ON THE BALLOT - LCC will ask voters in the Nov. 2 election to raise the college tax base \$1.9 million for the year beginning next July 1. The owner of a home assessed at \$60,000 would pay an estimated \$8.34 additional property taxes for LCC, about 70 cents a month. President Eldon G. Schafer says the college wouldn't have to ask for the larger tax base if the state hadn't had its revenue shortfall. "The state had to cut our support \$2.2 million over the past couple of years," he says. "But we're only asking for an amount 15 percent below the total of state cuts." Voter approval of the new tax base would permit LCC to increase its operating budget for 1983-84 by 4.6 percent to help offset inflation. Schafer says the new base would produce only about \$1.6 million because local tax collections are running about 13 percent behind. Ballot Measure 20-01 would be sufficient to fund LCC for at least a year, the president says, and longer if inflation is low.

AGAINST BM3 - The LCC Student Senate voted to oppose state ballot Measure 3 at its Sept. 27 meeting, with a 11-1 vote. Students are talking about ways to inform others of the measure's effects, enlist canvassers for the October precinct walks and to register voters and get them to the polls.

SEEKING TAX BASES - Oregon community colleges joining LCC on the Nov. 2 ballot to ask for tax bases or base increases are: Blue Mountain, Central, Chemeketa, Clatsop, Mt. Hood, Southwestern and Treasure Valley.

CAMPAIGN WORKING - The Oregon Community College Association reports that voters are becoming aware of what could happen if Ballot Measure 3 were to be approved at the Nov. 2 election. Says OCCA: "The polls indicate that increasing numbers of former supporters are now undecided and that many of those who were undecided before the campaign are now opposing Ballot Measure 3."

STATE ENROLLMENT UP - Community college enrollment of full-time students statewide is up, the OCCA says. High tuition at four-year schools helped students decide to stay close to home, the association guesses. Enrollment of part-time students statewide is down - that is attributed to reduction in course offerings due to budget cuts.

NO TURNAROUND YET - The state Employment Division says Oregon unemployment still leads the nation. August was the eighth month of near-11 percent unemployment. Nonagricultural seasonal employment increased by only 500 compared to a normal 6,000 for the summer. Employment declines occurred in aluminum, transportation, real estate and wholesale goods.

SOME WILL MOVE FROM HEALTH BUILDING - At the direction of the LCC Board of Education, the Administration will accommodate requests by employees who work in the Health Building to perform their jobs elsewhere. The board took that action Wednesday night in response to requests the building be closed pending tests to determine if the structure is a safe place to work. The relocations will last until test reports are received from the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health at Cincinnati and are to be dependent on finding space to which to move. Staff in the building have reported fumes that cause such symptoms as tingling in hands. Testing in the building will continue with physician Tom Redfield, a Eugene industrial medicine specialist, leading a continuing investigation for the college.

CONTRACT RATIFIED - The LCC board Wednesday night ratified an agreement between the LCC Employees Federation (classified) and the college; LCCEF members approved that contract Sept. 28. Those eligible received a step increase retroactive to July 1, 1982, and all classified employees obtained a 3 percent wage increase (including 69 individuals on step 8, at the top of the step scale). Some classified employees will be able to sign up for full-family medical coverage for which the college would start payment in April 1983. Those who will be eligible for such coverage will be classified employees with at least five years' continuous service. The new working agreement also contains a provision for improved dental coverage beginning in January 1984. The prior working agreement expired June 30, 1982; and negotiations for the new agreement had been underway since last spring, with the LCCEF bargaining team calling in a mediator last month.

OTHER BUSINESS - In other business, the LCC board this week allocated almost \$13,000 from uncommitted Plant Funds to purchase and install a satellite receiver antenna, which will improve LCC's telecommunications system. The board also agreed to send an election mailer to Lane County residences before the Nov. 2 election. LCC will have a tax base increase proposal on the ballot. The total cost for the mailer would run about \$6,000. The board okayed the purchase of 15 dental chairs (\$27,750); and accepted a bid from an amusement game firm to set up video games, the revenues from which essentially would provide travel costs for student activities in Athletics and Performing Arts.

PEOPLE - In personnel items this week, the LCC board approved a recommendation that Rolfe Stearns be appointed a Food Service program instructor in Home Economics, effective Sept. 13, 1982. The board also accepted a retirement request from counselor Ralph Burns, who will leave in December after 17 years with LCC. Eugene resident Kathy Hereema was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Michael Williams on the KLCC Advisory Commission.

LIBRARY FRIENDS - The Friends of the LCC Library will hold an annual membership meeting Tuesday, from 4-6 p.m., in the Library's Florida Room. Officers and standing committee chairpersons will be elected. Positions that will need filled include those of president, vice president, secretary and treasurer, and committee chairpersons for finance, membership, program and publicity. ENROLLMENT - The headcount enrollment for credit students stood at 7,700 last Friday, according to Admissions Director Bob Marshall. That figure is down about 250 persons from a year ago. The FTE count was at 2,071 last Friday - only about 28 lower than last year's FTE count. Marshall attributes the lowered headcount to a reduction in the number of night students who have fewer classes from which to choose.

