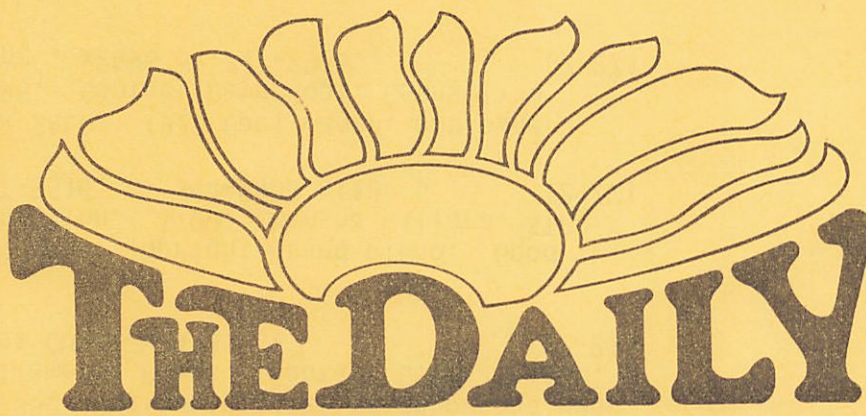

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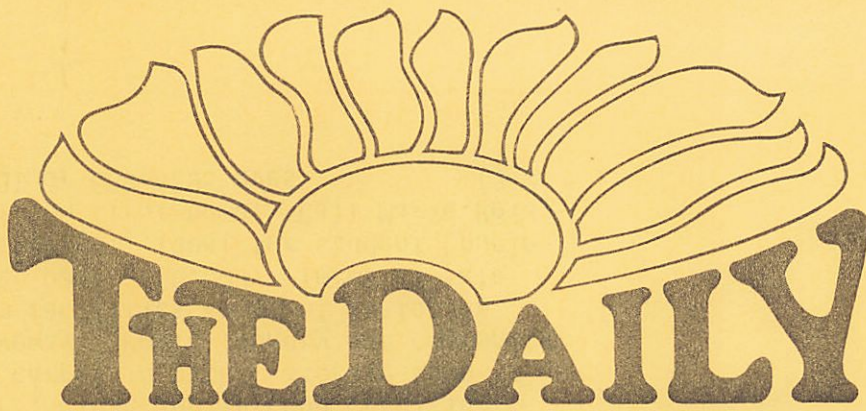

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BOARD MEETS TONIGHT - A proposed tuition increase for next year will be before LCC Board of Education members tonight. Their session begins at 7:30 in ADM 216. The Administration is recommending a 6.7 percent hike for in-district full-timers, up \$11 a term to \$176; a 7.7 percent increase for out-of-district full-timers, up \$22 a term to \$308; a 9.4 percent increase for out-of-state and foreign students, up \$66 a term to \$770. Community Education would go up \$2 for a 30-hour class, an increase of 10 percent. For in-district credit students, LCC would be about in the middle of the tuition range for Oregon community colleges. If about 9,000 FTE students were to enroll next year, the tuition increases would be expected to generate an additional \$241,000. The agenda also includes a discussion by President Schafer on state funding levels, inflation factors, the productivity workshop and planning. Other agenda items are primarily housekeeping matters.

SEX EQUITY PROJECT - The Women's Program has been funded by College SIP funds to conduct a Department Profile Pilot Project. This project involves gathering data to determine a department's standing in regard to sex equity. Eleven areas will be investigated: employee data, professional development, student data, retention rates, work experience placements, job placements, advisory committee membership, program materials used for outreach and advertising, classroom materials, evaluation systems used by department heads, and complaints received. Beverly Behrman, Women's Program, is coordinating the project, assisted by Nancy Chevier, a workstudy student, and Kate Barry, Social Science. Dean Piercey has chosen the Science Department and Dean Hopps has chosen the Mass Communications Department for the project. Both departments contain a mix of vocational education and lower division credit students. The pilot project will be completed by June 30.

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

WHAT'S HAPPENING? - To learn what's happening with LCC's budget planning process and how inflation might affect the college over the next decade, come hear President Schafer's "State of the College" message today at 3 in the Boardroom. Supervisors are encouraged to provide release time for at least one person from each work group to attend.

SOLAR GRANT - The State Department of Education has awarded the LCC Energy Management Technician program \$20,000 to install a solar domestic hot water training facility and monitoring equipment. Allen Gubrud, who wrote the grant application, says the facility will provide a hands-on learning experience for students in the program, enabling them to disassemble and rebuild the solar hot water heating system to learn how it's done. The monitoring equipment will measure the efficiency of solar collectors and heat exchangers, and solar energy availability. Gubrud says the grant money also provides for one- or two-day workshops on energy topics to be held on campus, which he says will attract potential employers as well as students.

