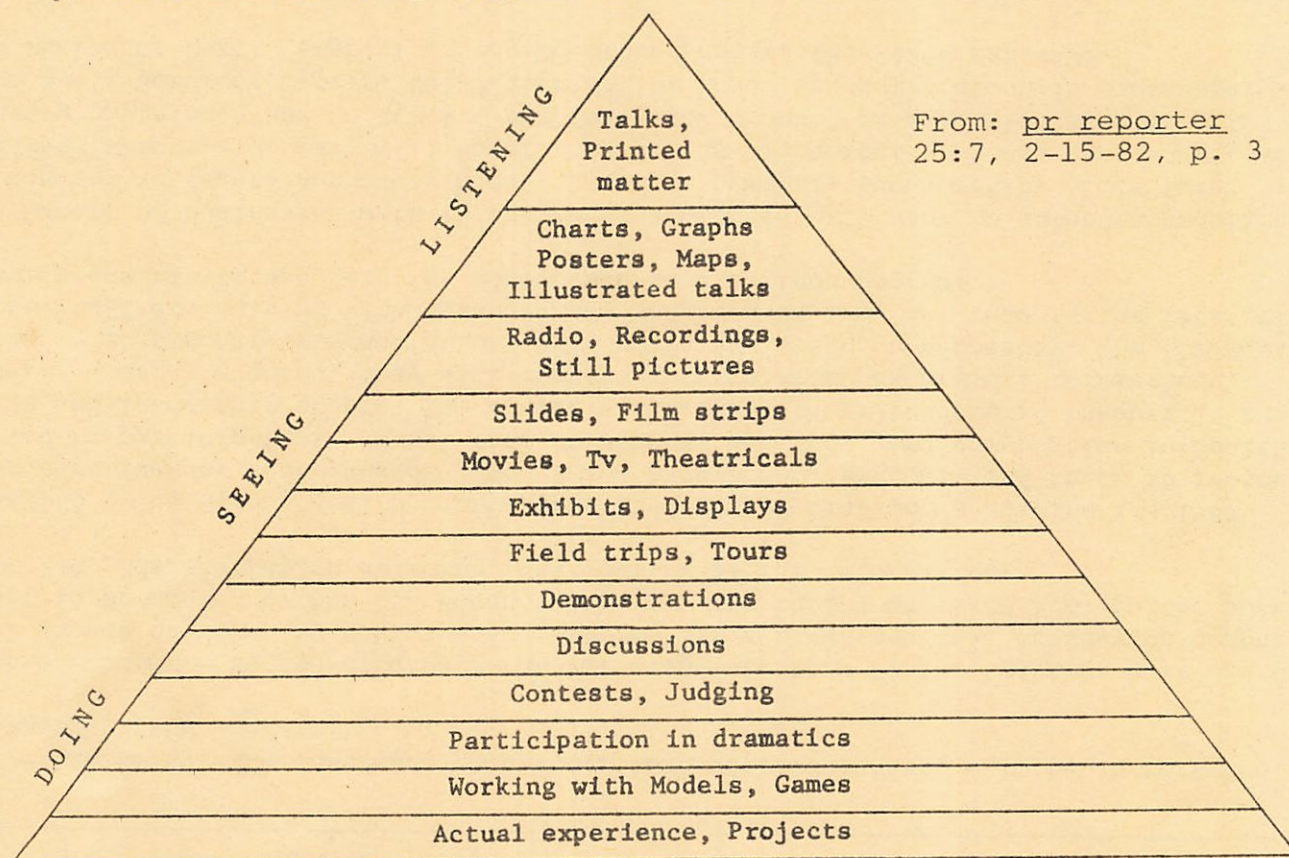

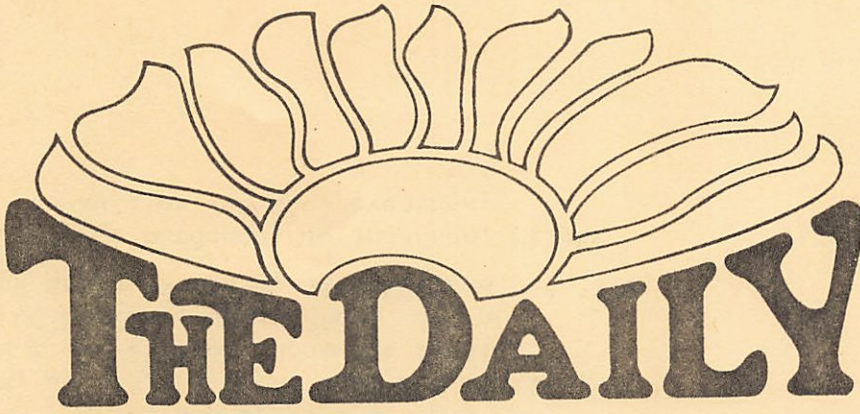

ON CAMPUS - High school students from Hillsboro, Roseburg, North Bend, Portland and elsewhere in the state are at LCC today for the 1982 Oregon Health Occupations Student Association conference. They are participating in educational workshops, competition and meetings. The students and their teachers will continue through Wednesday afternoon with the conference.

SPECIAL SESSION - When last heard from, the Oregon legislative special session was continuing its debate over revenue increases and state agency budget cuts. New cuts in major education budgets would lop about 9.1 percent of the 1982-83 allocation from community college operations. Basic school support would be cut about 4 percent and higher education would