SELCO MEMBERS - Some members have expressed dissatisfaction with long waits at the credit union. Herewith, a reply from Counter Supervisor Shirley Dick: "We are aware of certain times when the wait is long at the counter and drive-up windows. Most of the LCC members are involved with the 'crunch' which we experience the last day of each month due to pay day for LCC, Eugene and several other districts. In regard to the drive-up window, we have finally been able to convince management that we need one lane converted to EXPRESS in order to accommodate people with single transactions. In reference to the teller talking to another teller while transacting business for a member, it may or may not have been justified. Other employees do contact tellers about members' accounts. I have also seen the drive-up window teller handle a telephone transfer, while waiting on members through the drive-up window. I am sure this could be misinterpreted." 

LATE REGISTRATION - Late registration, held in the lobby of the main gym, continues this week - ending at 2:30 p.m. Friday. After Friday, any registration takes place in the Admissions Office and requires the permission of each instructor and the admissions director. Students may change their term schedules during regular registration hours. All changes must be processed through the registration facility and the Financial Services Office on the same day. Beginning with the second week of classes, the registration facility is in the Admissions Office. To add classes after the first week of classes - that is, starting with next week - instructor consent and department stamp are required. Classes dropped after the second week will require a department stamp and may be dropped through the seventh week with no record appearing on the transcript. For more information about registration, schedule changes and other student facts, consult the winter term class schedule.

FACULTY - All LCC Education Association faculty employees with insurance residues must contact an annuity or deferred compensation sales agent to set up a new contract for the period beginning Nov. 1, 1981. Today's annuity sign-up session has been cancelled. Sign-up sessions have been rescheduled for both Monday and Tuesday, Jan. 11-12, from 2:30 to 4 p.m. Representatives from all participating companies have been invited to campus both days, and will be stationed in the northeast corner of the Foodservices area.

INSURANCE - Brian Wenzl, the faculty OEA insurance representative, will be on campus in the Personnel Services Office from 8-11 a.m. Friday.

PRODUCTIVITY IDEA - An item tucked into the November 1981 issue of the American Management Association Management Review suggested that smoking bans and other workplace action could save employers money. Submitted by Business Department Head Jack Kreitz, the item follows.

For each smoker on the payroll, an employer loses about \$4,789 annually. This was the finding of a recent study. Included in the figure is the cost of absenteeism (about \$220 per year), additional medical care (\$230 per year), and on-the-job time lost (\$1,820!). The study by William Weis of Seattle University and Dr. C. Patric Fleenor found that, in addition to monetary savings, smoking bans improve employee morale. The programs studied ranged from simple "no smoking" bans to sophisticated incentive programs with pay increases and health club membership and elimination of sick leave in exchange for extended vacations.



ART RECEPTION - Sculptor Dan Dykes will be honored tonight with a reception in the LCC Art Gallery. Dykes, who studied at the College in the early 1970s, is showing an exhibition of mostly cast bronze pieces at the gallery through Jan. 27. In May 1981, Dykes received the first award in sculpture in the Second Annual Bay Area Juried Show in San Francisco. 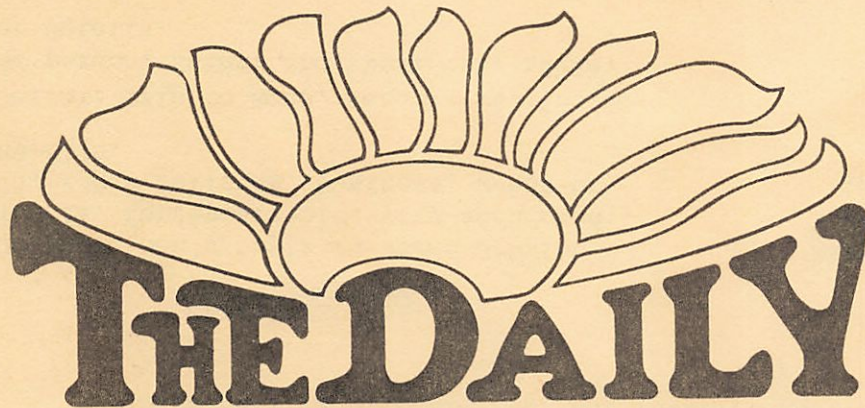

SECOND LOWEST - A comparison of 1980-81 state support per FTE (full-time equivalent) student in community colleges shows LCC as second lowest at \$830.91. The State Department of Education compiled the data to show that all the colleges serve more students than the number for which each is reimbursed. One can say that LCC, for example, served 1,445 FTE students beyond what the state reimbursed us for last year. Or, one can divide the reimbursement by the FTE served and get a much lower state cost per FTE than is generally realized. That's the basis of the \$830.91 figure. Only Linn-Benton was lower, at \$789.84. Highest was Treasure Valley at \$1,146.83. Including costs from all sources, LCC has for years held its cost per FTE in the bottom two of all public and private colleges and universities in Oregon.

