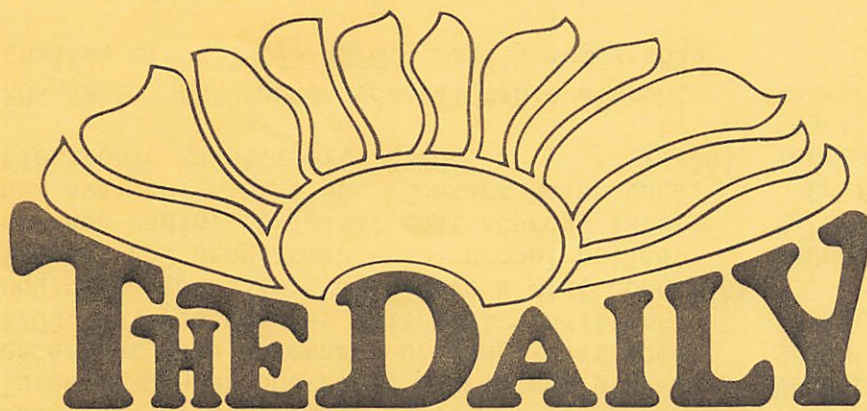

The commission will focus on education, employment, economic development, health and law. The commission is charged with identifying and researching problem areas and issues affecting blacks in Oregon and recommending actions to the governor, including legislation. Commission members will maintain liaison between the black community and governmental units.

TEACHERS CHOSE REAGAN - Despite NEA endorsement of President Jimmy Carter, a CBS-New York Times election day exit poll indicates that 46% of the nation's educators voted for Ronald Reagan, with just 41% voting for Carter. Twelve per cent of the nation's teachers voted for Independent John Anderson. The NEA-union officials had endorsed Carter in late September, and spent millions of dollars on the President's unsuccessful re-election bid, says the Oregon School Boards Association newsletter for November.

575,000 FTE STUDENTS - Oregon school enrollments include 450,982 FTE in K-12 schools and 125,020 FTE in postsecondary institutions, public and private. Oregon costs per FTE in 1979-80 were: K-12, \$2,196; community colleges, \$2,148; state system undergraduates, \$2,722; state system graduates, \$4,892; OIT undergraduates, \$3,699. (Source: OECC)

The Revitalization of the Community College

THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE is the last of the major urban institutions with the capacity to become the cutting edge of the future for American society. The failure of the entrenched bureaucracies in most areas of public higher education and the chaos associated with that failure are contemporary givens. Traditional lip service to missions-and-goals statements and public-relations imagery do not begin to meet the expressed and implied needs of urban America.

As we enter the 1980's, major trends are emerging that can be powerful catalysts for the renewal and revitalization of community colleges. They are:

► The greatly increased number of women actively determined to obtain the economic advantages and status benefits of higher education.

► Increasing urban tensions underline the recommendations of the Carnegie Council designed to bring unskilled and academically disadvantaged youth directly into the community-college service area.

► The "reverse migration" of students, because of inflation and recession, from away-from-home colleges and universities to lower-cost local institutions.

► The influx of a new blue-collar clientele, as the myth of working-class affluence erodes under the pressure of economic and high technology realities.

► The expansion of education opportunities to meet the needs of retiring professionals, workers who are displaced or whose skills are obsolete and who need retraining, liberal-arts B.A.'s who want specific career training, and the growing number of people in general who want a college degree.

The fact that more and more women are entering institutions of higher education has already had an observable effect, but the current statistics do not begin to reflect the increase coming in the next decade. The proportion of young women (11 to 18 years old) indicating interest in attending college has skyrocketed. College women of the 80's will demand extensive institutional reforms and far more sophisticated responses to their needs than did those previously enrolled. Upward mobility, equivalent status, open access to all areas of the curriculum, more women teachers—these are only the beginning of an enormous pattern of change.

