NO MERGER - With 3 members for, 3 against and one abstaining, the LCC Board of Education turned down a proposed merger of the LCCEA and the HSC/ABE/ESL unions on Wednesday night. Jim Pitney, Steve Reid and Ed Cooper voted no; Catherine Lauris, Larry Perry and Charlene Curry voted yes; Les Hendrickson abstained on grounds of insufficient information. The Board apparently split over whether the merger would benefit the College and affected employees. Some 22 teachers who work half-time or more would move to the LCCEA; the other 19 would go to the new Part-Timer union. The Administration had argued that splitting the group would result in disparate treatment in wages and working conditions for people doing similar work and would complicate negotiations.

CONSULTANT HIRED - In other union-related business Wednesday, the Board of Education hired Lon Mills & Associates as negotiator/consultant for this year's round of bargaining. LCCEA's contract expires June 30 and the agreement with HSC/ABE/ESL expires August 31. Mills previously negotiated for LCC in 1974, 1976, and 1979.

MORSE VIDEOTAPE PRESENTED - A videotape of Wayne Morse lecturing at LCC on the History of the Labor Movement was presented to the Wayne Morse Historical Park Corporation at Wednesday night's board meeting. President Schafer presented the videotape to Dorothy Leeper, president of the corporation. George Alvergue, Social Science, and LCC board member Larry Perry, both members of the Morse Historical Park Corp., were instrumental in getting the tape made. It was produced by Tito Balducci, Media Productions. ASLCC President David Anderson, on behalf of Phi Theta Kappa, presented 3 audio cassettes of the tape to Mrs. Leeper; two of the audio cassettes are to be given to Mrs. Wayne (Mildred) Morse and her daughter, Nancy Morse Campbell.

OTHER BOARD MEETING NEWS - At its Wednesday meeting, the Board also (1) Approved the following new courses: Japan--Bridges to Understanding, HUM 105; The Complete Job Finder, HD 205/1.114; Flat Pattern Drafting, 0.968; Textbook Reading, 0.773; (2) Approved a revised program for Construction Technology with 2 new courses in solar energy techniques added and 6 hours of electives deleted; (3) Authorized allocation of \$2,600 from uncommitted Plant Funds for the installation of new elevator control panels in the Center Bldg. to provide accessibility for the wheelchair bound; (4) Accepted the retirement notice of Marvin Jaegers, Social Science, at the end of the current academic year, with commendation for his service and dedication to LCC; (5) Confirmed the appointments of 4 new advisory committee members; (6) Approved the following appointments: Sharon Ferlaak as ESL Vocational Project Coordinator; Dennis R. Jacobsen as instructor in Study Skills and Social Science; Ellen Ness as Senior Companion Volunteer Coordinator; and Lyndell Wilken as P.E. instructor and Women's Track Coach; (7) Approved a one-year leave of absence without pay for the academic year 1981-83 for Alda Vinson, Art & Applied Design.



SPOTLIGHT - On Bob Lyford, Eugene businessman, one of four honored this week for outstanding contributions to vocational education. Bob came to Oregon in 1949 as an electrician, attended Eugene Vocational School to prepare for the state license exam, became EVS' Electrical Apprenticeship Committee chair in 1954, and has been helping in the Apprentice program since. He often was a substitute teacher over the years and finally in 1975 became the regular part-time teacher of such classes as Limited Maintenance Electrical and Electric Motor Control. He is now starting a class in Electrical Energy Conservation. He also, over the years, has assisted with campus electrical troubleshooting and maintenance and in Construction Tech house building projects. Bob has chaired the State Central Inside Electrical Joint Apprenticeship and Training Committee since 1964. He presently chairs the federal Apprenticeship Information Center for Eugene, which seeks to encourage participation of women and minorities in the apprenticeship program. He has had his own electrical business in Eugene for 30 years.