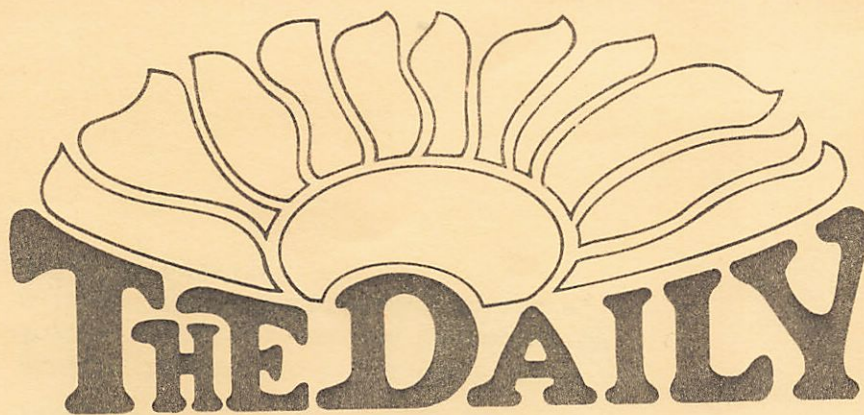

TODAY...

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TUITION HIKE - A proposal to increase College income by \$94,500 this year through tuition increases starting spring term will be considered by the LCC Board of Education Wednesday night. Credit tuition would go up \$1 per credit hour, Community Education by \$3 per class, and High School Completion by \$7 per class. The board will meet at 7:30 in room 216, Administration Building. Also on the evening's agenda: rezoning the College District to conform with population changes reflected in the 1980 census, discussions of the College funding situation and election options, postponement of the proposed new classroom building on the main campus, and various staff reports, personnel and housekeeping matters. The session is open to the public.

THE PASS - Students can still purchase the special-rate LTD bus pass. For the price of two months' ridership, LCC students can obtain a three-month pass. The fee should be paid at Financial Services by Friday, Jan. 15.

PATIENCE - Staff and students who were passed by at the LTD bus stops Monday should find space on buses today. LTD was to add another bus to the run today and has promised to reschedule more later. The crunch happened because the ASLCC bus pass program has been much more successful than anticipated. It was expected that 400 passes would be sold; more than 600 have been purchased.

MICROCOMPUTER USE - LCC has 71 microcomputers in use - 56 in instruction and 15 in instructional support areas. According to a report prepared by Jim Keizur, Data Processing, for the LCC Board of Education, there are 30 in the Data Processing Lab, 12 in the Social Science Lab, nine in the Math Lab, four in the Science Department, two in the Business Department, and one each in 14 other departments.

TAX COLLECTIONS SLOW - Because some people are postponing the payment of their property taxes, LCC's income through Nov. 30 was down \$134,000 from earlier projections. High investment returns in money markets have made it possible for some people to realize profit above penalties for late tax payments.

STATE SUPPORT DROPPING - In 1971, the state supplied 48.7 percent of community college costs. This year, it's 32.5 percent, before the impending cutback. A 5 percent cut would drop it to 30.8 percent, a 10 percent cut to 29 percent. If the Legislature decided to cut LCC 5 percent, we'll lose \$634,358; if 10 percent, \$1,268,716. Tuition losses caused by enrollment reduction would be additional losses.

