INSTRUCTIONAL SPACE - More classrooms will be needed in the next few years to accommodate expected growth in enrollment, the LCC Board of Education was advised Wednesday night. President Eldon Schafer said it could cost some \$20 to \$25 million to build the needed facilities. A serial levy or bond issue may have to be considered for placement before voters as early as spring 1982. Paul Colvin, Facilities director, is to get a planning effort underway to determine space needs. Board members agreed that growth is likely and should be allowed. They left open the question of what kind of growth should be permitted and where it should be located. Decisions are expected as an information base is developed.



OUTSTANDING INSTRUCTOR - James Evans, accounting instructor, has been named LCC "Outstanding Instructor of the Year." Letters of nomination, from which the selection committee made its choice for the honor, were unanimous in describing him as an excellent teacher with a genuine concern for the welfare of his students. ATHLETES MORE LIKELY TO GRADUATE - A five-year study by the American College Testing Program, conducted at 46 NCCA member schools, shows that a greater percentage of athletes are graduating from college than non-athletes. The study shows that among male students who entered college in the fall of 1975, 52 percent of the athletes had graduated by the spring of 1980; the graduation rate for non-athletes was 41.5 percent.

OCE NAME CHANGED - Gov. Atiyeh has signed legislation that changes the name of Oregon College of Education in Monmouth to Western Oregon State College. The legislation is effective immediately. Gerald Leinwand, college president, said the new name more accurately describes the college's broad range of liberal arts and professional programs and its regional character. However, Leinwand emphasized that teacher education will continue to play a major role in the college's curricula.

BUDGET PROPOSED - An operating budget of nearly \$24 million was proposed by President Schafer to the college's budget committee Wednesday night. The proposed budget represents a spending increase of just under 5 percent for the year starting July 1, and provides for some 9,200 FTE students, about the same as this year. Revenues would come about a third from state support, another third from property taxes, and the other third from tuition and miscellaneous sources. The committee will meet again May 20 to continue budget deliberations.

BOARD ACTION - At its Wednesday night meeting, the LCC Board: (1) approved the addition of a new 2-credit course in Chinese Cooking; (2) authorized the sale of 8 vehicles from the Mechanics Dept. which are no longer needed; (3) approved allocation of \$3,000 from Plant Funds for architectural consultation for long-range facility planning; (4) authorized the establishment of administrative procedures to sell the Construction Technology project house at 492 E. 53rd; and approved a short-term loan to the Construction Technology project from Plant Construction funds, to be repaid in full upon sale of the above-mentioned property, to be used to begin construction of a house at 25th & Chambers; (5) postponed action on a proposed merger of the ABE/HSC/ESL unit with the Greater Credit Faculty; (6) approved the awarding of full tuition LCC scholarships to one senior in each of 23 area high schools, and 7 scholarships to LCC High School Completion students yet to be named, for the 1981-82 academic year. The Board also took the following personnel actions: approved the appointment of Mary Lou Lynch, Eugene, as a part-time nursing instructor; approved the appointment of Martin Magallenanes from Ventura C.C. in California as full-time Diesel/Tech instructor at the Siuslaw Center; approved the appointment of Albert Rowe, Cottage Grove, as full-time welding instructor; approved the appointment of Gary Russell, Eugene, as full-time math instructor; and accepted with regret the retirement resignation of Bill Riley, Mass Communication, effective at the end of the current academic year.

PRODUCTIVITY - In the interest of increasing our understanding of productivity, the Staff Development Office is showing "Productivity: The Self-Fulfilling Prophecy." This 30-minute film introduces the concept that believing a certain outcome will affect that outcome. Many examples are offered of how a negative attitude may influence a large course of events such as public attitude during the Great Depression. The film shows other examples of how the productivity of people is influenced through both verbal and non-verbal communication. An excellent film for managers and supervisors! This showing is at 3:30 Tuesday, May 12, in the Boardroom.

APPOINTED - President Schafer announces the appointment of Mathematics Department Head Casey Fast as the College's director of productivity. Casey takes office officially on July 1 to serve a one-year term. While on leave from the Math Department, he will be replaced by an acting head, who will be named later. In what will be probably the first productivity directorship in education, Casey says his pioneering efforts will involve much work with staff working at "front-line" levels. "Our basic thrust will be to have the front-line people, classified and faculty, tell us how to be more productive, more effective, how to produce higher quality education," Casey said. "I hope people don't think this is just another bureaucratic thing; we want to train and organize our people so they will control what happens in their particular work situation."

SPOTLIGHT ON CASEY FAST - A fourth generation Oregonian, Casey was born in Dallas 38 years ago and raised in such western Oregon towns as Gresham, Amity and Molalla. He earned a B.S. in secondary education and mathematics at Portland State University, graduating in 1965. Two years later he received a M.S. in mathematics from the University of Oregon. In 1967-68 he was director of education at Willamette Christian Center in Eugene while also teaching part-time in the LCC Math Dept. He joined the College staff full-time in 1968 and became department head in 1975. He has been active in dramatically increasing Math Department productivity and promoting math through such activities as the Math Skills Fair, Einstein birthday party, and burial of the English system of measurement. He is active in the Oregon Council for Teachers of Mathematics and served as executive vice president in 1977-79. He presently is publicity chairman for the National Council of Supervisors of Mathematics. Since 1979, he has traveled across the nation as a speaker and consultant in marketing for Johnson Associates of Chicago. He has done post-degree work in management, computer science, and curriculum development at such institutions as University of California at Irvine, Western Washington University at Bellingham, and the University of Oregon.

LEGISLATION - This week's OCCA Legislative Digest reports that the budget picture is beginning to look bleak at the Oregon Legislature. House Revenue Committee Chairman Bill Grannell says legislative mail is running 20-to-l against any tax increases. The Revenue Committee began hearings last week on the tax measures necessary to raise an additional \$236 million (latest revised estimate) in revenue for the biennium beginning July l. The "new" revenue forecast (the one legislators have said they would wait for before beginning to make any decisions), will be unveiled Tuesday. The Ways & Means subcommittees holding budget hearings have developed contingency budgets for each state agency and for aid to local governments (which includes community colleges). These budgets are at least 10% less than the budget amounts suggested by the Governor....Governor Atiyeh has signed into law OCCA's first legislation of the current session, HB 2606, which says that a person cannot be simultaneously an employee of a college and a member of its board of education. The bill was guided through the legislature by its chief sponsor, Rep. Barbara Roberts, a member of Mt. Hood's board.