lose about 9.8 percent of its 1982-83 allocation. For LCC, the amount cut would total approximately \$767,811. Over the weekend, the Oregon House approved a bill to increase income taxes. The House and Senate must agree over the amount of income tax increases, property tax relief cuts and other budgetary matters before the special session is wrapped up. (information culled from Oregon Community College Association Legislative Digest, Feb. 25, 1982, and newspaper articles)

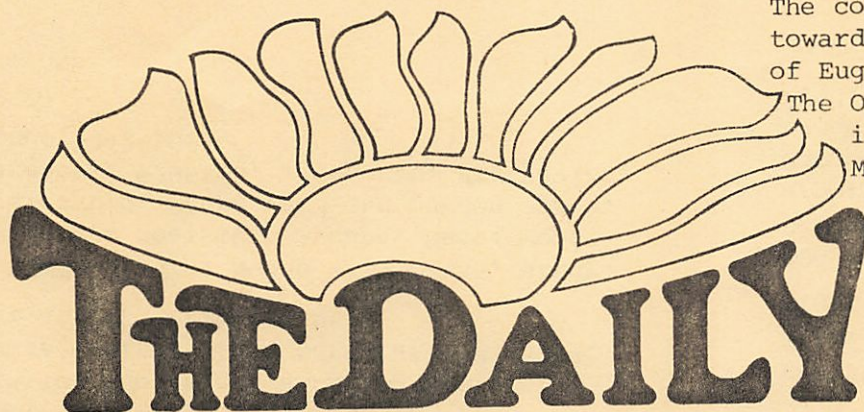

WOMEN AND ENGINEERING - Corvallis engineer Catherine Mater will speak this afternoon about opportunities in her field and what it's like being a woman engineer. Her presentation will begin at 2:30 in room 219, Center Building. The career talk is sponsored by the Career Information Center.