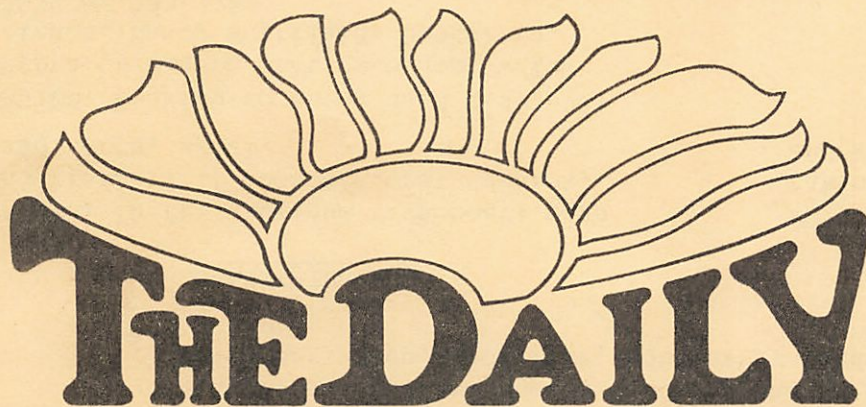

AMERICANS POLLED - A September 1981 Gallup Poll showed that 63 percent of adults believe the cost of community college education is reasonable - regardless of opinion on quality. More than half, 54 percent, view the quality of instruction as good - regardless of opinion on cost. For those who could go back to school, the main reason would be personal enrichment for 45 percent. Seventeen percent would go back to help themselves move up in their jobs; 15 percent would go back to get a new job. Seven percent of the respondents would return to school to work toward a bachelor's degree. (AACJC Letter, No. 12, Dec. 28, 1981)

LEGISLATIVE NEWS - Governor Vic Atiyeh is proposing to solve the state's budget shortfall by cutting \$143.5 million in spending and raising \$98.5 in revenues. Community colleges and most other general fund-supported agencies would lose 10 percent of the money remaining in their appropriations as of Jan. 1. The Legislature's Ways & Means Committee leadership has adopted a preliminary target of 5 percent cuts in all agency budgets. Members will have to convince House and Senate colleagues to cover the difference by approving revenue increases beyond those proposed by Atiyeh. The 1982 Special Session is set to begin Monday in Salem. (Oregon Community College Association Legislative Digest, Jan. 8, 1982)

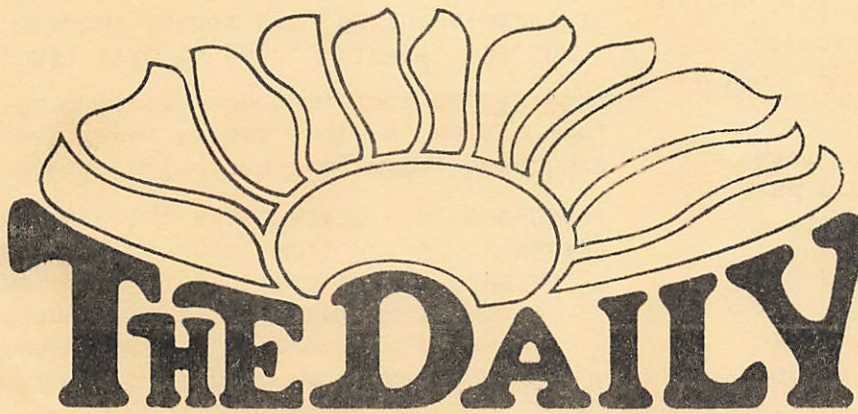

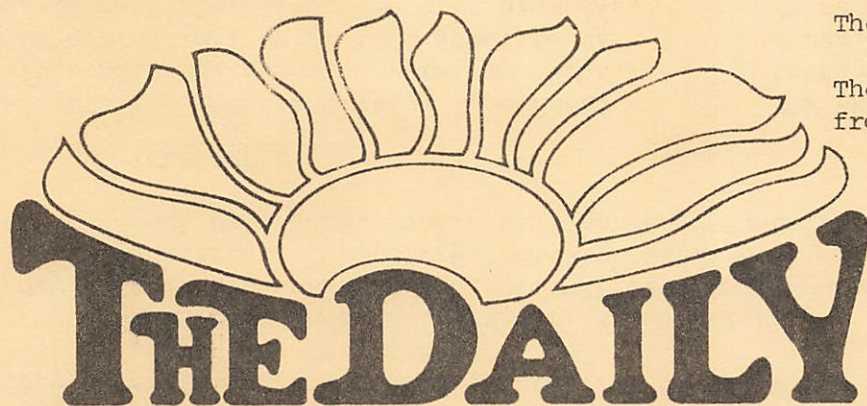

INSURANCE - Brian Wenzl, the OEA insurance representative, will be in the Personnel Services Office today from 8 a.m. to noon, to answer faculty insurance questions.

LTD PASSES - Today's the last day for LCC students to purchase the special-rate LTD bus passes at Financial Services. The pass, good for three months, costs only \$32 - the cost for a regular two-month pass. This great deal already has attracted 720 buyers, more than twice the number LTD expected.

TUITION RAISED - A spring term only hike in tuition is expected to raise about \$90,000 in additional revenue to partially offset impending cuts in state support. The LCC Board of Education on Wednesday night approved a \$1 per credit hour increase (6 percent), a \$3 per class increase in noncredit classes (14 percent), and a \$3 per class increase in high school completion courses (13 percent). After the amount and impact of the state cuts are learned, the Board will consider whether to continue the new rates or raise them further for next year.

