"DOWN WITH PROPERTY TAXES - The Community Press in Salem says that Jim Whittenburg, who is identified only as a 'state lobbyist,' pland to file an initiative to eliminate property taxes for retired senior citizens and deferring them for young families who are buying their first homes. To prevent overburdening those in between, he would limit property taxes to two or three percent of the assessed value. Further, property taxes couldn't be increased more than two or three percent annually. He would have to get 61,646 valid signatures on petitions by July 7 to get the measure on the Nov. 7 ballot. Comment: Whittenburg doesn't offer an alternative means to raise monies to substitute for the property tax. Tuition might have to be raised out of sight. Meanwhile, he says getting the necessary signatures will be 'a piece of cake.'"

BOOK TALK - Tillie Olsen's "Tell Me a Riddle" will be discussed at noon today by the LCC Friends of the Library book club, which will meet in room 216, Library.

SHOP EARLY - The Bookstore will close at 3:30 p.m. today for a staff meeting.

EIGHT-WEEK SESSION - The LCC Board of Education settled by consensus the question of whether there will be a summer term this year. In its Wednesday night meeting, the board okayed summer session. Instead of 12 weeks, however, it will be eight weeks long - except for a few programs for which prior contracts require a full term. Trimming the length of the term should save at least \$25,000, says Dean of Instruction Gerald Rasmussen. A survey of students indicated that absence of summer term would be a hardship for those whose programs would be interrupted. In other business, the board approved a two-year contract, retroactive to last September, for about 40 High School Completion instructors. It calls for a 12.2 percent pay increase this year and a 10.6 percent increase next year. A resolution was adopted in honor of Social Science instructor George Alvergue in recognition of his nine years of "distinguished service" as advisor to LCC's chapter of Phi Theta Kappa.

OTHER BOARD ACTIONS - Mary Unruh of Eugene, a stockbroker for Foster and Marshall, was named to the College Budget Committee to succeed Annette Crawford, who moved to Corvallis. LCC joined the Lane Economic Foundation, using dues formerly paid to L-COG (Lane Council of Governments) to pay the \$1,000 fee. To minimize cost increases for electricity, electrical capacitors will be installed at a cost of \$8,000. Savings made possible by the capacitors should equal the cost within two years. Three Eugeneans won temporary faculty positions: Wallace H. Graham as winter-spring business instructor at the Downtown Center, Gary Sokolowski as winter term science instructor, and Betty J. Lowe as a 28-day CETA counselor during February and early March.

EXCELLENT ACCIDENT RECORD - The last six months of 1981 saw few on-the-job accidents for LCC staff. Only 19 accidents, costing \$2,696, occurred. Lifting accidents were the most frequent and costly. Instruction had 11 accidents, costing \$1,946 and Administrative Services had eight totalling \$750. Student Services and President's Complex had no accidents. LCC's fine accident prevention record has saved the College \$147,000 in insurance premiums over the past three years. The program is administered by Bill Mansell, assistant to the dean of Administrative Services.

PRODUCTIVITY - "To some people, productivity has come to mean working harder and faster, to produce cheaper products, of lower quality, in order to end up with a net profit at the expense of almost everything else....Productivity has a deeper meaning, and people want to be productive in this deeper sense." So said Tony Petrella in the 1980 Organizational Development Network National Conference. Petrella asserted productivity can mean making the most of limited resources, putting quality into products and finding excellence in one's work. In the Jan. 29 Innovation Abstracts, "Beyond Productivity to Quality," Harold L. Hodgkinson says higher education needs to evaluate students not on what they already know but on added value. "The major danger to higher education in the increased American concern with productivity is that we will once again imitate a standard that has been declared obsolete by other sectors of our society. What is needed, and possible, is assessment that is integrally linked to our work. It is a way of moving beyond head counts as our standard of productivity to a redefinition of quality that is integral to the mission and functions of higher education."

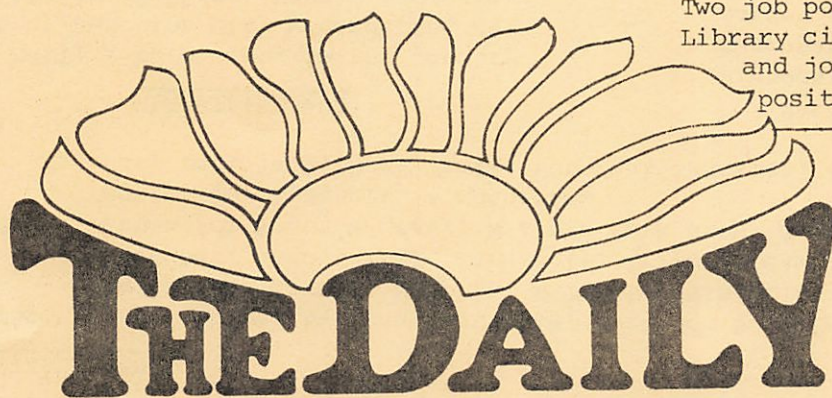

TITLE IX - There is movement in the U.S. Congress to narrow the scope and coverage of Title IX, the key provision of which reads: "No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving federal financial assistance." Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, has introduced S.1361, which would weaken Title IX through three major provisions: 1) Congress should exclude federal student aid funds from the present law's definition of federal financial assistance, restricting admissions coverage. 2) It narrows the law's definition of beneficiaries from "persons" to "students," eliminating coverage of employees. 3) It requires the specific program or activity in which the alleged discrimination exists to directly receive the federal funds in order to be covered by Title IX.
