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MORE ON ENROLLMENT - In 1970-71, graduates from Eugene-Springfield high schools made up 35.9% of the LCC student population. This proportion steadily decreased to 21.2% by 1979-80--a 10.4% ten-year drop. Ten years ago, 43.8% of LCC students were out-of-district high school graduates, but this had increased to 65% in 1979-80. This represents a ten-year increase of 125.4% in out-of-district high school graduates, suggesting increased immigration in the metropolitan area. At least 80% of all enrollments are Lane County residents. (from "Ten Year Student Enrollment Characteristics," prepared by Juanita Foellinger, Research Associate).

Next meeting is February 11.

COMING OUR WAY - A survey of Oregon public school students, sponsored by the Oregon Education Association last spring, reveals that 62% of the students questioned plan to continue their education after high school. The study also showed that 51% of the students considered the education they were getting "good," 13% considered it "very good," and 28% said it was "so-so or OK." Only 5% rated their education "poor" or "very poor." The survey used a random sample of 2,042 Oregon public school students in grades 7-12 and covered 48 schools proportionately representing all areas of the state. Results are reported in the January issue of Oregon Education.

SLOW RECOVERY FORECASTED - The Labor Force Trends publication of the local office of the State Employment Division says it will be at least 6 months before there is much recovery from the recession in Lane County. There have been small gains in economic conditions: payrolls have increased; lumber and wood products employment has been holding its own; there have been some housing starts. But continued high inflation, high interest rates, and relatively slow home buying and consumption of other products is expected to continue.

RE-ENTRY - LCC's next Re-entry Workshop will be held at the Cottage Grove Center, February 9-13. The workshops are of particular value to women who are exploring new interests, or who are wondering how to make the first step from life at home to new directions. Another Re-entry Workshop will be held at the Downtown Center March 2-6. For more information on either workshop, contact the Women's Center at ext. 2353.
