WHERE YA GONNA WORK IF #3 PASSES? - Final figures aren't in yet from the state, but it is estimated that LCC would lose about \$5.5 million in property tax support if Ballot Measure 3, the property tax limitation proposal, passes at the Nov. 2 election. Rough estimates are that up to around 40 percent of staff might have to be laid off to make up for the lost money. Staff who are willing to help defeat Measure 3 should contact their union leaders.

#### ZUCCHINI OF THE DAY:

Elsa Sandersen's Zucchini Relish (from the Eugene Register-Guard)

10 c. zucchini
4 c. onion
5 T. salt
1 red pepper
1 green pepper
24 c. vinegar
4 c. sugar
1 t. nutmeg
1 t. dry mustard
2 T. celery salt

Grind coarsely, zucchini and onions. Add salt and let stand overnight. Drain in colander the next morning. Add chopped red and green pepper. Mix vinegar, sugar, nutmeg, dry mustard, celery salt; and add to zucchini, mixing well. Cook VERY SLOWLY for 20 minutes, stirring frequently. Ladle into jars; adjust lids and process for 10 minutes in a boiling water bath.

FORMER LCC STAFF MEMBER IN HOSPITAL - At publication time on Friday, former LCC laundry worker Roland Wrucke was in Sacred Heart General Hospital. Wrucke, a dedicated Titans booster, retired from LCC in December 1976 after more than eight years of service.

LCC BOARD MEETS WEDNESDAY - The LCC Board of Education Wednesday night will consider whether to ask voters Nov. 2 for a \$1.9-million increase in the college's tax base. President Schafer is recommending the college seek a \$12,501,500 tax base which would take effect in the 1983-84 fiscal year. Dean Bill Berry estimates the owner of a home assessed at \$60,000 would pay \$94.80 in property tax to support LCC in 1983-84, if the proposal is approved. If no additional taxes are approved, the tax bill for the same home would be \$86.46. The board meeting begins at 7:30 in the Board Room.

#### Zucchini Casserole

Make breadcrumbs.

Layer in a casserole dish: zucchini, cheese, onion salt, breadcrumbs. Pour batter over top and bake at  $350^{\circ}$  until top is fluffy and golden (less than one hour).

RE: Expeditor/Expenditure Processing Guidelines Use

Financial Services and Purchasing have developed Expenditure Processing Guidelines that conform to current administrative policies and can be used as a reference in processing Purchase Orders, Travel, and Personal services Contracts. See Appendix E in the revised BOM. In some instances the newly developed Expeditor form refers to the guidelines for solving problems on documents already sent to Purchasing or Financial Services. It is our hope that the use of these guidelines will greatly reduce the costly time and effort involved in reprocessing. 

#### Usage of Forms:

- Purchase Request (order): Purchases of materials, supplies, and capital outlay from off-campus vendors: The completed, properly signed purchase request form must be processed through the Purchasing Department. Do not send it to Operations, Financial Services offices.
- Intercampus Order/Services: When requesting materials or services obtained on-campus (e.g., supplies from the LCC Warehouse or bookstore), use an intercampus order form.
- 3. Travel Form: Travel forms are used for authorized personal expenses for employee travel. Travel expenses include transportation, meals, lodging, registration fees, and parking. A travel form is also used in some special cases when a staff person is taking a group of students on an authorized trip. This requires a complete list of people making the trip with an individual breakdown of expenses.

Please contact an accounts payable clerk in advance if you need assistance.

Invoices approved for payment are input on-line daily by Operations in Financial Services for transaction recording and computer check preparation on the  $\overline{7}$ th,  $\underline{10}$ th,  $\underline{15}$ th, and  $\underline{25}$ th of each month.



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COVERAGE UP, COST DOWN - LCC's building and equipment insurance has been increased by \$6.6 million to a total of \$61 million. Umbrella liability insurance has been raised from \$2 million to \$5 million and some other coverage also has been increased. In spite of the gain, Dean Bill Berry says the total college insurance costs have dropped by \$15,000. Rollins Burdick Hunter handles the college account.

INVESTMENTS DOING WELL - For the second straight year, the college's investment earnings topped a million dollars, reports Bill Mansell of Administrative Services. Recapping 1981-82, he says \$1,009,905 was earned on an average daily principle of \$7.2 million at an average interest rate of 13.83 percent. More than \$3.8 million in interest has been added to the budget over the past five years.