Existing inequities and progressively deteriorating educational and social futures are contemporary re-

alities for many Americans, particularly for members of minority groups. Massive numbers of young people, largely concentrated in urban areas, must be brought into the mainstream of society through successful educational intervention. The alternative is the development of a permanent underclass. The explosive social, economic, and political consequences of such negative forces (already well under way) would be devastating to democratic society.

Primary action to prevent crisis through positive intervention should include carefully planned and implemented expansion of community-college services to meet the real needs of disadvantaged youth. Programs in basic-skills training, job preparation, and apprenticeships and related vocational specializations are absolute essentials, and they must be coordinated with counseling, advising, career orientation, and referral and placement services.

Functional illiteracy, currently pandemic, must be attacked and largely eliminated. That will allow previously deprived members of society not only open access to the system but the chance to survive it and reap at least some of its benefits. Growth in the clientele for higher education coming from those emancipated millions will have positive short- and long-range effects on the future of community colleges, and will significantly increase the role and influence of those colleges in their communities.

The steady decline of middle-class economic and social status, because of paralyzing inflation and the economic downturn of the past two years, is challenging the historically stable foundation under institutions of higher education. As middle-class families realign their financial priorities, a reverse migration of thousands of students currently attending schools away from home is taking place. The students primarily involved are those studying for a bachelor's or career degree who are now deciding to take their first two years at a local low-cost institution while living at home. There is little question that most of the mature two-year institutions can readily expand and service large numbers of those new students.

Permanent layoffs and revised perceptions of the future of blue-collar jobs have brought new awareness of the need for higher-level training. The number of people going directly from secondary school to jobs will decline as the demand for skills requiring post-

secondary education rises. It is also clear that workers whose skills become obsolete will require additional training. Community colleges, industry-focused since their inception, will have to collaborate more closely with labor organizations and industries to meet effectively the training needs of both groups.

The increased expectations of older people (who now make up the largest and most rapidly growing segment of the population) will demand a new sophistication and sensitivity to their needs and expectations on the part of community-college leaders. It would be naïve (and dangerous) to assume support of institutions of higher education by older people without real insight and widely publicized responses to their developing education imperatives.

SUCH COMMITMENT WILL NOT COME EASILY. Optimal availability of services and maximum effort by faculty and staff members are the minimum requirements. An adaptive curriculum should be offered at flexible and realistic times in easily accessible locations both on and off the campus, and skillful use should be made of such new technologies as cable television, the microprocessor, and the videodisc, among others.

The critical decade ahead must see the development of a new class of administrator in the community colleges—an academic professional with sophisticated management skills, socially and politically aware, and responsive to the community. There will also be a need for professional public-relations and marketing efforts that will present the institution accurately while emphasizing the benefits of its programs and services.

The coming of age of the expanded community college will mean the development of new responsibilities toward youth and older people and academic and career-oriented students; a greater involvement of women and members of minority groups; and a dynamic program of community service. Such an institution can really lead the way to new democratic vistas for America.

GROWTH - A ten-year enrollment study done by Research Associate Juanita Foellinger shows the college had 84.9% more students in 1979-80 than in 1972-73, growing from 20,632 credit and non-credit students in 1972-73 to 38,141 last year. The FTE for the same period rose from 5900 to 9498--a 61% increase. Part-time enrollment accounted for the increase. The unduplicated credit student headcount increased 33.5% from 1970-71 to 1979-80.

