Academic probation will be conferred on all but first-term students according to established criteria. 1. Grade point average - any one of the following: A. Cumulative GPA under 1.70 and between five and 29 credits of A, B, C, D, F, P and N grades. B. Cumulative GPA under 2.00 and 30 or more credits of A, B, C, D, F, P and N grades. C. Term GPA under 2.00 and fewer than five earned credits for the term. 2. Course completion: Completion of less than half of fourth-week enrollment, and fewer than five earned credits for the term. Auditors are not included. 3. Transcript review: A manual review of computer-printed records for all of 1 and 2 above. Those identified as actually being on Academic Probation are sent a letter, no later than the first week of the following term, notifying them of their status. First-term students will receive an Academic Warning letter when they fall "behind" in course completion and grades; other students will receive an Academic Probation letter. Both sets of students are encouraged to seek the help available at LCC. Students will be removed from probationary status when they achieve a term GPA of 2.00 and completion of 10 credits if full-time, or 80 percent of enrollment if part-time, the next term they register for LCC classes. 

EMPLOYEES RATE COMPANIES - The Opinion Research Corp. analyzed how employees rate companies. Some of their findings: Overall, favorable attitudes of middle managers are down. There is a "Hierarchy Gap" between the attitudes of managers, and clerical and hourly wage employees. Few managers - and even fewer clerical and hourly wage employees - feel their companies make promotions fairly. There is little relation between employees' educational backgrounds and their attitudes toward work. Among managers, men have more favorable attitudes toward their jobs than do women. Among hourly wage employees, the opposite is true. Among clerical employees, there is no clearcut pattern. (From Staff Development)

LOANS COMING THROUGH - The Federal Reserve Board reversed itself on the student loan issue Thursday. That means the 450-500 LCC students who are counting on Guaranteed Student Loans through First Interstate and U.S. National banks should receive their loans sooner than later. Frances Howard, LCC financial aid director, says her office has been notified that loan checks will be in the banks next week. It could be Nov. 30 before the checks are processed and mailed to LCC for students to pick up, according to at least one bank's spokesperson. The loan hangup came when two federal agencies disagreed over how the banks should comply with the Truth in Lending Act in imposing a new 5 percent loan origination fee. The Federal Reserve Board's present stance means banks won't have to notify students in writing of the origination fee until 1982.

FACULTY PAY - The method of paying contracted faculty has been modified only for the 1981-82 contract year. According to the negotiated agreement, faculty on a ten-month pay plan will receive five equal paychecks calculated according to Salary Schedule A and five equal paychecks according to Schedule B. He is beginning to direct more money into high yield U.S. government securities and less into time certificates of deposit. He recently purchased a U.S. Treasury bill for \$466,112 (it will yield \$500,000 at maturity).at 14.46 percent for a six-month period. This yield should prove favorable because rates are expected to drop.

RETIRING - John M. Phillips, who has headed the College forestry program since 1965 and who was at Eugene Technical-Vocational School for three years before that, will retire Jan. 1. Phillips, 62, says he will "work my own tree farm" near Veneta for income and firewood. He also hops to stay with LCC as a part-timer, managing the College forest and teaching.