UNITED WAY BIG IN 4-J - School District 4-J employees are showing the way in this year's United Way campaign. As of Wednesday, they already were \$10,000 ahead of last year's final total. United Way officials advise that some \$159,000 has been collected to date in Lane County toward the campaign goal of \$1.2 million. They're finding it tough going because they've discovered that 500 businesses have closed this year and 5,600 employee givers aren't there anymore to help in the 1982 effort.

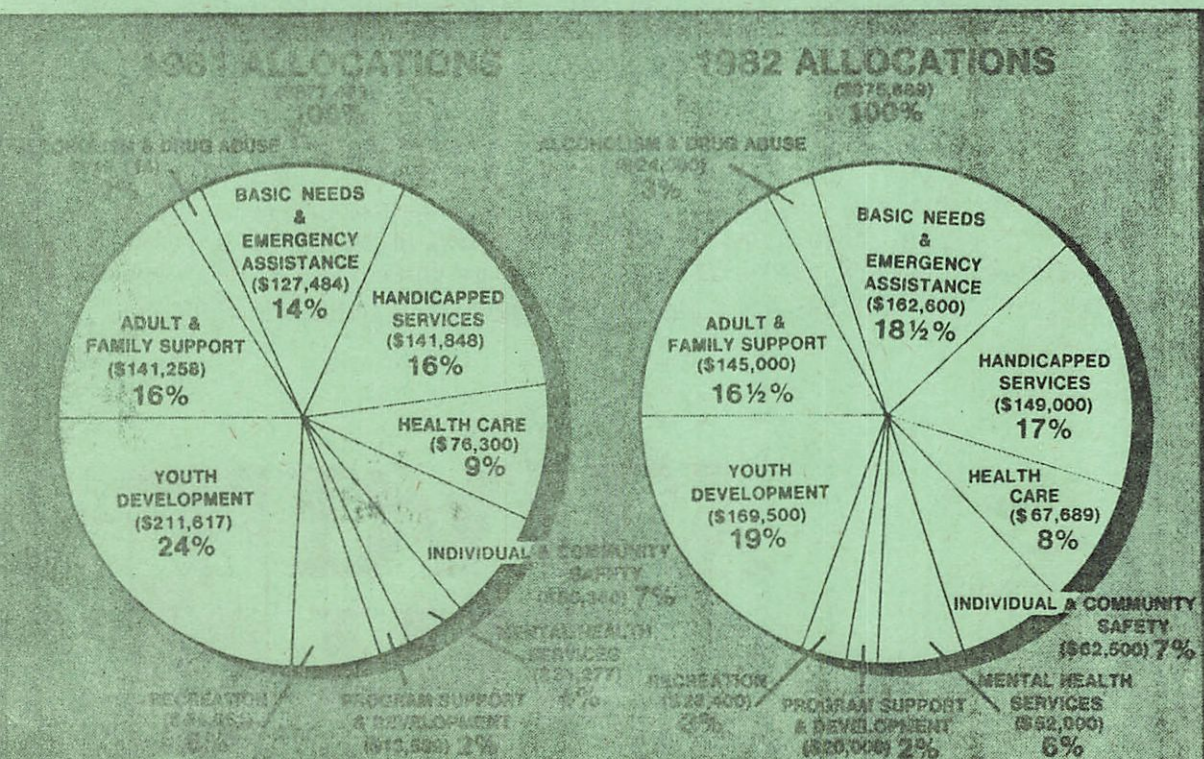

NO SPECIFICS - If Ballot Measure 3 were approved Nov. 2, what would LCC cut? The answer is available only in general terms. Priorities established for cutting this year's budget were described in a March 4, 1982, memo to the deans from the president. Highest priority went to vocational education, then developmental education, Community Education programs related to economic development, lower-division credit, Community Education enrichment and self-improvement, and last - community services. Some semblance of that order would be expected to prevail again if the college were to cut \$7.7 million for 1983-84. The impact, however, probably would hit no later than the approaching winter term as top administrators began the slowdown. A possible scenario which has been discussed includes the layoff of all present part-time teachers and support staff to save \$1.7 million, the layoff of 26 (FT) managers, 70 classified and 79 teachers to save \$4.7 million, and the elimination of capital outlay and contingency funds to save \$500,000. That would still leave us short \$800,000 to pay unemployment benefits, plus money for salary adjustments. Obviously, that scenario is not carved in stone and would have to be adjusted. As far as enrollment is concerned, some 4,000 to 8,000 individuals would be unable to attend because a cut of at least 2,000 FTE students would be made.

AFTERMATH OF PROPOSITION 13 - Because of reduced support, California schools are slipping, according to a story in the Oct. 20 Oregonian. California has dropped to 35th among states in expenditures per student, and to 50th among states in percentage of taxpayer personal income devoted to schools. SAT score averages dropped 40 points in the verbal parts of the test and 41 points in mathematics. The school day has been shortened, 12,500 teachers laid off, and courses such as home economics, business, art, shop, music and typing eliminated in many districts.

ON THE WAY - First returns on United Way giving have come from members of the Management Group, who now have \$552 toward meeting last year's giving total of \$3,243.

The measure was opposed by voters in all congressional districts except the third, according to Bardsley. That congressional district contains Portland, where property taxes increased an average of 32 percent this year.
