NEXT YEAR'S FUNDING BLEAK - This year's LCC budget appears adequate to serve at least 9,200 FTE students; though that could swell to 9,500,if they can be squeezed in. But, in the 1982-1983 year, the College could come up one or two million dollars short of enough money to simply duplicate this year's programs. That is the prediction of Dean Bill Berry and his financial aides, based on decreasing state support and continuing inflation. Board of Education members last Wednesday night talked about the possibility of asking local voters to make up the difference. A proposal to increase the tax base could be put on the May 18 primary ballot, or a levy outside the base could be placed on the June 29 (1982) ballot. To hold down the amount needed, the College will continue to tighten the belt this year, so that savings can be carried over for use next year.

INVESTMENTS - Investment earning for the College exceeded \$1 million for the 1980-81 fiscal year. The General Fund will receive nearly \$735,000 and the Plant Fund will receive the remaining \$300,000. Higher interest rates and a larger cash base to invest contributed to the increased savings, according to Bill Berry, dean of Administrative Services. He credits Bill Mansell, in Administrative Services, and Sue Bayliss, of Financial Services, with maintaining accurate cash flow reports which helped take advantage of daily investment opportunities.

SAFETY - LCC's safey record improved during the 1980-81 year with 44 accidents and a total cost of \$32,314 - about half the 1979-80 cost. A stronger accident prevention effort by most of the college's high-risk areas was responsible for keeping on-the-job accident costs to an acceptable level, according to Bill Mansell.

KLCC RATINGS - In a memo to President Eldon G. Schafer, KLCC Station Manager Jon Schwartz noted that recently received Arbitron ratings for six weeks in April and May showed the radio station's audience growing. KLCC received a 10.6 cume rating - up from 7.2 six months earlier - which is the station's highest in its 14-year history. It is also one of the highest ratings recorded in the history of U.S. public radio. Translated into unduplicated listeners, the Arbitron ratings mean an estimated 24,200 area residents tune in at least once a week. With outlying areas counted in, the audience grows to 27,000.





Of those who are religious, 92 percent find their jobs interesting and 97 percent feel a sense of dedication. Religious people are five times more likely than non-religious people to be active in the community, and outvote non-religious people by three to two. HMMMM - Public schools and their principals and administrators are given higher grades for educating students than parents are for raising their children to be self-disciplined and responsible young people, according to the results of the 13th Annual Survey of the Public's Attitudes Toward the Public Schools conducted by the Gallup Poll. Respondents from cities with fewer than 50,000 persons have higher opinions of their public schools than do those from larger metropolitan areas. And, on a regional basis, people in the West rate their schools lower than do residents in the rest of the nation. Discipline continues to be the number-one problem facing public schools, according to respondents. Also of interest: While 82 percent of the white respondents felt the public schools have achieved equal educational opportunity for all races, only 60 percent of blacks saw the situation that way. By better than a two-to-one margin, the respondents opposed tenure for public school teachers. And 56 percent said public school teachers should not be able to strike - that is up from 48 percent saying no in 1975. The survey sampled 1,519 adults(18+) in May 1981. (October Edu-Gram, Oregon Dep't of Education)

ENROLLMENT NATIONWIDE GROWS - Enrollment in U.S. community, junior and technical colleges will top five million this fall for the first time, according to the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges. A 5.5 percent enrollment increase is expected over last year's total, and four million people will be enrolled in non-credit courses at colleges nationwide. Association President Dale Parnell says it is customary that "during times of economic recession, community and technical colleges enrollments increase." (AP Wire)
