SIX PRINCIPLES - The Legislature's committee searching for a new funding formula should base its allocations for community colleges on six principles. That is the recommendation of the Community College Operating Budget Advisory Committee to the Educational Coordinating Commission, which is doing a study for the Legislature. Any new funding formula should: 1) continue to ensure the comprehensive role of community colleges; 2) recognize local autonomy; 3) continue the partner relationship between tuition and local and state taxes; 4) reverse the current trend of forcing a greater burden on the local taxpayer; 5) maintain an opportunity for open access; and 6) be simple and straight-forward for calculation purposes. President Arthur Binnie of Chemeketa chairs the committee.

LCCEA RATIFIES CONTRACT - With a 169-6 vote, the faculty union has ratified the College's contract offer. Almost 97 percent of those voting approved the proposed agreement, which will run through June 30, 1983. The LCC Board of Education will discuss the proposed contract agreement Wednesday night. It would provide for a 5 percent raise in salary for the first half of this year, 6 percent for the second half of the year, and an amount equal to the Portland Consumer Price Index less one percent for next year, according to Employment Relations Director Hank Douda. Other benefits: Five inservice days will be moved from the start of the year to days scheduled by departments during the rest of the year. Professional development money will increase from \$30,000 to \$50,000 this year and to \$60,000 next year. Faculty can receive up to 85 percent of regular pay when on leave. The association selected Plan II of the OEA Choice Insurance Plan by a vote of 141 to 29. (Eighty-three percent voted for Plan II and 17 percent for Plan I.) Insurance benefits will jump from \$114 a month to \$125 this year, and \$135 next year. Those taking early retirement will be paid \$250 a month from ages 60 to 62. Early retirees will get hospital and medical benefits from age 60 until they are eligible for Medicare coverage. The contract also offers an explanation of criteria for workload changes. Outside the contract, there is agreement that a joint salary schedule committee of three faculty and two administrators will be formed to study a possible change from four levels in the pay scale to one extended level. GETTING CLOSE - Giving to United Way by members of the LCC Employees Federation and other classified staff reached \$2,442 Thursday. That's from 100 individuals and only \$124 short of topping the Federation's all-time high. In other business, the board gave architects the go-ahead to proceed into the design development phase for a seven-classroom building to be built between the Science and Forum buildings on the south edge of campus. Some members of the audience suggested consideration of solar options for the new building; the architects agreed to meet with interested people to discuss solar, but cautioned this approach may not prove cost-effective for this structure. The building is to be ready for September 1982 classes. Board members agreed to make a decision in mid-January regarding the possibility of skipping a funding election next spring. Meanwhile, the administration is to reduce spending where possible in order to create a large cash carry-forward to pay next year's bills. A residence built by Construction Technology students at 492 E. 53rd, Eugene, was ordered sold for \$100,000.

YEA, CLASSIFIED! - Volunteer leaders of the countywide United Way campaign responded with a round of applause Thursday noon when told that the LCCEF and other classified employees have given 2½ times last year's donations to United Way. In fact, classified people are reported by United Way leader Sue Kangas (ABE, ext. 2518) to be within about \$40 of topping their previous all-time high. Thursday's luncheon, held at Farwest Federal's community room, included reports that indicate that the most faithful givers are those who staff the agencies which distribute the United Way gifts, because they see the needs first-hand. Voluntary Action Center is at 220 percent of last year's giving, the United Way office at 205 percent, and the Red Cross staff at 134 percent. District 4J teachers are reported at about 105 percent of last year and pledged to double that in 1982. Emergency relief is the big emphasis this year, with needs estimated at \$2.3 million. Some \$1.2 million was collected last year.
