INNOVATION - If students should obtain part of their training working for the kinds of companies they eventually hope to join, what happens if a particular kind of business doesn't exist near the college? Well, Electronics instructor Joe Rawlings started a student-run company to provide on-the-job training industry couldn't. The Elsie Corporation (derived from the college's initials - LCC) designs and builds computers. The company builds one computer a year. Last year, the Elsie Corporation was composed of 20 students, each with a different title and job assisgnment. Students fill posts ranging from chief engineer to director of public relations/marketing. Rawlings says the company's latest effort, Elsie III, represents state-of-the-art technology. The system is capable of running a mill or factory by monitoring and controlling analog voltages throughout the plant.

TAX MEASURE MAKES BALLOT - Ballot Measure 3, a property tax limitation proposal, will appear on November's ballot. Its main points follow:

- Property taxes would be limited to 11/2 percent of 1979 true cash value.

- True cash value is allowed to increase 2 percent each year beginning Jan. 1, 1983.

The Legislature would decide how the new \$15/\$1,000 true cash value limit would be divided among community college districts and other local taxing districts.
District debt actually incurred before passage of the measure is excluded from the 1½ percent limitation.

- The $1\frac{1}{2}$ percent limitation may be exceeded if total revenues will be less than 85 percent of 1979-80 total revenues.

- Requires a 2/3 vote of the Legislature and/or a majority vote of the people to authorize any increases in state taxes.

- Requires all new (i.e., not yet sold) general obligation bond measures to come within $1\frac{1}{2}$ percent limit and to have majority voter approval.

- Prohibits new serial levies which would designate a portion of the property tax for a special purpose.

A CANCELLATION - President Eldon G. Schafer, whose visit to the People's Republic of China has been postponed, has company. Japanese Education Minister Heiji Ogawa also had his September visit postponed, because China believes Japan is minimizing its aggressions against China during the 1930s in its high school history books. President Schafer's visit as representative of U.S. community colleges was postponed because China apparently disagrees with the trip-sponsoring World Bank about the amount of money it must borrow to start its community college system. According to the Portland Oregonian, analysts attribute the current government stance on these and other issues to a nationalistic line that is part of the factional maneuvering in the Communist Party.

LBCC FACULTY TAKE CUT - Faculty at Linn-Benton Community College agreed to a 6 percent salary cut to avoid layoffs and encourage voter approval of a \$1.1 million operating levy at the Sept. 21 election. The Portland Oregonian reported Friday that a mail ballot showed a 91-30 favorable vote. The salary cut is contingent on passage of the levy and would save the college about \$251,000. Faculty will earn about 2.7 percent above last year, if the cut is imposed.

ELECTION TODAY - Lane County residents have an opportunity today to vote on a \$3-million county property tax levy. The one-year special levy would provide the county sheriff's office with slightly more than \$2 million to supplement its present \$7.6-million budget for the fiscal year that began July 1. The district attorney's office would receive about \$500,000, the Juvenile Department would get \$100,000 and slight more than \$300,000 is earmarked for taxes that cannot be collected. The levy would increase next year's property tax bill for Lane County residents by about 45 cents per \$1,000 assessed value, or \$22.80 for the owner of a \$50,000 home. Polling places are open until 8 p.m. today.

MORE COST SAVINGS - A Purchase Order verteam (a verteam is a quality circle with members from more than one department) is working toward identification of ways to cut the number of annual college purchase orders by at least 60 percent. Members found that 62 percent of the 8,147 purchase orders written in 1981-82 were for amounts under \$100. Put another way, 62 percent of the purchase orders involved only 3.5 percent of the total money spent. Since each purchase order costs around \$70 in total staff time to process, the group proposes that purchase orders under \$100 be eliminated in favor of petty cash use or - if it can be worked out - bank cards. Members of the group include Roger Cardinal, Purchasing; Verne Whittaker, Financial Services; Marianne Lindbloom, Math; Virginia Roles, Adult Education; Iris Pattle, Performing Arts; Thelma Kitterman, Financial Services; Judy Dresser, Home Economics and Health & P.E., and Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts and Casey Fast, Productivity Center.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS CHANGE - Beginning this fall, LCC students working toward associate of arts degrees will have some new graduation requirements. Students still will need six credit hours in English composition, but they'll now have to do at least C-level work in each class, according to Admissions Director Bob Marshall. The physical education requirement has been lowered from five to three credits which, both Marshall and President Schafer agree, will enable more students to meet the degree requirements. This physical education change also will reduce the hours spent by the Academic Council hearing petitions, and will bring LCC policies in line with practices at other institutions. Another change will allow students to fulfill Health Department requirements by taking community health or specific seminars; in the past, only a personal health class fulfilled the requirement. Students still must take three math/science classes, although a new requirement states that two of them must carry four credits each. Marshall explains that this prevents students from using less-demaning three-credit courses to fulfill the science requirement. Starting this fall, students also will have to complete math at least at the 95 level or demonstrate equivalent competency. Marshall adds that a change in the associate of general studies degree is the deletion of a human relations class requirement.

