LEVIES AROUND THE STATE - Last Tuesday, Blue Mountain and Chemeketa community colleges received approval for their 81-82 local property tax levies. Southwestern lost its A and B ballot proposals, and Treasure Valley lost its A-ballot proposal. Central Oregon also lost a B-ballot proposal. Blue Mountain was making its second attempt with just an A-ballot. Chemeketa had lost A and B ballot proposals in March but came back with an A-ballot only this time. Central Oregon got an A-ballot approved in March but lost its B and came back this time with just the B. Treasure Valley and SWOCC were on the ballot this month for their first try.





BOARD MEETING - Most of last Wednesday's Board of Education meeting was devoted to housekeeping matters, making the highlight of the session for many the wit of Chairman Ed Cooper of Veneta. Receiving some good-natured joshing from others about the brisk way he was moving the meeting along, Ed quipped: "If God had been in favor of democratic management, He would have had the 'Ten Suggestions.'"

Some 116 members of the Part-Time Credit Faculty Union won a 2-year agreement which gives them a 13.5 percent pay hike over last year and next year. They had worked the past year without a contract. Eligible members will receive a bonus payment in lieu of retroactive pay. Some members become eligible for the PERS pickup. Those teaching more than 5 credit hours per term may be eligible for insurance coverage up to \$38 per month. The package will cost the College about \$35,000 per year. Board members voted 5-1 for the agreement. Les Hendrickson voted no, explaining that the contract would give the part-timers a pay schedule which is highest among Oregon part-timers and probably highest among those in Washington and California as well. Larry Perry said he was pleased to recognize employees who previously "had not received the most minimal of benefits."

OTHER BOARD ACTION - At its June 10 meeting, the LCC Board also: Postponed once again the proposed merger of ABE/HSC/ESL with the greater credit faculty unit (LCCEA) until a decision is received on the issue from the Employment Relations Board....Received a quarterly report for spring term, 1981, on Lane County Employment & Training-sponsored students, from Mary Jane Eastman, LCC/CETA liaison. Spring term enrollment figures for E&T students show a leveling off, after a period of decline from 1979-80, with 158 enrolled spring term, an increase of 14 students over the previous term....Authorized the sale of surplus equipment by the Mechanics Dept....Authorized the College administration to enter into an agreement with Clear Lumber Co. to permit access across College property. The lumber company was hired by Northwest Christian College to remove timber on NCC property located south & west of the LCC campus. The agreement with Clear Lumber Co. will benefit the College in that the lumber company will create an access road across 127 acres of LCC property to be used by the Forestry Program project in timber management....Approved a number of new and revised programs and courses....Took the following actions on personnel matters: (1) approved the appointment of Barbara Mathewson as Administrative Secretary for DIS at .51 FTE; (2) approved the appointment of Mary Seereiter as dance instructor; (3) approved the appointment of Bev Behrman as Assoc. Coord. of Women's Program at .5 FTE; (4) accepted the resignation of Eileen Massey, MOA coordinator; (5) approved one-year leaves of absence without pay, beginning with the 1981-82 academic year, for Barbara Myrick, Performing Arts, and Ted Romoser, Language Arts....Confirmed the appointment of Real Estate Advisory Committee members and RSVP Advisory Council members....Awarded the bid for energy conservation improvements to the Auto Tech and Machine Tech bldgs. to L&M Sheet Metal, Inc.

APPOINTED - Dean of Instruction Gerry Rasmussen has been appointed to the Oregon Commission for Public Broadcasting, an 11-member advisory and policy-setting body for state-owned and operated radio and TV stations. The appointment came from State Senator Fred Hurd. Dean Rasmussen's involvement with OEPBS began when the television broadcasting program was being established at LCC.

50 YEARS AGO - On Monday, June 15, 1931, President Herbert Hoover was speaking in Indianapolis as part of his reelection campaign; bookings on tourist ships to London were down 50 percent; New York Gov. GIFT RECEIVED - Development Fund Director Lyle Swetland announces receipt of \$25,000 to endow the Herb Person scholarship. Interest from the invested gift will be used to provide tuition and fees for in-district students preparing for careers in business. Those to receive the aid are to be chosen by the chair and two faculty members in the Business Department. Person is a Eugene businessman who serves on the Development Fund Board of Trustees.

TONIGHT - The LCC Board of Education will meet in a special session at 7 p.m. in the Concord Room, Rodeway Inn, to discuss 1980-81 budget transfers. Following the formal, single-item agenda meeting, the Board will meet with Dr. Donald Murray and one of his associates for an overview of the Quality Circle concept as part of the Productivity Center for LCC.

FINANCIAL PICTURE GOOD - A College financial report through April 30, prepared by Dean of Administrative Services Bill Berry, shows the College in healthy financial shape through the first 10 months of the fiscal year. Berry cites tuition and fees from higher-than-anticipated enrollments, net working capital, and high interest earnings as factors responsible for offsetting the resource shortfall in State reimbursement support. The report projects an in-the-black year-end fiscal situation.

LONG TERM NOT SO GOOD - Proposals are being considered by the legislature that may limit the share of the cut below the Governor's budget to as little as 3% for higher education and none for basic schools, but leave community college's vulnerable to a full 10% cut, says Roger Bassett, OCCA Exec. Secretary. Unless property tax relief is cut, a move unpopular with legislators, it seems unlikely that community colleges will avoid the 10% cut, he warns.
