And the new base would hold the tax increases for the next two years well below the average of the past seven years.

Would the new base qualify for state tax relief?

Schafer: The entire tax base is eligible for the up to 30 percent homeowner and renter tax relief. "B" levies are not eligible for that saving. How do LCC costs compare with

other community colleges?

Schafer: Very well. Our cost per student is second lowest among all Oregon institutions of higher

education. We're about 13 percent below the average statewide community college cost per student. I believe LCC represents a pretty good buy for the taxpayers and for students. We may well serve up to 35,000 or so local people this year in spite of cuts in our state funding.

Will approval of the new tax base change programs in any way? Schafer: The base will assure continued job training. always has been and will continue to be a primary part of the college mission. That makes LCC very important to the life and economy of the area. The new base allows LCC to continue with the same level of service. That, of course, assumes the defeat of Ballot Measure 6 and continuance of an adequate level of funding from the





VOTE TOTAL - The final count in Lane County on LCC's tax base was 61,510 yes (54%), 53,446 no, with 12,727 undervotes (people who didn't vote on this issue). Among community colleges statewide, only LCC and Portland CC won new bases. Ballot Measure 6, in Lane County, received 36,723 yes votes and 84,505 no votes (70%). If undervotes and overvotes are added in, the percentage of no votes is still 66%.

FINAL ELECTION TOTALS - LCC won its new tax base at the November 4 election 61,980 to 54,419 (53% yes). Some 89 of 171 precincts were supportive (52%). Only 9 precincts (5%) had less than a 40% Yes vote. Eugene School District again carried the election for the College, giving us 79 of the 89 winning precincts, a 61% Yes vote, 58% of the District-wide Yes vote, 4 precincts that voted over 80% Yes, 18 precincts that voted in the 70% Yes category, and heavy turnouts of voters, some precincts over 80%. Possible reasons for the victory: a reasonable, defendable request; distribution of some 17,000 fliers door-to-door on the 2 Saturdays preceding the election by about 100 LCC people and some 350 OEA teachers and others, organized by Language Arts Prof Ted Romoser; a post card mailing to 118,000 homes; the 77% turnout of voters; positive editorial and news coverage; visible university support, etc.

X-COUNTRY CHAMPS - The LCC Women's cross country team, coached by Mike Manley, won the National Junior College Athletic Association championship Saturday in Coeur D'Alene, Idaho. This is the second straight national championship for the team, which was formed only 4 years ago. The Titans finished with 50 points--more than 30 ahead of the second-place team, Golden Valley Lutheran of Minnesota. Sandy Dickerson and Martha Swatt of the LCC team were awarded All America honors.

TONIGHT - The LCC Board of Education meets at 8 in ADM 216 to handle a number of housekeeping matters. The agenda includes a request for approval of a new one-year program in Word Processing, a quarterly financial report which indicates the College is proceeding well within its budget and is in good financial condition, a request to proceed with energy-saving adaptations to the Auto Technology and Machine Technology Buildings at a cost of \$43,317 in state construction allocations and \$37,700 from federal energy grants, canvass of the November 4 election, appointment of a person to the LCC Budget Committee, a request for \$12,600 to maintain LCC's membership in the Cooperative Museum Commission, and adoption of a January-July 1981 budget calendar.

CHINESE ART - An exhibit of contemporary painting and calligraphy from the Republic of China is displayed in the Library mezzanine, now through November 26. The collection, compiled by the National Museum of History in Taipei, includes some 50 art scrolls in color, and representative samples of traditional Chinese calligraphy. The exhibit is the first activity to grow out of LCC's membership in the Pacific Northwest International/Intercultural Education Consortium.

BROWN BAG TALK - Kate Barry, Women's Studies instructor, will discuss "Beyond the Myths and Stereotypes of Women" Tuesday, Nov. 18, at noon in the Boardroom. Kate will explore what she believes will be happening to women in the future, in contrast to what our myths and stereotypes might lead us to believe will be happening.