OTHER BOARD BUSINESS - Wednesday night, the LCC Board of Education was advised that the Forest Service has extended the College's use of Heceta House on the coast for another five years. The Springfield News will print the 1982-83 catalog for \$13,513. North Coast Electric of Eugene will change 183 grounds and parking lights from mercury vapor to high pressure sodium for \$25,850; the Eugene Water and Electric Board will pay the bill in the interest of energy conservation. The Board agreed no funding election should be scheduled at this time. Bids will be sought on the next remodeling phase of the Downtown Center, with the work to be done next summer. Construction of the proposed new classroom building on the main campus will be postponed until the College's revenue picture brightens.

AMUSING FUNDRAISER - The Automatic Cigarette Service of Eugene won the right to install electronic video amusement games in the gym lobby. The company will pay an annual fee amounting to about \$18,000. That income will be administered by Dean of Students Jack Carter and used for travel by students to competitive events in athletics, performance, debate and other activities. The Board split on the issue, with Larry Perry, Charlene Curry and Catherine Lauris voting to keep the machines off campus.

ELECTIONS - An election to fill two positions on the Board will be held March 30. Seats held by Catherine Lauris, Zone 5, and Les Hendrickson, at large, will be filled. Candidates must live in the area they wish to represent. To get their names on the ballot, they must either 1) pick up a nominating petition from the Elections Department after Feb. 5, gather signatures of 25 registered voters who reside in the zone - 50 signatures for the at-large position - and return the petition to Elections by 5 p.m. Feb. 24 or 2) go to Elections and pay a \$10 filing fee. Winners take office for four years, beginning July 1. The positions are unpaid.



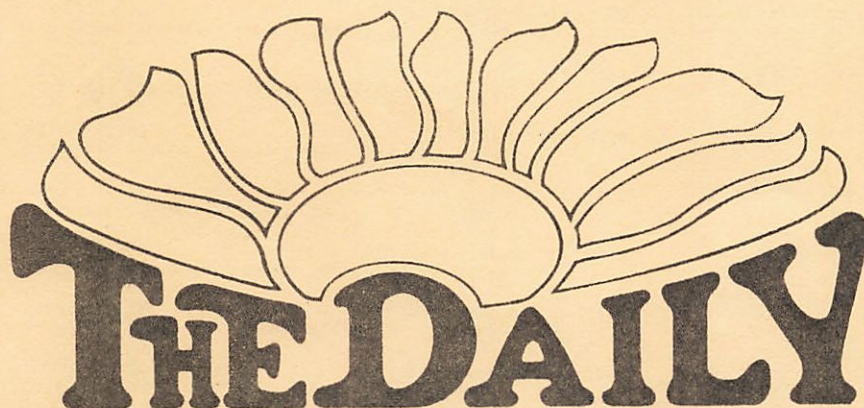



WHAT'S YOUR ECONOMIC IMPACT? - Lane and other Oregon community colleges are conducting surveys to determine what the existence of each college means economically to individual districts and the state. As part of LCC's study, 761 employees are being surveyed this week. Staff members are asked to estimate the percentages of their take-home pay that are spent inside the district and inside Oregon. That's all it is - nothing really personal or potentially embarrassing, and all done anonymously. The answers will be part of a larger study intended to show the public, particularly legislators, how important the College is to the community economically. Your department head will get a copy of the three-question survey to you. Please fill it out and return it by Thursday to your department head. Thanks for helping show our constituents that we're giving back to them economically as well as through our other services.

GRILLED THE DEANS - For those who missed the Wednesday session with the deans, here are some highlights, as reported by Vern Ho, Staff Development:

- grading: An instructor suggests the need for teachers having an opportunity to make recommendations on grading policies. Sometimes a grading procedure reflects the computer system more than instructional concerns. The Instructional Council was suggested as the forum for further discussion.

- economic outlook: The view is grim. Deans Berry, Rasmussen and Carter foresee reduced financial aid and federally funded programs such as CETA, and deferred tax payments to the College.

- summer school study: Several questions were asked about the study done by the Office of Instruction.

- computers: There is lively interest in developing a computer network at LCC. One suggestion was that the College consider computerizing course information for registration. A manager asked about obtaining on-line information at time of need rather than 30 days later.

Many more ideas and suggestions were generated during the hour-long session. The next such event is scheduled for spring term.



The contract, approved by 95 percent of those voting, would last until Aug. 31, 1983. The LCC Board of Education is slated to consider the proposed contract at its Feb. 10 meeting.