REDUCTION - The Legislature's reduction in state support will cost LCC \$767,811 in reimbursement for next year, 1982-83. Reimbursable FTE will drop from 8,601 this year to 7,788 next year. Support will drop from \$8.4 million this year to \$7.6 million next year. Statewide, community colleges will lose 4,867 FTE and \$4.6 million. At LCC, managers now are looking at possible cuts to offset the \$767,811 loss as part of the 1982-83 budget building process.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS - Nominees for LCC Instructor of the Year now are being accepted by the Office of Instruction. All LCC instructors, both full- and part-time, who have taught here for one year or more, are eligible for the award. LCC students and staff may submit nominations. Forms are available at all department offices and from the Office of Instruction. The deadline for nominations is Thursday, March 18, at 4 p.m. The recipient will be selected from nominees by a committee of previous winners, one associate dean, one department head, one instructor and one student. Winners from the past include Jim Evans of Business, 1980-81; Freeman Rowe of Science, 1979-80; and Jay Marston of Science, 1978-79. MORE ON COMMUNICATING - People learn more from actual experiences and projects than from talks and printed matter, according to the Cooperative Extension Service. A pyramid submitted by Larry Romine of College/Community Relations, and printed in Monday's Daily, shows that learning effectiveness increases as one moves from listening to seeing to doing. In response to Monday's communications lesson comes the following from Vern Ho, Staff Development, who obtained the information from OEA trainer John Stoecker: Considering a communication at 100 percent, 55 percent of the message is based on the sender's physical qualities, 38 percent on the sender's tone and 7 percent on the message's actual content. "Think about it as you receive a message from someone, and use it when you have to design a message to someone."





WOMEN - What is International Women's Day? On March 8, 1857, women from the garment and textile industry in New York staged a demonstration protesting low wages, the 12-hour workday and increasing workloads. They called for improved working conditions and equal pay for all working women. Their march was dispersed by police, some of them women were arrested, and some were trampled in the confusion. Three years later, these women formed their own union and again made their demands. On March 8, 1908, thousands of women from the needles trade industry demonstrated for the same demands. But this time, demands for legislation against child labor and for the right of women to vote were added to demands for shorter working days and better working conditions. In 1910, German labor leader Clara Zetkin proposed that March 8 be proclaimed International Women's Day in memory of those women who had struggled for better lives. During the next 60 years, March 8 was celebrated mostly in socialist countries. By 1967, groups in the United States had begun celebrating the day. And in 1970, thanks to the growing women's liberation movement, women in cities throughout the United States celebrated International Women's Day. In the past five years, the day has been widely celebrated by many women's groups. President Ronald Reagan has designated March 8-12 National Women's History Week to honor the contributions of American women to the history and development of the United States.

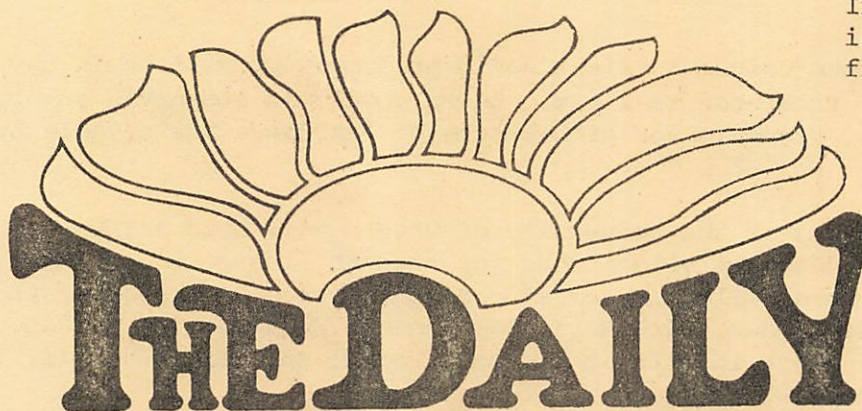

BOOKSTORE CLOSURES EARLY - The Bookstore will close at 3:30 this afternoon.

BOARD TALKS MONEY - Dollars dominated Wednesday night's LCC Board of Education meeting. The tuition hike, about 6 percent for credit students, that was approved January for spring term, will be extended through next year. Full-time, in-district students will pay \$187 a term, up \$11. Students over 62, who've in the past paid no tuition, will be charged \$10 per course. About 1,800 senior citizens take courses each year, mostly in adult education. The total tuition income next year is expected to increase nearly \$400,000 to \$4.3 million, from about 9,000 FTE students. That still leaves more than \$600,000 to make up in the preliminary \$1.1 million "out-of-balance condition" identified by Dean Bill Berry. Possible cuts in department budgets are being identified. No property tax levy election is scheduled this spring.

