ENROLLMENT - Spring term enrollment is up slightly from last year at this time. As of Monday morning, enrollment totalled 1,656 FTE, compared to 1,587 FTE last spring at the same point in registration.

SPOTLIGHT - On Roger Cardinal, who began work yesterday as the new LCC Director of Purchasing. FOOD FOR THOUGHT - A special 8-page supplement in today's Torch carries a variety of stories about raising, finding, making, and buying foods for less money. Fixing tofu dishes, raising rabbits, catching ocean fish, gardening year-round, and shopping for a family of four on \$45 a week are included in the issue. And on Wednesday of next week, April 8, the Torch and ASLCC are sponsoring a Food For Thought exhibit in the food service area, at which many of the local people mentioned in the stories will be present to discuss their food ideas with interested students and staff members. Food Service Director Bob Tegge has planned an April 8 menu that includes baked rabbit in mushroom sauce, and fried rabbit; a Willamette Valley vegetable bake; a vegetable souffle; and some other specials.

SOME WIN, SOME LOSE - The results were mixed in statewide community college levy elections on Tuesday. Linn-Benton voters approved an A ballot of \$789,408, but defeated a B ballot of \$760,992; Central Oregon also won on an A ballot (\$3,623,038), but lost on a B ballot of \$343,254. Blue Mountain's request for a \$2,796,794 levy was defeated by a margin of only 39 votes. Chemeketa lost both A and B ballots--for \$8,474,078 and \$695,222, respectively--by large margins; their A ballot was defeated by nearly 8,000 votes. A 3-year rate-based serial levy was approved by Clackamas voters; it will generate \$6.6 million in the first year. Clatsop also won approval, for a \$1,545,875 levy. Those schools whose levies were defeated will have 4 more opportunities this year to present them to voters, the earliest on May 19.

TUITION INCREASE APPROVED - The LCC Board of Education Wednesday night approved a tuition increase which will generate an additional quarter million dollars toward next year's budget if projected enrollments are met. The increases amount to 6.7% for in-district students, to \$176/term for full-time and \$16/credit hour for part-time; 7.7% for out-of-district students, to \$308/term for full-time and \$28/credit hour for part-time; and 9.4% for out-of-state and international students, to \$770/term full-time and \$66/credit hour for part-time. Non-credit adult education classes will also cost more; a standard 30-hour class goes from \$20 to \$22. The tuition increases, which go into effect in September, were approved 6-1 by the board, with Catherine Lauris dissenting. LCC's tuition rate remains in the mid-range among tuition rates for Oregon community colleges, which vary from a low of \$153 to a high of \$192 for in-district students.

HIRING FREEZE - A temporary freeze on new hires has been imposed by President Schafer, effective today. Following is President Schafer's message to the Board*regarding the freeze:

Because of the uncertainty of the level of future state funding and the almost certainty of reduced CETA funding, I have reluctantly advised the Board of Education that I would plan a temporary freeze on all new hires, effective April 10, 1981.

I have reached this conclusion based not so much on the current budget status but on the fact that we need additional resources during the 1981-83 biennium. Our present tax base will increase only 6 percent in 1982-83 and the outlook for any increase above the present state funding level is highly questionable.

With the full understanding that a blanket freeze might create an untenable condition for a service area, I will review emergency situations which may be referred to me by the deans.

I trust that the legislature will have determined our level of support by July 1, 1981, thereby allowing us to finalize our 1981-82 budget and level of service. It is my intention to terminate the hiring freeze at the earliest appropriate date.

OTHER BOARD ACTION - At its Wednesday night meeting the LCC Board: (1) Approved revisions to the Criminal Justice program, including addition of two new courses, deletion of five non-major courses, and an increase from 3 to 6 credits for SFE; (2) Approved allocation of \$8,730 from Plant Funds to construct five more campus directories similar to the one at the west entrance, and an additional \$3,500 to complete a schematic design of the Forum Building as an aid in a proposed remodeling of that building; (3) confirmed new appointments on three advisory committees; (4) approved LCC's continuing the administration of the ACTION Senior Companion Program and its proposed budget (as fiscal agent); and (5) accepted the resignation of Bob Radcliff as Health & P.E. Department Head, to return to full-time teaching within that department effective September 4. The Board also awarded a bid for a chiller starter unit to Graybar Electric Company; for broadcast equipment and antennas for KLCC to Allied Broadcast Equipment; for 3 translators for KLCC to DYMA Engineering, and for an Exciter for KLCC to Broadcast Supply West. ECC SAYS ALL SHOULD SHARE IN CUTS - If it becomes necessary to cut Governor Atiyeh's recommended 1981-83 budget by 10%, then all segments of Oregon education ought to share equally in such cuts, says the Educational Coordinating Commission. If community college appropriations are reduced 10%, the ECC says much of that could be accomplished by eliminating state funding for adult self-improvement courses. The ECC also has recommended eliminating state reimbursement for any postsecondary (c.c. and Higher Ed) physical education course. The OCCA's position was that if appropriations are out, each community college board was best able to decide how to cope and budget adjustments should be left entirely to board judgment. A 10% cut translates into an ovariall budget cut of 3% for school districts, 4% for community colleges and 5% for Higher Ed. -- From OCCA News Digest, April 75, 1981