UNDERSTANDING JAPAN - A \$1,015 grant from the Oregon Committee for the Humanities will fund an LCC project entitled "Japan--Bridges to Understanding." The project will include a 3-credit course, Humanities 105, to be taught by Dave Croft, Social Science, and Ruth Bowman, Language Arts; the course will be in conjunction with a free series of weekly films to be shown during spring term at the Eugene Public Library. The films will be open to the public, and will also form the basis for class discussions and lectures. Croft says the series will include both documentary and feature films, focusing on specific themes of Japanese culture and society. The project is co-sponsored by Friends of the Public Library.

MEETING CANCELLED - LCCEA will not hold its meeting on insurance plans today as scheduled. The meeting is rescheduled for Tuesday, March 17, at 3 p.m. for department representatives and other interested people. The meeting was rescheduled so that it would not conflict with President Schafer's "State of the College" speech.



TIE VOTES - Three-to-three votes killed proposed tuition increases and union mergers at Wednesday's Board of Education meeting. LCCEA President Art Tegger's request that all teachers except those in the Part-Timer union be voluntarily merged into one group was approved by Lauris, Perry and Hendrickson and rejected by Pitney, Reid and Cooper. The same split occurred on the tuition increase, with the latter group for and the former against. The Administration was asked for more information on how the increase would affect students receiving financial aid. Both issues are likely to be back before the Board again, the tuition matter perhaps as early as April 8. Other business included award of this year's catalog printing to the Springfield News for \$11,258. A cost avoidance of 24 percent was made possible by cutting the book by some 76 pages. The Board was advised that Governor Atiyeh will visit the campus for the first time on April 6. The Office of Instruction survey of what staff think the College should look like in terms of curricula in three years should be available in a couple of weeks. The resignation of Eugene Hysmith from the Mechanics faculty, effective at the end of winter term, was accepted.

It's \$10, with \$3 of that going to the Development Fund. The record is not scheduled to be released for general sale for awhile, the Daily is advised, so you can still get in on an exclusive. 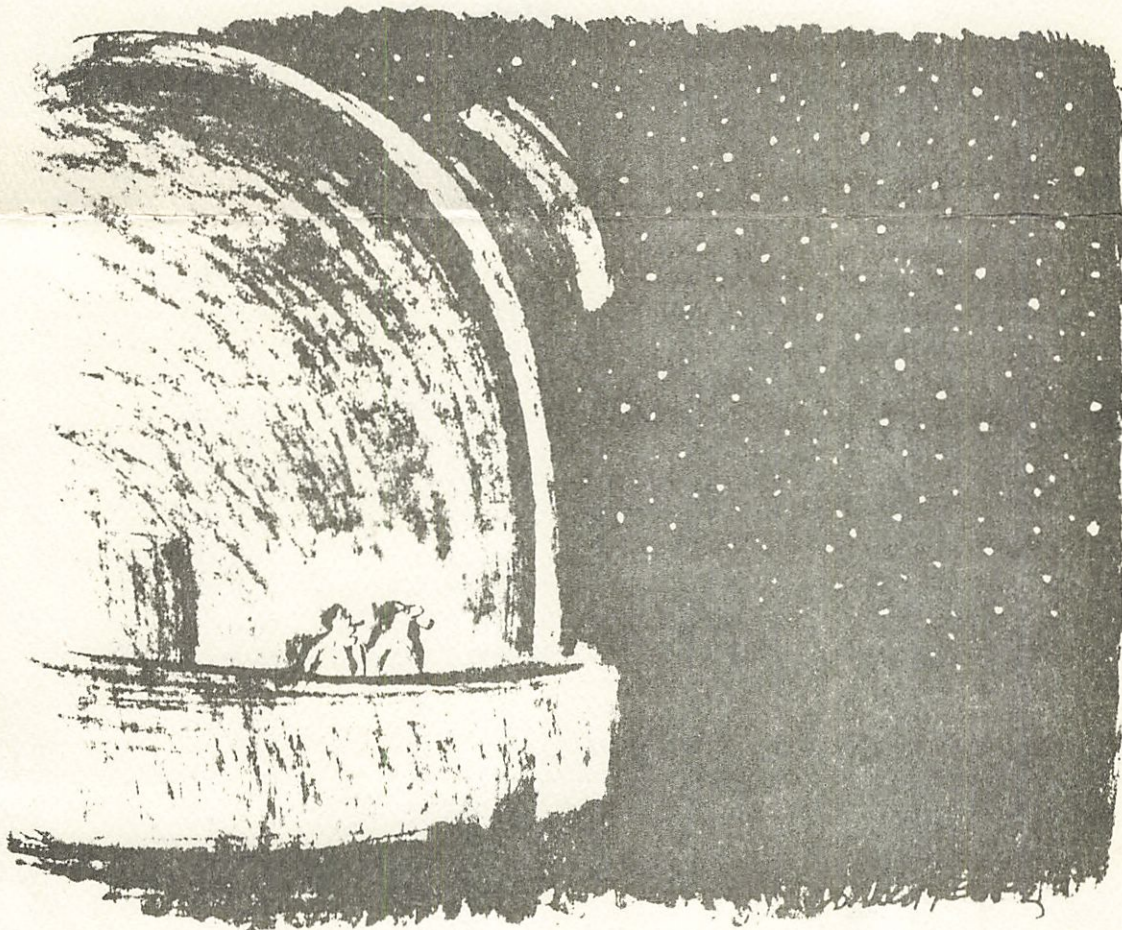