BUSINESS CENTER NEWS - Starting Sept. 1, LCC's efforts to assist Lane County businesses will be led by Edward W. "Sandy" Cutler, now a KUGN account executive. Cutler, 37, will manage the college's new Business Assistance Center (BAC), at the Downtown Center. He will direct such established programs as Small Business Management and Farm Business Management and add additional programs, courses, workshops and seminars as requested by area businesses. Second floor offices for the BAC are now being remodeled at the Downtown Center as a result of a \$20,000 grant from Donna P. Woolley, president of Eagles View Management Co. in Eugene. President Eldon G. Schafer said Cutler was chosen from among 45 "outstanding" applicants because of his "balance between a knowledge of business techniques and familiarity with the local business and educational communities."

The following letter to the editor from President Eldon G. Schafer appeared in the Aug. 12 Register-Guard.

At a time when unemployment lists are long, when jobs requiring high skills go unfilled, and when accelerated technological change is a way of life, it seems reasonable that the U.S. retrain millions of people whose current jobs are vanishing. In Lane County, retraining and continuing education for changing jobs are part of the answer to economic revitalization.

Yet, I've learned that a report titled "Action to Advance Quality in Higher Education," to be released this fall by the National Commission on Higher Education Issues, as it stands now will ignore the need for adult continuing education. The majority of the 59-member blue ribbon group of educators, association executives and public figures apparently believes that adult education is an inappropriate activity for post-secondary education.

Dale Parnell, former LCC president, Lane Education Service District superintendent, and Springfield High School principal, is a commission member. He represents the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges, which he heads. He sadly (and probably with teeth gritted, too) reports that a university bloc wanted the report to concentrate on a more traditional role for post-secondary education - business as usual.

This view isn't surprising, but it runs counter to reality.

Management consultant/educator/author Peter Drucker described the situation well in a recent issue of the Wall Street Journal. He says: "Demand for education is actually going up, not down. What is going down, and fairly fast, is demand for traditional education in traditional schools."

Enrollment nationally bears that out.

One in every eight adults in the U.S. last year took adult education courses. Sixty-one percent of the courses were taken for job-related reasons, according to the National Center for Education Statistics. Some 21 million people (56 percent women) took adult courses during the 1980-81 academic year, mostly at community colleges, and paid \$2.1 billion for the privilege.

Something is terribly wrong with our thinking if we believe that if a course isn't strictly "collegiate," it can't be useful. Or, stated another way, if it's not offered for college credit it must have less value.

Fortunately, the commission majority view isn't held by the nation's community colleges or by many leaders in four-year institutions (note the valuable efforts of such research-oriented institutions as the University of Oregon in economic development and in opening classes to adults in the community). The Council of Europe, headquartered in Strasbourg, also sees adult education as playing a pivotal role in economic development.

As for your Lane Community College, we will hold to our belief that taxpayers want us to help laid-off workers retrain for new jobs. Our neighbors must be aided in developing new skills appropriate for rapidly changing business and industry.

We won't back off because a commission dominated by traditionalist thinking says we shouldn't teach economic survival skills in that such courses allegedly aren't "colleg "collegiate."

LCC will continue to offer our three-year Small Business Management program to businesses with 25 or fewer employees, our Farm Management program to small agribusinesses, Rural Small Business Management to firms outside Eugene-Springfield with 15 or fewer employees, to teach American Management Association courses, to cooperate with Eugene and Lane County CETA programs to meet specific job training needs, to teach court reporting, microprocessing, apprenticeship training, and more.

By fall, our new Business Assistance Center in our Eugene Downtown Center will be actively coordinating and expanding our efforts to assist the Eugene Economic Foundation and others working toward the area's economic recovery.

These programs, which are nearly always fully enrolled, are all adult education activities. We will continue them until local people say they're no longer needed or worth funding. We'll leave that decision up to voters, however, not to any national commission. We think that makes better educational and economic sense.

Half of this \$1-million fund was appropriated by the January/February special session of the Legislature. The other \$500,000 will come from private business. Distribution of the \$75,000 to community colleges is the responsibility of the Educational Coordinating Commission.

Eileen Firebaugh's Zucchini Bread (from Eugene Register-Guard)

3 eggs

1 c. oil

- 2 c. sugar
- 2 c. grated zucchini
- 2 t. vanilla

In a separate bowl, mix:

- 3 c. flour
- 1 t. soda
- 1/4 t. baking powder
- 1 t. salt
- 3 t. cinnamon
- ¹₂ c. nuts

Beat eggs light and foamy. Add next four ingredients. Mix lightly but well. Add flour mixture and blend. Add nuts. Divide batter into greased loaf pans and bake at $325^{\circ}F$. for one hour or more, until done. Test by inserting toothpick in center of loaf. When loaf is done, toothpick will come out clean. Remove from pans at once and cool on rack. Makes two loaves. May be frozen for future use.