THE NEWS ABOUT ABE FUNDING - Local adult basic education programs that have provided access to necessary basic skills for thousands of Oregonians (and millions of Americans) face large cuts in fiscal year 1983. President Reagan's budget proposes nationwide funding of \$49,505,000 - down from about \$100,000,000. Oregon's share would be about \$472,000, a cut of more than 50 percent. ABE also is scheduled to go into block grants with vocational education and could be affected by federal law which requires at least 80 percent of block-grant funds go to local education districts - school districts which serve elementary and secondary students (not community college students). Bob Clausen with the state Department of Education is urging that those concerned - especially students and former students - write Sen. Bob Packwood and other congressional representatives. - The best managers set people-oriented goals, and are concerned with building trust and long-term productivity rather than winning the game and advancing their careers.
- Humanizing work will be the dominant management model of the decade.
- Herzberg's studies found employees turned on by achievement, recognition, advancement and growth, and turned off by poor supervision.
- Increased productivity is as much a matter of psychology as technology.
- People will carry out decisions they participate in making.
- People will do those things for which they are rewarded or compensated.
- People will do a better job when they have better jobs to do.
- People don't live to work; they work to live. Therefore, workplaces must offer the qualities employees are accustomed to in personal life.
- If employees are treated as children, they may act that way.
- Employers who seek workers find that human beings come instead.
- Emphasize people as well as tasks.
- Make workers full citizens, involved in all decisions that directly affect them.

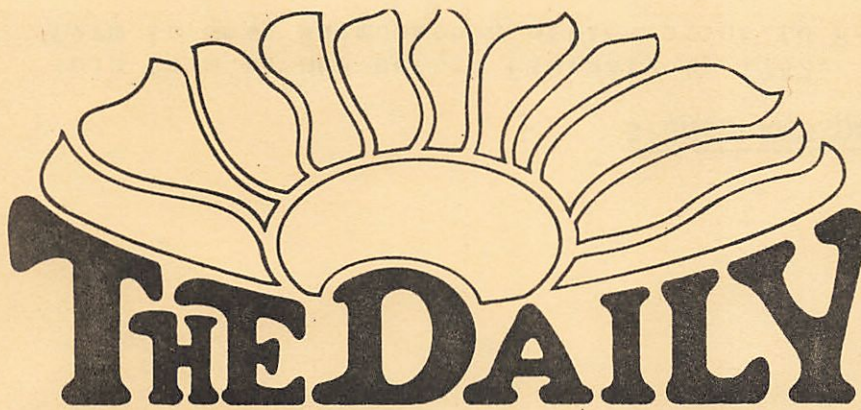

BUDGET SCHEDULE - The College's budget proposal for the fiscal year beginning July 1 is scheduled to be reviewed by the Budget Committee on April 28 and May 5, 12 and 21, if all those meetings are needed. A public hearing is to be held June 9. Budget Committee members are expected to divide into subcommittees to review portions of the whole budget in the weeks prior to the first meeting of the whole committee in April.

ENROLLMENT UP - Third week enrollment figures for winter term confirm earlier indications of a surge in credit students. The number of full-time equivalent students is up 90 to 2,064; headcount is up 206. Full-time students number 334 more than a year ago. On the other hand, part-time totals are down 128 people, and evening students are down 136 people. Departments gaining the most FTE are: Business, 33; Data Processing, 22; Mathematics, 21; Mechanics, 11; and Performing Arts, 10.

EVERYTHING IS COMPARATIVE - If you think LCC's budget cuts have been rough, consider what has happened at Southwestern Oregon Community College in Coos Bay. This school, which is less than a sixth the size of LCC, has had to lop the budget (so far) by \$833,000, cut faculty/administrative raises by half, assign advising to faculty on top of full-time loads, lay off 155 part-time faculty, eliminate journalism, eliminate a foreign language, eliminate four women's and four men's sports, revoke senior citizens' tuition waivers, cut 300 classes from the fall term schedule, stop spending for capital items, defer hiring of six instructors, and reassign some administrators to instruction. For next year, a wage freeze is proposed.



WASHINGTON EMERGENCY - Reprinted from the Jan. 25 Oregonian: "SEATTLE (AP) - The state Board for Community College Education has unanimously approved a declaration of financial emergency through the two-year college system. The action is effective immediately through June 30, 1983. It was taken Friday despite strong objections of faculty organizations. It gives the state's 27 community colleges the option to lay off tenured faculty swiftly to cope with budget cuts. In November, the Legislature adopted the reduction-in-force procedure for tenured teachers. Al Brisbois, president of the Washington Federation of Teachers, said his organization intended to monitor how the law was applied on every campus. He added his federation "will fight it in the courts if necessary."