They are austerity and total loyalty to the institution that employs the worker. "In a country where only 15% of the land area is arable and a large population must be supplied," says Ibe, "austerity developed long ago from an economic necessity into a way of life and a form of art. Our paintings and sculpture, our architecture and our gardens have been designed on the premise that 'less is more' because less is all there is." Ibe says loyalty comes down from the samurai warrior swearing fealty to his lord. "The company's success is the employees' success, regardless of where they fit in the scheme of things, and the company's failure is unthinkable. The company's reputation has to be protected tenderly." Japan's only natural resource, Ibe says, "is its people."

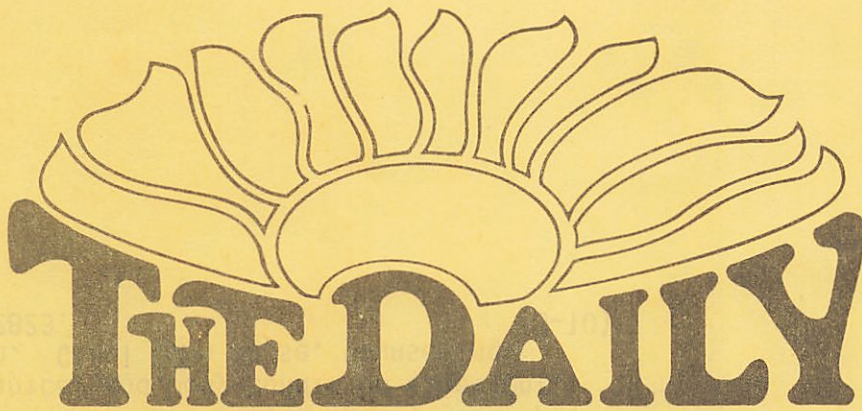

INDIVIDUALIZED LEARNING ADVOCATED - Peter Drucker in the March 31 Wall Street Journal says the demand for education is going up, if it's job-related education which is slanted to the way people learn best. Some adults learn out of books, some learn by doing, some learn best by listening. 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

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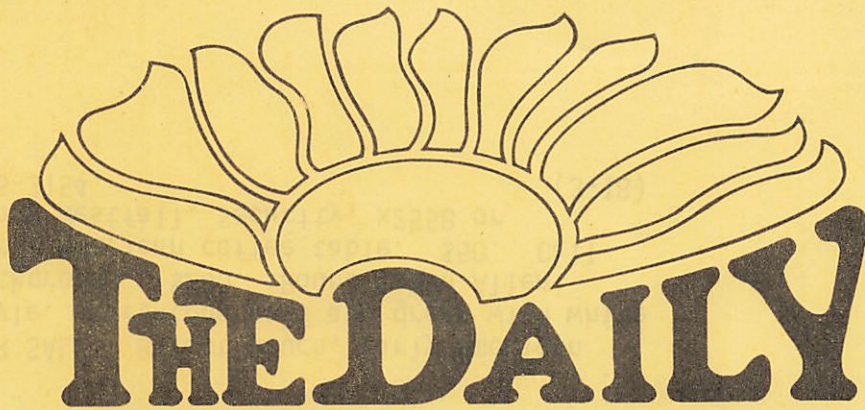

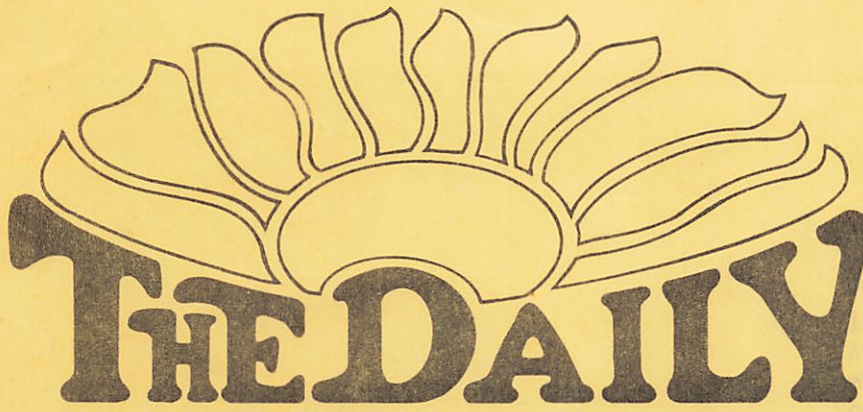
