

SLASH - An LCC staff member walked through the logged area south of campus and discovered "lots of slash around." What, the person asks, is going to happen? Science Department head John Jacob's response to the official ANSWER questionnaire follows: "The part logged was by agreement with Northwest Christian College and a lumber company in Sweet Home, Oregon. The slash is to be removed and if not used for building; to be replanted within three to five years. Hospital employers encourage repiratory therapists to take the exam, Schubert says; but it is optional and there is no state licensure in effect.

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

LCCEA President John Kocher said the union declines, that the negotiated pay increase is reasonable. President Schafer proposes to carry savings into the 1983-84 year, where a \$3.5 million revenue shortage is projected. Kocher argues that the savings should be realized by cutting nonteaching functions.

All bids for building the proposed new classroom building were rejected as being much higher than expected.

Institutions of higher education are eligible to apply for supplemental funds, if they conduct programs of cooperative education that offer students alternating or parallel periods of academic study and public or private employment.

Compensatory Education Programs for Educationally Deprived Children: Apply for grants facilitating the transition of neglected or delinquent children from state-operated institutions to locally operated educational programs. Eligible applicants are state educational agencies and local educational agencies. Office of Human Development Services: Grant funds are available for research and demonstration projects for the Child Abuse and Neglect Program in fiscal year 1982. Cutoff date is July 19. The reasons for changing jobs and the reasons for staying differ. Money and pension plans are the most attractive reasons, according to the survey. Ninety-one percent of survey participants called "enjoying what I do" the most important reason for staying in their present jobs. Although 58 percent of survey participants said they would choose the same career if they were starting out again, 39 percent said they would not. "A" ballot losers were Scuthwestern, Central and Clatsop. Three of the colleges, however, got at least 48 percent yes votes: Chemeketa, Southwestern and Central. In Central's case, only 23 votes spelled the loss.