REMODELING AND CONSTRUCTION - The LCC Board of Education Wednesday night approved allocating \$299,188 from uncommitted construction funds to complete work at the Downtown Center. Part of that - \$197,568 - was awarded the Gale Roberts Co. of Eugene to remodel the mezzanine and front of the first floor of the Downtown Center. The work is slated for completion by September, and is Phase III of the Downtown Center project. Including purchase price, LCC has about \$2 million in the building - that's about one third of what it would cost to buy the land and build a new structure. Because the Phase III bid was about one third lower than was expected, the board approved calling for bids on building a new classroom building on the main campus. If a good price is received, and jobs can be generated, board members indicated they may vote to proceed with the project - which earlier had been tabled. It would exhaust state construction grants, which legally can be used only for building and not be applied toward operating expenses.

VENTILATION - The LCC Board okayed spending \$4,700 to modify the laundry exhaust and dental lab ventilation systems. Fume hoods to exhaust air in the dental lab will be improved; the laundry vent on the building roof will be extended upward to better dissipate the exhaust; more air will be blown into Home Economics offices to raise air pressure to keep fumes out.

RETIREMENT AHEAD - In the only personnel matter on the LCC Board's agenda Wednesday night, members unanimously rejected the resignation of Bert Dotson, assistant to the president. Dotson will retire July 3; the board's action was simply a way of saying members appreciate him. Dotson took a leave of absence from the Springfield School District in February 1964 to become executive secretary of the recently formed Lane County Community College Study Committee. Following a fall election, he became the college's first employee.

BUS PASSES AGAIN AVAILABLE - Spring term bus passes go on sale in the Bookstore Monday. The three-month Lane Transit District passes are available for the price of two months' of riding, \$32. Only those students paying the \$1.30 student body fee and displaying their schedules will be able to purchase passes. Students will not be able to use credit cards or financial aid awards; cash and check will be used. The passes are on sale at the Bookstore through April 7. The Associated Students of LCC and LTD are cooperating to bring this special deal to LCC students. The ASLCC will be surveying students as they purchase passes. More than 700 students bought the deal winter term. Bookstore hours March 15-18 will be 8 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.. On Friday, March 19, the Bookstore will be open from 8 until 4:30 p.m. The following Monday and Tuesday, March 22 and 23, the store will be open from 8 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.; on Wednesday and Thursday, it will be open until 5 p.m., and on Friday it will be open until 3:30 p.m. Regular hours resume Monday, March 29.

GRILL THE DEANS - The answers to all the college finance questions aren't available yet, but deans Berry, Carter and Rasmussen shared some known information with 38 staff in Wednesday's grill-the-deans session. Dean Bill Berry said he foresees a preliminary out-of-balance condition of \$1.1 million for next year. The administration is developing "decision packages" which might be implemented to balance the budget. A committee working through the Productivity Center is examining suggestions submitted to President Eldon G. Schafer for raising money and cutting expenses. And department administrators are preparing lists with 10 percent of their respective budgets cut. However, Dean Jack Carter stressed Wednesday that the administration is looking neither at 10 percent across-the-board cuts nor at 10 percent cuts from each department. Two major questions arose Wednesday: When will we know? What are the priorities? Dean Gerald Rasmussen said President Schafer wants the decision packages the week of March 29. Rasmussen added that more definitive information about the action the college can take should be available within a month. In a memorandum to the deans, and distributed to LCC board members, President Schafer outlined the following priorities for instructional programs: 1) vocational education, 2) developmental education, 3) community education related to economic development, 4) lower division credit classes, 5) community education enrichment and self-improvement classes, and 6) community services. About jobs, Rasmussen said in Wednesday's session, "I would hope at this point that no one would go out searching for jobs." He said while the college must have a responsible contingency fund, administrators are committed to the lowest possible contingency to save staff.