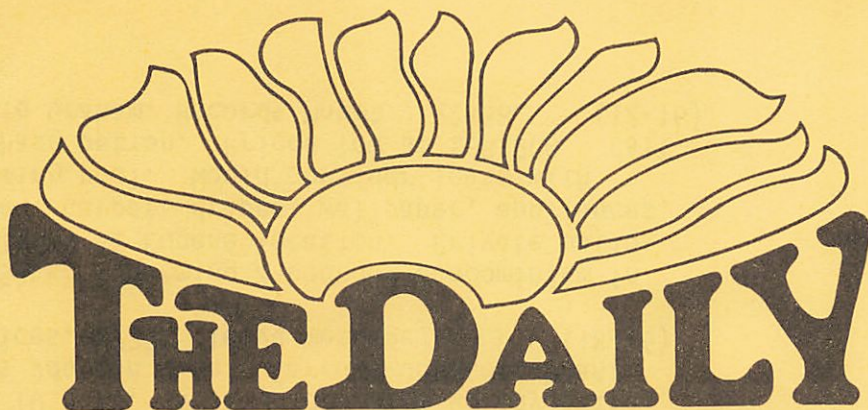

MORE ON STUDENT ENROLLMENT - The ten-year LCC student enrollment study done by Juanita Foellinger shows that the 1970-71 student body was 61.4% male and 38.6% female; by 1979-80, the balance had shifted to 55.7% female and 44.2% male. The ten-year increase for females is 119% compared to 9.3% for males. Although the number of women students is growing, the growth is mostly among part-timers; 58% of male students are full-time in contrast to 48% of females.

FAMILIES - The Census Bureau says the number of American families headed by women increased by 51% during the past decade. At the same time, the number of families headed by a man without a wife in the household grew 33.5%. The number of traditional husband-wife families grew only 6.6% during the same period. The growing number of households headed by women is of concern since the median income of such families in 1978 was just \$8,540, compared with the \$17,640 median income of all families. Husband-wife units still comprise 82.5% of all families; 14.6% are headed by women and only 2.9% are maintained by a man alone. (OCCA News Digest)

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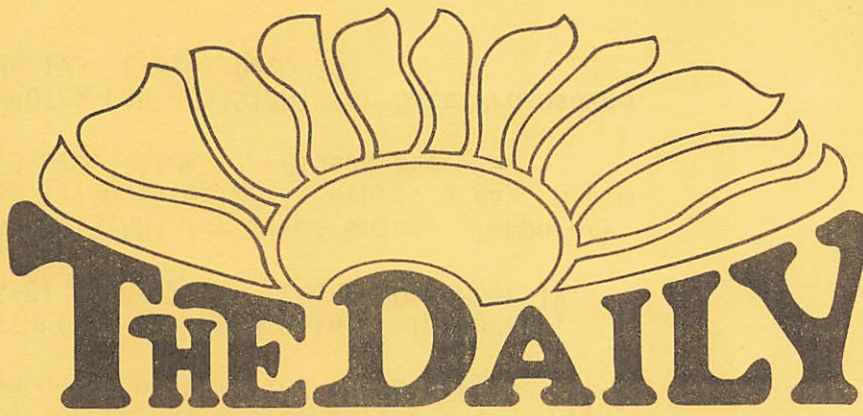

OLDER STUDENTS - Are community college students older than those who attend four-year colleges? The answer is yes and no, according to the Education Commission of the States. Among full-time students, the median age of community college students is no different than the four-year schools. And if you consider part-time students as one category, there's still no difference: part-time students are older than full-time students in both segments. However, since community colleges have more part-time students, the overall age of community college students is higher than for four-year schools. (from OCCA News Digest, Dec. 12, 1980)