FTE DOWN A LITTLE - College FTE (full-time equivalency) was down 2.3 percent in 1981-82, compared to the prior year, according to Dean Gerald Rasmussen. Division A was up 2 percent on the strength of an 8.2 percent gain in Performing Arts, softened by a 4.2 percent drop in Art. Division I was up 5.5 percent as Data Processing grew 61.6 percent to offset losses in Electronics, Health Occupations and Science. Community Education fell off 13.9 percent as ABE/ESL dropped 22.8 percent, High School Completion dropped 10.1 percent and CWE FTE were included in that division's totals. Total college FTE was 9,299.55; that was 220.74 below 1980-81. The trend was expected because dropping state support forced cutbacks.

ACCIDENTS, COSTS UP SLIGHTLY - LCC staff had 48 accidents costing \$37,220 in fiscal year 1981-82, according to a summary by Bill Mansell of Administrative Services. That was four more accidents and almost \$10,000 more than the year before. Falls and equipment injuries were the high cost categories. The rate still is low enough to earn about \$60,000 in refunds of Workers' Compensation insurance payment premiums. A number of departments continue to earn high marks for accident prevention: Math has had no accident for nine years, Study Skills for five years, and Business and Language Arts for three years each. Within Student Services, Financial Aid has a five-year record and Admissions/Student Records has a four-year record.

SERVICES TODAY - Roland A. Wrucke, 70, of 687 Cheshire St., Eugene, died Saturday. A funeral for the former LCC laundry worker is scheduled at 2 p.m. today in Lounsbury-Musgrove Funeral Chapel with concluding services at Rest Haven Memorial Park, both in Eugene.

SERVICES TO BE ANNOUNCED - Mary Merrill, 60, former Manpower Development Training Act (clerical) instructor in LCC's early years, died Wednesday morning of a brain aneurism. She came to LCC in 1965 after more than 20 years of secretarial and sales experience. Merrill joined such present staff members as Bob Marshall and Rosemary Grant in getting early Community Education programs off the ground. About 1970, she left to open fabric stores in Springfield and Eugene and also had a bookstore for a time. Her husband Jed now teaches part time in Construction Technology after retiring from the full-time faculty last January. A daughter, Vicki, edited the LCC student newspaper and yearbook and worked in what was then Information and Publications in the 1960s. Services are being arranged by Poole-Larsen, Eugene.

#### Mock Apricot Jam

6 c. peeled, grated, chopped or ground zucchini I small can unsweetened crushed pineapple with juice 1 box powdered pectin 6 c. sugar

\*2 small boxes apricot jello

Cook zucchini one hour on low heat. Add canned pineapple with juice. Bring to boil. Add powdered pectin and sugar. Stir well and bring to boil; boil 6 min. Remove from heat ... add jello. Stir well. Seal in jars.

\* any flavor jello may be used

2 large onions, thinly sliced

#### Zucchini Pickles

10 c. thinly sliced zucchini (or cut in strips) 2 ½ c. cider vinegar 1 ½ c. sugar 1 T. salt 2 t. dry mustard 2 t. ground turmeric t. celery seed 1/8 t. powdered alum

Combine vinegar, sugar, salt, dry mustard, turmeric, celery seed and alum. Stir until dissolved. Add Zucchini and onion. Bring to boil; simmer 15 min. Put in jars and seal Makes 10 - 12 cups.

COLLEGE WILL SEEK TAX BASE INCREASE - By a unanimous vote, the LCC Board of Education decided last Wednesday night to ask voters in November to approve an increase in the college's tax base. The proposed \$1.9 million increase would be applied toward the budget year which begins July 1, 1983. It would permit a 4.6 percent increase in the operating budget above this year. The owner of a home assessed at \$60,000 would be asked to pay an estimated additional \$8.34 a year to support LCC programs.

FLOOD - LCC staff on the first and second floors of the Downtown Center survived a flood Friday morning when what seemed "like 100s or 1000s of gallons" of water poured through some of the building. Lyle Swetland at the Downtown Center says a steampipe activated a sprinkler head in a women's restroom on the mezzanine level. Water poured and seeped to the basement, ruining some carpeting, walls and ceilings, Swetland says. The water damaged parts of the remodeled area and some of the old section. Staff are back to work. Swetland says contractors and insurance people have pledged to work toward getting the Downtown Center back to normal by Sept. 27.

MORE ON BALLOT MEASURE THREE - The ANSWER program, LCC's confidential, "what's up" service for staff, recently received a questionnaire concerning state Ballot Measure 3 on the November ballot. How was a projected 40 percent staff layoff determined? the questioner asked and, Will all working groups be affected? Larry Romine, College/Community Relations, responds.

