LCC AT THE OTHER FAIR - LCC's Energy Research Group, made up of students in the energy management program, will be part of a special project at the Oregon Country Fair this week, July 10-12. The project is titled, "Oregon Energy Horizons," and will feature demonstrations of innovative technology in the field of renewable energy. A thermo-siphon water heater and window box solar collectors built by LCC students will be among the exhibits. A passive solar slide show, an electric car, a woodburning truck, a greenhouse yurt, and an alcohol still are also among the demonstrations planned, says ERG member Fred Mallery. Mallery will demonstrate the electric car on the Eugene mall tomorrow and Thursday to help promote the Fair and the Oregon Energy Horizons project. The Fair will be held at Kesey Park, near Veneta.

IN THE NEWS - An interview with Facilities Director Paul Colvin appeared last month in Energy User's News, a national publication out of New York City. The interview concerned LCC's recent grant award from the U.S. Dept. of Energy for energy conservation projects in the Auto Tech and Machine Tech buildings, and also touched on LCC's past successes with energy conservation measures.

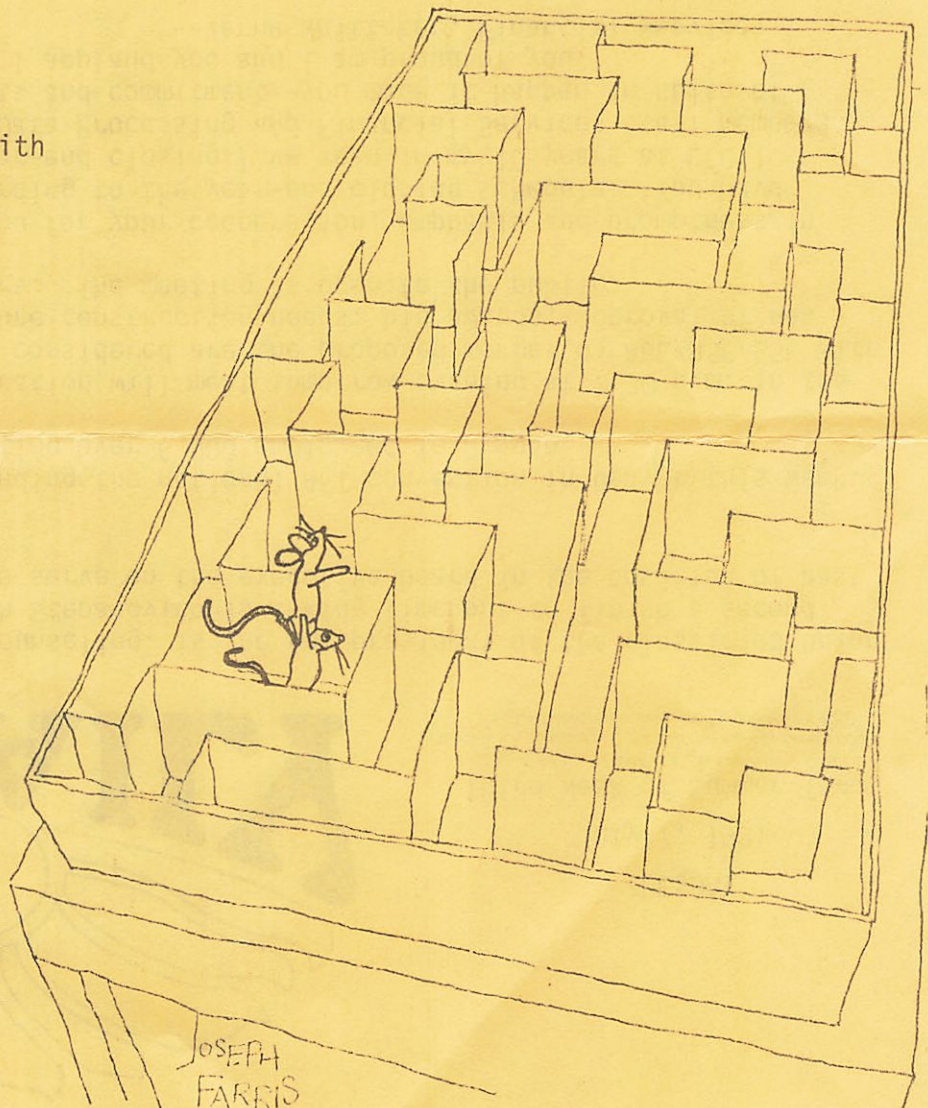



NEW BUILDING - Picture a new, small building containing about 10 classrooms, just south of the Forum Building. It's a possibility; the College Board of Education told the Administration at last week's Board meeting to study the matter and report back. It is estimated that such a structure could cost about \$650,000 and LCC already has state allocations on hand to pay for it. Remodeling existing space was discussed, then rejected when it was found that new construction could be had for about a third less money. The additional classrooms would relieve crowding resulting from continuing enrollment growth. In other business, the Board reelected its officers to second one-year terms. Ed Cooper of Veneta continues as chair and Charlene Curry of Springfield as vice chair. Dean of Administrative Services Bill Berry reported a cash carry-forward of \$1.5 million to apply toward future needs. Consideration of the proposed merger of the ABE/HSC/ESL union with the LCCEA was again postponed, this time to await results of a union appeal of an Employment Relations Board finding that the two groups lack a community of interest to justify a merger.

