TODAY ...

GRADUATION DAY - More than 900 students are graduating from LCC, according to Student Records. Their commencement exercise begins at 7:30 tonight, in the main gym. President Schafer is the featured speaker.

GOOD NEWS - The good news was followed by even better news about LCC's state funding. Earlier this week, word was received that Gov. Vic Atiyeh would ask the Legislature to cut only \$115,354 to offset the latest state revenue shortfall. Then, on Thursday morning, President Schafer was advised that the governor had reconsidered and now will ask no further cuts from state community colleges, beyond the cuts made last January (which cost LCC \$767,811). The other piece of good news is that local property tax collections have picked up in recent days to about 88 percent of taxes levied. That means LCC will get about \$240,000 more than we expected to collect this year. The windfalls probably will be used to offset needs in the 1983-84 fiscal year, when the college faces a crisis budget situation.

BUDGET APPROVED - The LCC Board of Education Wednesday night approved the 1982-83 budget, which has a general fund total of \$25,578,905. Other funds approved include special projects, with a \$3,325,080 total, and service units, with a \$724,219 total.

MORE BOARD BUSINESS - The LCC board approved Dean Bill Berry's request to allocate \$17,000 from contingency funds for a compressor unit on the heat recovery machine. The Dunham-Bush heat recovery machine is the nucleus of the energy management system. The machine provides the main source of heat for the campus throughout the year by recycling and reusing water from the boiler. It also heats the domestic hot water used during the warmer months of the year.

CONGRATULATIONS - Susan Watkins, Word Processing, has been installed as president of the Willamette Valley chapter of the International Word/Information Processing Association. She has been an active member of the organization for five years and will serve throughout 1982-83.

Projects are limited to \$20,000; \$77,761 is available. Eligibility depends on a high rate of youth unemployment or high dropout rate. The cutoff is July 6. Limited English Speaking Grant - \$31,836 is available. Funds may be used to pay for up to 50 percent of the cost of providing vocational skills instruction in the primary or native language of the limited English speaking. English as a Second Language instruction is not eligible. The cutoff is July 6.

Head Start Training and Technical Assistance: Applications will be accepted for the new statewide training and technical assistance grants to assist local Head Start grantees in the management and provision of services. Cutoff is July 1. Community Services Discretionary Authority: Support for ongoing activities of national and regional significance which help alleviate poverty in communities. About \$25 million is available. The cutoff is June 21.