GRILL THE DEANS, CONTINUED - Dean Berry said Wednesday that the college budget for 1983-84 looks "a great deal worse to me, at least at this point." His initial estimates point up a possible \$5 million deficit. "We need to look beyond what we're going to do next year," he said. College funding depends mainly on three sources, Berry explained: local property taxes, tuition and fees, and state appropriations. Collections on local property taxes are running behind college projections. Every percentage point lost, according to Berry, costs the college almost \$100,000. The college budget is built on an 89 percent collection rate, Berry said. The county most recently has projected an 85 percent rate. At the end of Wednesday's grill-the-deans session, Rasmussen pointed out that LCC "is better off than most of the community colleges." He and the other deans pledged to make information available as they have it. The Wednesday session was sponsored by Staff Development.

AVIATION SEMINAR - LCC's Aviation Maintenance program is hosting a seminar today in the Aviation Maintenance Building. NO, YOU'RE NOT LOOKING THROUGH ROSE-COLORED GLASSES - Exterior lights, and soon all parking lot lights, are becoming an amber color. Through a grant from the Bonneville Power Administration coordinated by the Eugene Water & Electric Board, the lighting system is being changed to a high-pressure sodium one at no cost to the college. The grant pays for materials and part of the labor costs for installation. The new lights provide approximately one-third more light at half the cost of the old lights.

FACULTY RENEWAL - The Program for Faculty Renewal at Stanford University is sponsoring a two-week summer workshop from July 26 to Aug. 6. This year's workshop addresses "Theory and Practice in the Arts." Two nominees will be selected to participate, with the program covering the full cost of room and board in Stanford residence halls. More information is available in the Staff Development office, ext. 2260. The deadline for submitting nomination forms is April 1.

UO REQUIREMENTS - New requirements at the University of Oregon will affect students entering this fall with 30 credit hours and fewer. The requirements, which restrict the number of courses that satisfy group requirements, will apply to all students in fall 1985. According to UO Dean Robert Berdahl, "the changes endeavor to end the smorgasbord approach to general education that has dominated during the past decade or more...." No students now enrolled at LCC, who have taken their general education courses based on current requirements at the university, will be adversely affected by the changes, Berdahl says.

ENERGY JUNGLE - You can catch a public education program on energy this weekend at the Willamette Science and Technology Center. On Saturday and Sunday, at 2 and 4 p.m., "Energy Today and Tomorrow" will cover fuels and methods used for producing electricity, conservation, and possible ways to create energy in the future. The center is at 2300 Centennial Boulevard. Admission is charged.

EDUCATION AND MONEY - The following is culled from the February 1982 "Edu-Gram," from the Oregon Department of Education.

"Oregon school districts lost \$16.3 million and the state's community colleges lost \$4.7 million when the Legislature erased the state's \$313.7 million deficit in February.

"State support for community colleges this year is estimated at 35 percent. That level may not drop if colleges make large budget cuts, as expected. The state cut means that more than 15,000 Oregonians will lose community college services.

"State cuts aren't the only financial worries facing school districts and community colleges.

"If Congress approves President Reagan's recisions, schools and colleges will lose \$16.1 million in 1982-83. The cuts would lower the \$84 million received this year to \$67.9 million next year, a drop of nearly 20 percent.

"Vocational education dollars would be reduced from \$7.7 million to \$6.2 million, eliminating programs for 5,000 students in secondary schools and 14,000 students in community colleges.

"And adult education aid would drop from \$956,000 to \$803,000. Community colleges would eliminate basic education programs for about 3,000 adults."