AT LCC - The greatest enrollment growth at LCC from the 1970-71 school year to 1979-80 was among people 42-61 years old. In 1970-71 there were 208 credit students in this age group. Ten years later, in 1979-80, the figure rose to 645, for a 210.1% increase. In 1970-71, the average age of LCC students was 23.35; in 1979-80 it was 26.90. In 1970-71 credit students 21 and under made up 55.2% of the student population. This steadily decreased to 37.2% in 1979-80. 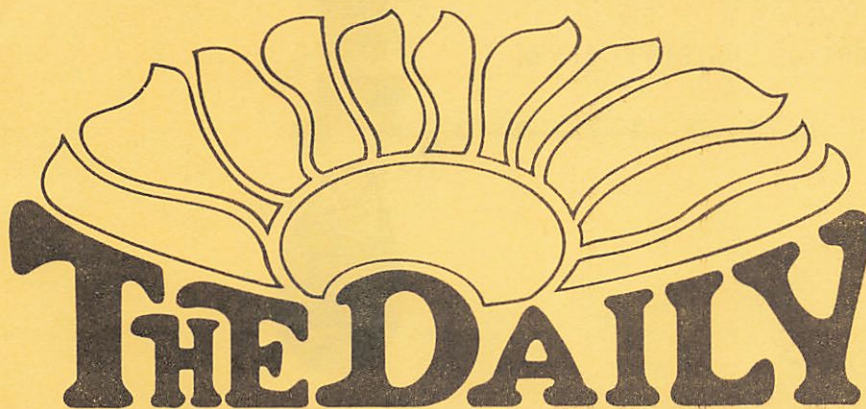

COCC SIGNS CONTRACT WITH FACULTY - The Central Oregon Community College board has ratified a new three-year agreement with its faculty which provides a 12% wage hike for 1980-81. In succeeding years, the wage settlement is tied to a capped Consumer Price Index formula. The 12% figure for 1980-81 is based on a 6% wage hike and the college's picking up the faculty's contributions to the Public Employees Retirement System (PERS). 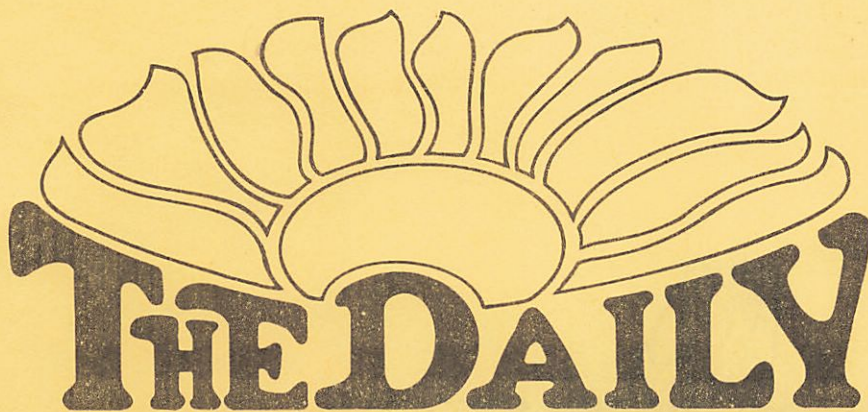

PART-TIME ENROLLMENT ON THE RISE - The ten-year student enrollment study done by Juanita Foellinger shows an increase in the part-time credit student population of 146.8% in the ten-year period from 1970-71 to 1979-80. Last year alone, part-time credit students increased 15% over the previous year. The average load in 1971-72 was 11.8 credits, decreasing to 10.3 credits by 1979-80. The percentage of students taking 1-3 credits has increased 307.9% over the ten years; the 4-6 credit load has increased 108.6%. At the other extreme, students taking over 20 credits have also increased notably: 156.6% in ten years.

COCC SIGNS CONTRACT WITH FACULTY - The Central Oregon Community College board has ratified a new three-year agreement with its faculty which provides a 12% wage hike for 1980-81. In succeeding years, the wage settlement is tied to a capped Consumer Price Index formula. The 12% figure for 1980-81 is based on a 6% wage hike and the college's picking up the faculty's contributions to PERS. Formerly independent, the COCC faculty was represented in negotiations for the first time this year by the Oregon Education Association. (From OCCA News Digest, Dec. 12, 1980)

CONSUMER PRICE INDEX - Inflation continues to moderate in Oregon. The September-to-September CPI for Portland showed an annual inflation rate of 10.6%, compared to 17.7% in the March-to-March CPI. In March, the Portland CPI was 3 percentage points higher than the national CPI. By September, it was 2 percentage points under the national CPI. (From OCCA News Digest)