TAX BASE RESULTS - Only two of the nine community colleges which submitted tax bases to the voters in the Nov. 4 election were successful. They were Portland, which won approval of a new base of \$11.8 million, and LCC. Tax bases were rejected for Blue Mountain, Central Oregon, Linn-Benton, Clatsop, Clackamas, Chemeketa and Treasure Valley. All except Linn-Benton, which has a continuing tax base, will have to seek one-year levies for the 1981-82 school year.

CC BOARD MEMBERS IN THE LEGISLATURE - Three community college board members will be in the new Oregon state legislature when it convenes January 12. They are Howard Cherry of Portland, Bill Markham of Umpqua and Barbara Roberts of Mt. Hood. The lone woman in the Senate, Ruth McFarland, is an instructor at Mt. Hood.

APPOINTED - Associate Dean Jim Ellison has been appointed by Eugene Mayor Gus Keller to the Mayor's Blue and Gold Committee. The committee is "an ongoing education program to let Eugene residents know about the positive services by the City...(including) soliciting citizen ideas and gathering support for City programs."

HAIL TO THE CHIEF - Doug White, Health Occupations head, is this year's president of the University of Oregon Alumni Association. The board of directors chose him on September 6. He oversees policy-setting and committee activities and acts as official representative of the Association.

ATTENTION WOMEN - The American Association of Women in Community and Junior Colleges and The League for Innovation in the Community College have been awarded a grant from the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education. The grant will support a project to provide training for community college women to become administrators. Program components include 1) a structured mentor/trainee project to develop administrative skills; 2) a regional workshop for skill building and presentations by experts on management; and 3) an optional national conference. Sixty women will be selected nationally for the first year. Criteria for selection include 1) a minimum of three years community college experience; 2) bachelors or higher degree; 3) the secured commitment of the applicant's college; and 4) selection of a mentor and a project Applications must be postmarked no later than Dec. 1. 

BEOG GRANTS UP. BUT... - The Oregon State Scholarship Commission says 12,103 community college students received BEOG grants during the 1979-80 school year totaling nearly \$7.7 million. This was 2,999 more students than were served the previous year when 9,109 students split nearly \$5.6 million in grants. However, the average community college BEOG is still lower than for any other type of institution, including beauty colleges and other proprietary institutions. The average grant for an Oregon student attending a private college during 1979-80 was \$1,090; for public four-year colleges it was \$871; for proprietary schools it was \$831; and for community colleges, it was \$635. This is partly due to the fact that the amount of a grant is dependent on a student's total costs, and community college costs are lower than those of other schools.

REMAINING INDEPENDENT - Faculty at Linn-Benton voted down a proposal that it affiliate with the Oregon Education Association. Nine community college faculty collective bargaining groups currently are affiliated with OEA, one of the state's largest unions. LBCC has the only faculty collective bargaining association not affiliated with a larger union.

"GRILL THE DEANS" FOLLOW-UP - For those who were too busy or simply forgot, the fall Grill the Deans Session touched on these questions:

1. Why remodel the Center Basement? Why not spend the money on instruction?

Response: The college has set funds for construction. The remodeling of the Center Bldg. is on the college list of construction projects. Instructional funds come from the college's general operating budget. The two funds cannot be mixed.

2. Are there any plans to build a new building for Language Arts and Social Science?

Response: With declining funding levels, no plans are currently considered to house these two

3. The proposal that faculty do vocational counseling raises the question of workload and the function of the Counseling Department.

Response: Faculty already do informal vocational counseling. Counselors generally do 20% personal counseling and 80% academic counseling and teaching. This proposal is not intended to increase faculty workload, but to recognize what is already taking place and to increase service to students.

4. What happens to student retention efforts in a period of declining funding?

Response: LCC is not in the business of attracting "throw away" students. Efforts to improve student retention will continue in times of declining funding. The intent is to provide proper student placement rather than deal with high student attrition.