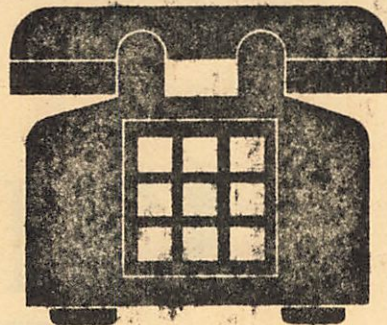

ATTENTION - State law does not prohibit public employees from participating in political activities, so long as such participation is not "during working hours." According to Oregon Revised Statutes 260.432, every public employer must conspicuously post the following:

"Attention to All Employees: The restrictions imposed by the law of the State of Oregon on your political activities are that: No public employee shall solicit any money, influence, service or other thing of value, or otherwise aid or promote any political committee for the nomination or election of any person to public office while on the job during working hours. However, nothing in this section is intended to restrict the right of a public employee to express his personal political views.

"It is therefore the policy of the State and your public employer that you may engage in political activity except to the extent prohibited by State law when on the job during working hours."

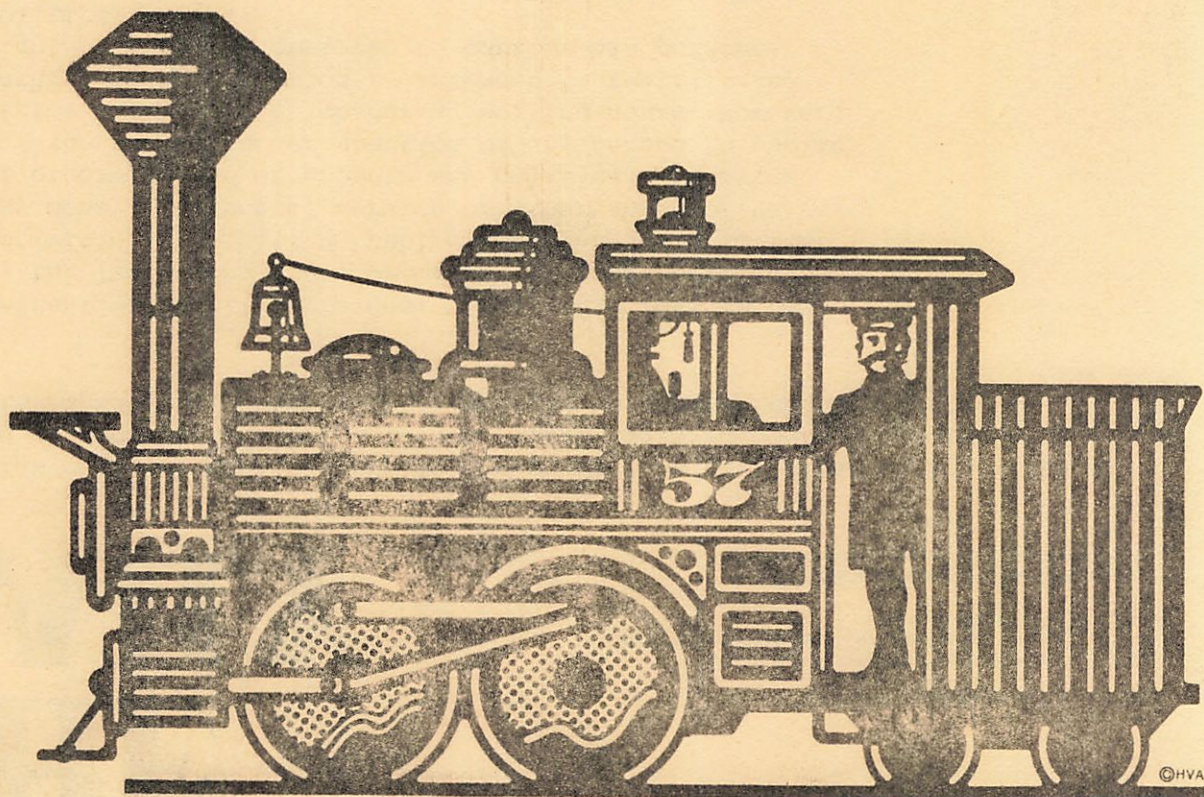