"As The Daily said, the layoff in event of BM3 passage could be 'up to around 40%' and it was stated that this was a 'rough estimate.' Dean Bill Berry is working on firmer figures. It all depends who was laid off. If the 295 people in classified took the brunt of the layoff, then more have to go because their salaries tend to be lower. They earn \$3.7 million annually. The 275 faculty earn \$6.8 million, but one would think that classroom personnel would be protected to some extent because eliminating a lot of them would reduce the amount of FTE reimbursement from the state and tuition income and compound the revenue problem. There are 95 managers (including confidential personnel who support managers) and they earn \$2.4 million. (These pay totals reflect full-time people only as listed in the Position Description System maintained by Administrative Services. The numbers don't include fixed benefits.)

The President and Deans haven't met to begin discussion of priorities because harder data on exact losses is still being assembled. When discussions begin, one can assume the President will involve a lot of staff through their representatives, as has been his practice for many years.

A positive approach at this time would be to work for the defeat of BM3 and the passage of a new tax base for LCC so that the disruptive and destructive effect on LCC doesn't have to occur."

MORE ON STUDENT INCREASES - A note from Jack Kreitz, Business: Enrollment in the Business Department increased from 927.1 FTE to 1,004.5 FTE, or a 77.4 FTE increase. This is an 8 percent increase.

CUTS NOT EQUITABLE - Passage of Ballot Measure 3 in the November election could trim property taxes for individual community colleges from zero to 70 percent, according to a simulation run by the Oregon Community College Association staff in Salem. Based on last year's budgets, the OCCA says Portland and Umpqua community colleges - because of high valuations in their districts - would lose nothing, if Ballot Measure 3 is passed. Treasure Valley Community College, on the other hand, could lose nearly 70 percent of its property tax support. Lane could lose 42 percent. Reductions by type of taxing district also would vary considerably, OCCA says. Kindergarten through 12th-grade school districts around the state as a group could lose 23 percent, Education Service districts 38 percent, cities 55 percent, counties 41 percent, special districts (fire, etc.) 58 percent, and community colleges 36 percent.



OREGONIANS OUTSCORE NATIONAL CONTEMPORARIES - Oregon high school seniors and GED candidates outscored their national contemporaries on the national high school equivalency tests, according to a research study conducted by the Oregon Department of Education and the GED Testing Service of the American Council on Education. Oregon GED candidates scored as high as the national group of high school seniors. Eighty-eight percent of the state's graduating seniors who were sampled in the spring of 1981 passed the tests, compared to 63 percent nationally. Ninety-four percent of the Oregon GED candidates passed the tests compared to 63 percent of the national GED candidates. In the GED five-test battery, average scores were: Oregon seniors, 53.3; national seniors, 50; Oregon GED candidates, 50; and national GED candidates, 46.5. The tests are English, social studies, science, math and literature. Oregon's minimum passing level on each test is 40, which is equal to or higher than most states. ("Edu-Gram," Oregon Department of Education)

KLCC BACK IN FLORENCE - Radio listeners in Florence are able to tune in KLCC (at 92.7) again. The station used a Glenada hill translator to relay its signal from the LCC campus in Eugene and, according to a complaint, blocked the KOAP-FM signal from Portland. The Federal Communications Commission asked for a change in frequency last February. Written responses from more than 100 listeners - in letters and petitions - requested the translator be put back into service. The FCC now has assigned KLCC to a commercial frequency which won't interfere with the Portland station's signal.

THE JOB LAB - No cost drop-in services are available to help people acquire effective job search skills and increase their confidence and motivation in looking for work. A job search support group meets Monday through Friday, from 8:30-10 a.m. Job Lab (Counseling) staff will encourage group sharing of leads, systematic planning of job search activities and holding participants accountable for regular employee contacts. Participants will have a chance to discuss problems and receive constructive suggestions. Individualized assistance also is available, Monday through Friday, noon to 3 p.m. (Appointments may be made in advance.) And skill-building mini-sessions are offered from 10-11:30 a.m. on certain days (about certain topics). A couple of the upcoming sessions are: Employer Expectations Oct. 4 and 18, Nov. 1 and 15 - What do employers expect from employees? How can you meet these expectations so that the employer will hire you? Skill Assessment - Oct. 6 and 20, Nov. 3 and 17 - How well can you tell employers why they should hire you? Do you know your transferrable skills and how they relate to the job market?
