Also given high ranking by students, faculty, administrators, trustees, and community groups are intellectual orientation and developmental/remedial programs. Equal access, however, is not in the top five on the SHOULD BE list of any group. Students are especially interested in personal development and in counseling and advising; administrators are interested in effective management; and trustees are concerned about accountability. 

It's now \$29,700. With the social security tax rate also going up to 6.7 percent (now 6.65 percent) next year, an individual earning \$32,400 or more next year will have to pay \$2,170.80 in social security tax, or \$195.75 more than this year's maximum tax of \$1,975.05. The employer will be paying an equal amount.



CUTS SHAPING UP - The numbers are gradually becoming more refined as LCC readies for the impending cut in state funding. Dean Bill Berry told the Board of Education Wednesday night that the total impact could range from \$741,400 to \$3.4 million. The FTE (full-time equivalency) cut could range from 671 to 2,685. The real numbers await the Legislature's session, which begins Jan. 11. A tuition increase of \$1-2 a credit hour was discussed Wednesday night, as was a surcharge of \$5-10. Those at the board meeting also talked about possibly reducing part-time classified staff by 50 percent to save \$220,000 and part-time faculty to save \$800,000. Reducing staffing levels to 1978-79 levels, when 8,500 FTE students were served, could save about \$1 million. All options will be kept open until the amount of the cut is learned. The existing freeze on all avoidable spending will continue. In an effort to soften the cuts, the Board asked the Administration to prepare a resolution to the Legislature urging action to increase state revenues.

NEW APPOINTEES - The Board of Education Wednesday appointed two new people to the College Budget Committee. They are Bob Jeremiah of Cottage Grove and Gary Straube of Juntion City. Holdover members are Lester Zook of Springfield, Dean VanLeuven of Veneta and three Eugeneans - Alexander Stalowitz, Annette Crawford and Edna Wooten. The budgeting process begins after the first of the year and ends with adoption at mid-year.



HONOR - Bill Porter, an LCC Cooperative Work Experience coordinator, has been named by the Air Force Office of Special Investigations as the nation's outstanding mobilization augmentee. Porter, a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force Reserves, has served the OSI as a special agent for the last 14 years. He recently returned from a classified overseas duty tour involving anti-terrorist activities. Porter will be guest of honor at a special awards banquet in Washington, D.C., this spring.

SUPPORT AT SALEM - State Superintendent of Public Instruction Verne A. Duncan came out strongly in support of community colleges in a Dec. 11 statement to the state Board of Education. He said: "Our community colleges are in danger of jeopardizing the very mission for which they were created. The substantial drop in the level of state support for these colleges has resulted in the elimination of many of the programs which are most important to local communities; those programs which help the unemployed get retrained for new occupations and programs which help people upgrade their skills to become more productive workers. These cuts have also reduced the flexibility of community colleges to respond to the needs of the business and industrial communities as they seek skilled workers for new plants and plant expansions. The recent cutbacks in enrollments and the tuition increases at the state's four-year colleges and universities are forcing many students to complete their lower level collegiate work at community colleges. This in turn places demands on community colleges to provide more college transfer courses which eventually will detract from vocationally oriented programs. I don't want to see our community colleges become the equivalent of junior colleges. They have so much more to offer and the vocational and self-help aspects are too important to lose. I suggest that further cutbacks in community college support may help the state with a short-term problem, but will contribute to prolonging the economic depression in this state by assuring the continued unemployment of unskilled workers, even while positions remain vacant in industry for want of adequately trained workers. These cutbacks will also discourage tax paying, job providing industries from locating or expaning in Oregon. The long-term consequences are too severe to accept the short-term benefits." Duncan suggested that fundraising alternatives be considered.

YOUR RESPONSE - The Oregon Legislature will meet in a special session Jan. 11 to act on the state's budget crisis. You can reach area legislators then at the Capitol Building, Salem 97310. 

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES - "You can fool all of the people some of the time, and some of the people all of the time, but not all of the people all of the time." American higher education is finding - to its sorrow - the truth of Barnum's dictim. In our efforts to be all things to all people - all of the time - we (and I mean college teachers and administrators) have made so many promises that we cannot keep and played so many games with the facts that we have undermined our own credibility. It is, therefore, high time that we take a hearty dose of reality therapy, to prevent further damage and further confusion caused by our inability to distinguish between what we would like to be able to do, and what we actually can do. Four "immodest" proposals: First: Stop telling prospective students how wonderful they are, how much more mature and aware they are than the generations which preceded them. Start telling them that they are neither better nor worse, but just as confused and unprepared. If anything, not as well prepared because they have not yet learned that there is no Royal Road to Geometry - or anything else - and the value of anything is directly proportional to the effort required to get it. This means that we will not offer students college courses for college credit for doing high school level work. We will not teach literature in English or any other language until we are sure that the student has mastered the basic structures and the basic vocabulary of the language. Second: Stop telling enrolled students that they have mastered the material of a given course when, in fact, they have not. This has two implications: (1) that we will give C's for minimum competency and F's for anything less. Grade inflation is lying, and sooner or later, the person lied to will hate the liar; (2) that we will determine carefully the minimum content and skills required for the completion of each course. We will not water down of simplify content when we see students struggling to achieve the minimum. Third: Stop telling parents, and the community at large, that we are teaching skills for living or values to make students moral. We do not educate the "whole person" and never have. This is the worst lie of all. People learn how to live by living, and they acquire an ethic by patterning themselves on the people with whom they live. We can enlarge the number of patterns available to them by our own example, and by the example of the historic or fictional people about whom we teach. That is all - and that is a lot - but not enough to warrant the inflated claims we have made and are still making. Fourth: Stop telling anyone that we prepare students to be successful at making a living. We don't - and never have. We offer a credential - a diploma - which has become a sort of union card for getting various kinds of work. Once our ex-students have started that work, their success or failure depends upon a range of personal characteristics which we have influenced only minimally. One of these characteristics - the ability to distinguish the difference between the ideal and the possible, and act accordingly - we are clearly not expert in ourselves. Which brings us back to where we started - telling the truth. The best education we can provide is one based on truth, and initiating such education requires that educators tell it. -- Margaret Dietmann, assistant vice president for academic affairs, Iona College, New Rochelle, N.Y.