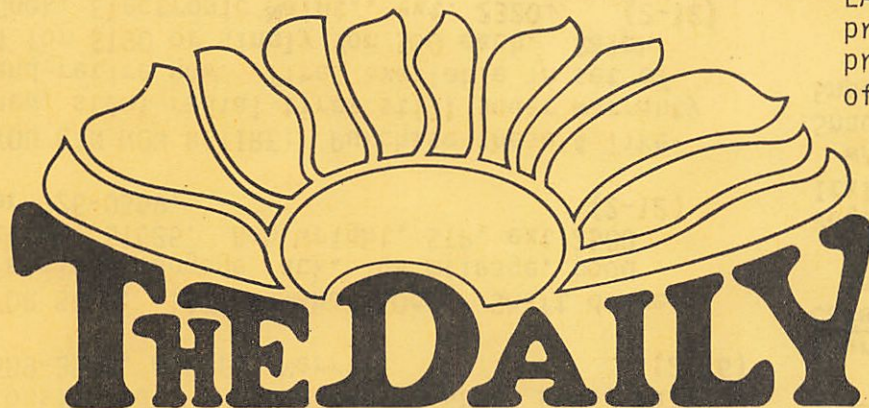

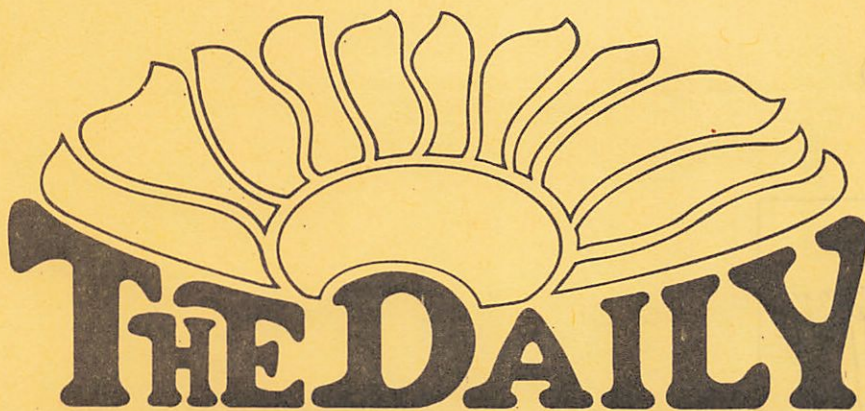

PUTTING THINGS IN PERSPECTIVE ALWAYS HELPS

The Special School District of St. Louis County, Missouri, wound up 1980 with a multitude of wishes for the new year.

The following excerpt from a letter might be good to keep in your drawer--to read when you wonder about how things are going where you are.

"Our bus drivers and aides (members of Teamsters 610) went out on strike Oct. 8. After they refused five offers to get them back to work, we replaced them with 326 new employees. The old drivers and aides sued and a circuit judge (after a six-day trial) ordered us to rehire them all immediately. We appealed and just before Christmas got a ruling that the original judge had no authority to intervene in a situation between the school board and its employees. In the meantime, the board requested the superintendent's resignation (after 20 years with the district!), he declined, they suspended him and for three weeks we had both the suspendee and an interim superintendent in the building. They finally bought up his contract for \$150,000. Before they got that worked out, however, two board members resigned and two others up for re-election in April say they will not run again. So, come April 7, 2/3 of our board will be new. By that time, our 1,300 teachers, who came within 14 votes of striking last spring and have since switched from the relatively docile MSTa to NEA, will undoubtedly be unruly again."

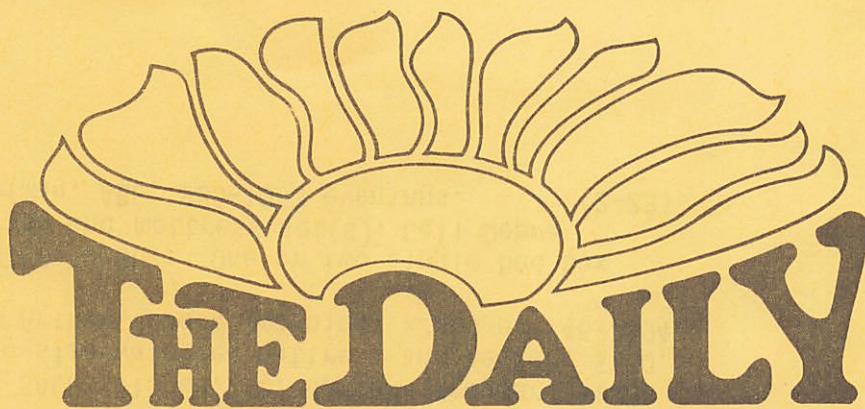





EDUCATIONAL INDICATORS - Statistics reported in a recent edition of Linkages, from the National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development, show that: Over two-thirds of all community college students are employed; a third of community college students are heads of households; part-time students are twice as common in community colleges as in other institutions; ninety percent of part-time conventional-aged community college students work; forty-five percent of community college students or their parents have an annual income below \$15,000.

HOW DO YOU COMPARE? - Also reported in Linkages are results of a 1980 study which found that anxiety, depression, and insomnia are the most frequent stress-related symptoms mentioned among higher education faculty. The lack of "professional reading time" is mentioned most frequently as contributing to faculty members' dissatisfaction with their employment (68.5%). Other factors mentioned: bureaucratic red tape (60.7%); finances (54.1%), lack of time for class preparation (53.9%), and the press of committee work (51.9%).