SBM NEWS - Bill Dotson and Bill Tweedie, Small Business Management instructors, recently attended the National Conference of Small Business Management Instructors in Cincinnati, Ohio. Bill Dotson is the vice president and president-elect of the National Small Business Management Association. Both Dotson and Tweedie presented papers at the conference. Next year the conference will be held for the first time in Oregon, at Portland, June 21-24, 1982. Dotson and Tweedie are assisting in the conference planning.

PERSONNEL ACTIONS - At its July 8 meeting, the LCC Board approved the following appointments: Constance Cole as A&AD instructor and CWE coordinator; Mark Alan Johnson as Flight Technology instructor; Mary Koons as Nursing instructor; John H. Nelson as Math instructor; Thomas Reimer as Acting Department Head, Math Department; John Shirey as Data Processing instructor; and Isidro Suarez as Agricultural and Industrial Equipment Repair instructor. The Board also accepted the resignation of Dee Smith, Home Ec instructor, and approved a one-year leave of absence without pay for Dave Croft, Social Science. Dave will pursue his studies in Asian languages, history and culture, and expects to live in Asia next year.

ELECTED - Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts, program evaluator in the Office of Instruction, was elected recently to chair the Occupational Program Planning System (OPPS) Subcommittee of the Oregon Occupational Information Coordinating Committee (OOICC). As chair, Julie will work with OPPS staff to develop agendas for and conduct meetings and will serve as subcommittee spokesperson.

PROMISING - A specially modified Industrial Orientation program for academically disadvantaged students, designed by Leslie Razor of Special Training Programs, has been chosen for inclusion in the 1981 "promising practices" handbook. The handbook, published through Oregon State University, is a compilation of exemplary state-funded programs. Jim Lawson and Hal Davis are instructors in the program.

EL SALVADOR - A Brown Bag presentation on El Salvador, sponsored by the Campus Ministry, is scheduled for Wednesday, July 15, at noon in 310 Forum. A 28-minute film by Mary Knoll will be shown, followed by a brief talk by Ray Eschevarria, a Latin America expert.

DOWN TIME - The Data Processing Department will be upgrading their computer system this Thursday and Friday; consequently, there will be no computer use on those days.

NO SCHEDULE CHANGES - Due to the computer system shut down, no schedule changes or other registration can be processed by Admissions on Thursday and Friday of this week. The Admissions and Student Records offices will close at 2:30 on Thursday; regular hours resume on Friday.

APPRECIATION - Elizabeth Walton, Eugene, is a former LCC student (1977-79) who dropped out of 10th grade in 1965. In 1977, she attended a reentry workshop given by MARGIE HOLLAND, and Walton, who graduated Phi Beta Kappa from the University of Oregon this spring, says, "I cannot overemphasize the value of the encouragement and inspiration (Margie) gave me in making the decision to return to school. I had never considered college as one of my alternatives. Margie gave me the confidence I needed to make this decision." Walton praises the liberal arts curriculum at LCC as "every bit as valuable as its vocational portion" and asks that the quality of neither portion be sacrificed in time of financial crisis....A thank you to Associate Dean JIM ELLISON from Sheldon High counselor Wendy Mitchell, for his participation in the Awards for Excellence Assembly at Sheldon....Bill Boie, counselor at Monroe Union High School in Monroe, and Bob Griggs, Pleasant Hill High School counselor, write to thank President Schafer and the College for the full-tuition scholarships awarded each year to high school seniors in the district....Denise Dirks, LCC student and business manager for the Lane Dance Theatre, writes Dean of Students Jack Carter in praise of dance instructor MARY SEEREITER. Dirks says "Mary Seereiter is one of the finest instructors in the field of dance. LCC is very lucky to have her as part of its staff."

STUDENT FOLLOW-UP - An Oregon Department of Education follow-up survey of students who left LCC in 1978-79, either as graduates or "early leavers," shows that 32% of the respondents were attending school full-time or part-time; 71% were working full-time or part-time; of those who were employed, 65% were working in jobs related to their training; of those who were continuing their education, 73% were studying in areas related to their LCC training. The study also revealed that more male respondents (35%) than females were attending school, but fewer males (73%) than females (77%) were studying in related areas. Slightly more males (72%) than females (70%) were employed, but significantly fewer males (57%) than females (74%) were employed in jobs related to their training. The median monthly income for males (\$900-\$1199) was higher than the median monthly income for females (\$700-799).




