

TAKE ME OUT TO THE BALLGAME - See the Eugene Ems take on Medford next Monday night for free. Tickets to the Kids Night game are available at the Information Window just inside the Administration Building. They'll be given away on a first come, first served basis; so, hustle in.

HOW WE FARED - The Oregon Legislature appropriated \$100.7 million as the state's share of community college operating expenses for the 1981-82 and 1982-83 academic years. In addition, some \$2 million was earmarked for community colleges and put into the hands of the Legislative Emergency Board. However, that doesn't mean we'll get it. LCC will get \$8.2 million in each of the two years to educate 8,381 full-time equivalent students, according to information from the Oregon Community College Association. Getting the same amount in the second year requires reduced spending in the first year, so as to be able to accommodate normal inflation in the second year. Specific adjustments will be announced. Compared with other Oregon educational systems, community colleges didn't do so well. Public school systems got everything Gov. Atiyeh originally proposed - no cuts. The State System of Higher Education was cut 3.5 percent. Community colleges were cut 5.4 percent from the governor's original proposal. President Schafer characterizes it as "a maintenance biennium" for community colleges.

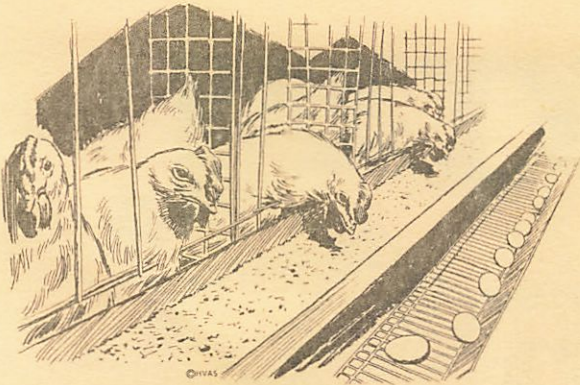



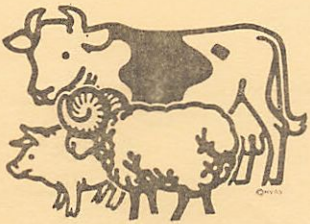

THE BOARD - The LCC Board of Education last Wednesday night hired an architect, gave President Schafer a \$5,000 raise, and approved a 10.26 percent increase in salary and fringe benefits for about 100 management employees. The Eugene firm of Balzhiser, Longwood, Smith, Paul & Associates will develop schematic plans for a proposed classroom building. The new building would cost about \$1 million and would be financed out of the college's construction reserve account. A final decision on the project will await completion of the plans. The president's salary increase includes a one-year extension of his contract through June 1983. The management pay hike includes a 6.53 percent increase in the basic salary schedule, a \$50 increase in the current \$100 monthly contribution to each employee's tax-sheltered annuity, and a 1.4 percent allowance for merit and equity adjustments made on an individual basis.

RESULTS - LCCEF delegates to the Oregon AFL-CIO convention are Gail Currin, Steve Lange and Sue Bayliss. Alternates are Mary Cudney, Audrey Razmus and Gladys Suire, thanks to a vote by the membership last week.

PILOT PROGRAM - Lane Community College will be one of 10 colleges participating this year in a nationwide program designed to train older people to own and operate small businesses. Sponsored by the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges, with funding from the federal Administration on Aging, the program is created for those 55 and older - and will include training in marketing, finance, business ownership skills, and operating a small business at home. LCC was awarded a \$10,000 grant to begin a pilot program this fall. It will be coordinated by Warner Wong through the Small Business Management office at the LCC Downtown Center.

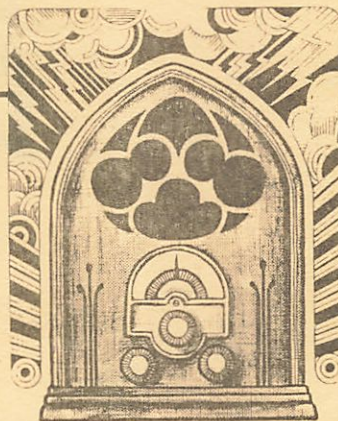

MORE BABIES - Oregon will have more students this fall for the first time in five years because of a dramatic increase in the number of births since 1973. In 1973, the number of Oregon births was 30,902, the lowest since 1946 - before the baby boom hit. But, since 1973, the number has increased about 1,500 every year, setting a new high with 43,091 in 1980. This all has come about because the number of women in their childbearing years (officially, 15-44) has increased by 39 percent since 1970. (from Oregon Department of Education's "Pipeline.")

RETENTION - One of the most widely recognized problems in community colleges is how to keep students in school. The June/July "Linkages" (available at the Staff Development office) takes a brief look at facts and figures on retention. Among the findings: Full-time students most frequently drop out because they are doing poorly academically. Though the dropout rate for returning women students is higher, these dropouts have higher than average GPAs - their retention is increased through peer-counseling, tutoring and "identity" centers. Most students drop out in the first six weeks of the semester. The student's undergraduate grade-point average has a stronger relationship to dropping out than any other single variable. Blacks in predominately white colleges drop out or stop out at significantly higher rates than whites or blacks in predominately black colleges. Student and faculty relationships are crucial.
