STUDENT CHARACTERISTICS - Students enrolled in credit classes at Lane Community College have changed statistically over the last 10 years. Average age is up from 23 to 26, attendance by women is up 110 percent, and the minority student population is slightly larger in number. More attend part time, fewer full time, and the average course load is slightly lighter. These changes are noted in a report from LCC's Productivity Center. It focuses on students enrolled in credit programs from 1971-72 through 1980-81. Prepared by Sue Jordan, the report includes such highlights as the following: Students in the 62-and-over age group grew from eight in 1971-72 to 118 ten years later, for a 1,375 percent increase. More women than men attended LCC in 1980-81; in 1971-72, the reverse was true. In 1980-81, women accounted for 53 percent of LCC's students; in 1971-72, men made up 58.4 percent of LCC's students. Fewer students carried full-time loads in 1980-81 than in 1971-72. In 1971-72, 71.9 percent of LCC's credit students attended full time; ten years later, that percentage declined to 57.6.

Direct impact of LCC through salaries and student expenditures totals \$36 million. An equal amount is in circulation through indirect efforts of spending and respending, according to the study done for the Oregon Community College Association in Salem. Spending by LCC students in-state brings \$14.8 million to the economy, the report says. LCC staff spending adds \$11 million, and the college spends an additional \$10 million for supplies. LCC generates 884 full-time equivalent jobs, and another 4,118 jobs existed because of the money in circulation as a result of the college's existence. PUBLIC TALKS BACK - From the Oregon School Board Association's "Outlook & Review": "When the special legislative session cut property tax relief last month, observers predicted the reaction from voters would be resoundingly negative at the next special election. The predictions were correct: 72 percent of the school districts submitting money requests to voters in last week's election were turned down by the taxpayers. In March, 1981, 50 percent of the requests were approved. Oregon Department of Education figures show that 82 school levy requests were submitted last week: 59 failed and 23 passed. Of three ESDs requesting levies, one (Wallowa) was successful. All but one community college measure failed - Blue Mountain CC in Umatilla County passed its A ballot by 12 votes. The other 10 measures from that county failed. Success stories came from two counties: three Malheur districts submitted levy requests and all passed, four of five Wallowa County measures also passed. In Washington County all five school ballot measures failed and in Clackamas County all but one (West Linn) failed. The next election date is May 18." (April 5, 1982)

WAGES AND LAYOFFS - President Eldon G. Schafer says he prefers delayed or smaller pay increases next year in lieu of laying off staff or shutting the door to students. His suggestion drew mixed reactions from employee groups at Wednesday night's LCC Board of Education meeting. John Kocher, president of the LCC Education Association (faculty), said his group "does not, repeat NOT, intend to take any action which could lead to a pay rollback." Gail Currin, president of the LCC Employees Federation (classified), pointed to the budget-cutting process already underway. "All of a sudden it gets changed around, and we're told what we're all going to save if we don't take wage increases," she said. Classified bargaining for next year is about to begin; managers do not bargain but have indicated they will accept necessary reductions. LCC's board continued its quest Wednesday night for some place to cut \$1.1 million to even out revenues and expenditures in next year's budget. "I don't support it," the president said of decision packages developed by various departments. That approach calls for cutting FTE enrollment next year by 500 and laying off 75 to 80 employees. Included would be some six full-time classified, 2-25 part-time classified, two managers, two full-time faculty, and 40-50 part-time faculty. Schafer said a delay of 4½ months in implementing raises or holding raises to 5½ percent would erase the deficit. It would keep everybody employed, retain present quality, and allow open enrollment, the president said. "During a recession, unusual measures are necessary." The board probably will act on some type of budget adjustment at its May 12 meeting.

OTHER BOARD BUSINESS - As of July 1, LCC Foodservices no longer will be under the eyes of Mannings Inc. The LCC board agreed that a college employee should be hired to run the operation at an annual savings of \$20,000. Lon Mills was hired at a cost of \$7,500 to negotiate two union contracts which are open this year. LaDeane Pryor of MarStat Market Research & Analysis, Eugene, was appointed to the KLCC Advisory Commission. Violet Johnson was appointed to teach spring term in the Business Department. Resignations were accepted from Isidro Suarez, Mechanics, and Vern Ho, Staff Development.

LEAN SPENDING PLAN - A budget which calls for an increase of only \$186,088 above this year is being studied by the LCC Budget Committee for 1982-83. The administration presented a \$25,578,905 proposal to the committee Wednesday night. That's 3.2 percent above this year's budget. It would enable LCC to live within its tax base and avoid a spring funding election. The small increase was made possible because of this year's spending freeze, which is producing a cash carry forward of \$2.1 million. For the second year in a row, the budget includes no increase for materials and supplies to offset inflation. About 1,300 individuals could find classes unavailable to them. But staff jobs - for the most part - would be protected. Some 79 percent of the budget goes for payroll. President Schafer says the budget should enable LCC to "just get by" next year. The hitch comes the year after, when the revenue shortfall is projected to be \$4.5 million. Deliberations continue May 12, with Edna Wooten-Kolan as chairwoman, Jim Pitney as vice chairman, and Lester Zook as secretary.
