A WORD FROM CHINA - President Eldon G. Schafer writes about a nine-day tour of the country and of seeing such tourist attractions as the Great Wall and Ming Tombs. His group - which includes five persons from Japan, Germany, England and France - finds it difficult to bridge language barriers, despite working Saturdays and Sundays. The president says the Chinese at each stop praise the community college concept and say their country needs more technically trained workers. He says pay for part-time faculty recruited from business and industry runs about 75 cents an hour for instructors and one dollar an hour for professors who work in the "basic colleges." Schafer is due back at LCC on Nov. 15.

OUTSIDE LOOKING IN - Graduate schools of education "display alarming symptoms of insecurity and self doubt," according to Harry Judge, a British scholar asked by the Ford Foundation to examine American schools of education. After interviewing faculty and graduates of such schools, Judge concluded: "The trouble with G.S.E.s (graduate schools of education) is that inevitably they have something to do with teachers, even if that something often means as little as possible. And the trouble with teachers is that they are painfully undervalued... everywhere perhaps, but especially in the U.S." Copies of Judge's essay are available for \$4.50 from the Ford Foundation, P.O. UP IN THE AIR - Ballot Measure 3 proponents weren't conceding defeat Wednesday afternoon, saying that a large number of uncounted absentee ballots could pass the measure, according to reporter Ron Bellamy of the Eugene Register-Guard.

NEARING VICTORY - As of Wednesday, the Management Group was just a sneeze away from equaling 1981 giving to United Way. Giving reached \$3,119 from 65 donors. That's only \$124 and seven donors short of last year. They're at the 96 percent level.

MEANWHILE, BACK IN CHINA - President Eldon G. Schafer again writes from overseas, where he was staying in Shanghai's Jing Jiang Hotel (on the 18th floor, where Nixon stayed when he signed the Sino-American agreement). "Almost everything is done by hand. I did see one small tractor plowing - mostly what looked to be water buffalo were used. We watched much grain, rice and corn being harvested by hand. Rice is cut with a small hand sickle and neatly stacked to dry. We saw much rice, cotton, wheat and, most of all, miles of vegetables of all kinds....We think nothing of car parking lot attendants. They have bicycle parking lot attendants who collect a small fee for parking a bike - and I mean thousands of bikes. In Peijing, there are over three million bikes."

INVEST SOUNDLY IN SOUND - KLCC's fall radiothon begins Monday with special programs planned through Nov. 16. The station has been living with a reduced budget because of cuts by both LCC and the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. The latter offers KLCC an incentive Challenge Grant; for every three dollars above last year's membership contributions, the corporation will donate one dollar to KLCC. This grant could restore nearly \$10,000 to KLCC's operating budget, so local fundraising is as important as ever. FLIGHT TECH KUDOS - The latest U.S. Department of Transportation "List of Certified Pilot Schools" lists the LCC Flight Technology Department as one of three in the northwest (one of 57 in the country) to have been issued pilot examining authority. This allows the department to issue pilot certificates upon satisfactory completion of courses, rather than requiring FAA flight tests for certification. By issuing this authority, the FAA recognizes the Flight Tech Department's fine reputation. There are about 1,600 pilot schools in the nation.

At the beginning of Wednesday night's LCC Board of Education meeting, which begins at 7:30 in the Board Room, LCC will receive still more recognition for the good work the Flight Technology Department does. The program, now in its 14th year, has logged more than 50,000 hours and 6-million miles of accident-free instructional flying. Chuck Foster, FAA regional administrator for the western states, will be down from Seattle to present a plaque to Dean Gerald Rasmussen at the board meeting. Another guest who will be here is Paul Burket, director of the state Aeronautics Division. LCC's program has 75 students in flight training and another 200 in aviation ground courses each year. Terry Hagberg, head of Flight Technology, is understandably pleased about the safety award. He says he's not aware of any other college earning such recognition.

INVESTMENT REPORT - The LCC board members have received an investment report for July 1-Sept. 30, 1982. Despite declining rates, the college earned almost as much as during the same period last year - \$197,122 in interest. Bill Mansell, Administrative Services, reports that both the cash balance and earnings likely will decline until property tax turnovers begin to come in.

SOUND INVESTMENT - KLCC's fall radiothon got underway Monday night and continues through Tuesday, Nov. 16. 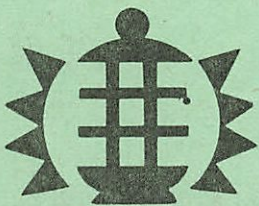

BOARD MEETING TONIGHT - The LCC Board of Education meets tonight at 7:30 p.m. in the Board Room, Administration 216. On the agenda are the 1983-84 budget, construction priorities and a faculty salary study. In addition, LCC's Flight Technology program will receive recognition for logging more than 50,000 hours and six-million miles of accident-free instructional flying. Chuck Foster, FAA regional administrator for the western states, will be here from Seattle to present a plaque to Dean Gerald Rasmussen at the board meeting.



RETIRING - Karen Landsdowne, a Language Arts instructor with the college since the beginning in 1965, will retire at the end of fall term. "It's been a big part of my life," she says of LCC. "It'll be hard to pull away." Landsdowne grew up in Lynx Hollow (between Cottage Grove and Creswell) and attended a one-room schoolhouse. She went on to the University of Oregon and attained a B.A. degree with honors in English, and master's degrees in education and English (with honors). She taught at the university for six years, and came to LCC because the former was becoming too big. "I liked the idea of smaller classes. I liked the idea of vocational students, the idea of meeting the needs of returning students," she says. Landsdowne says she will miss LCC, and adds she wishes the proposed humanities building had been constructed to meet the needs of those disciplines. Landsdowne's son is just completing a log house in LaPine (central Oregon) to which she'll move and in which she expects to do more welding of stoves.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES - Learn about career opportunities in engineering from a woman in the field. Catherine Mater of Mater Engineering Ltd. will answer questions in an informal setting on Friday at 2 p.m., in Forum 308. The talk is sponsored by the Career Information Center.

DON'T FORGET - Thursday, Nov. 11, is Veterans' Day and a paid holiday for LCC staff.

STUDENT REMINDER - Friday, Nov. 12, is the last day to withdraw from a class with no grade record. Friday, Nov. 19, is the last day to change a grading option.

ELECTION ANALYSIS - Familiar patterns emerged in LCC's tax base defeat. Central and south Eugene supported the proposal along with three Springfield precincts. It was soundly rejected elsewhere. The measure was supported in 47 of 181 precincts, only 26 percent - yet LCC received 46 percent of the votes cast. The total of overvotes (people voting both yes and no on their ballots) was negligible, but the number (9,294) and percent (8.8) of under-votes (not marking the ballot at all for this particular issue) was enough to win it for LCC. Undervotes were significant in all eight, rejected tax base measures on the Lane County ballot. "One could interpret that to mean that people didn't want to vote against us, but they didn't want higher property taxes either," says Larry Romine, College/Community Relations. Except in Blachly, LCC ran as well or stronger than other tax bases on ballot.

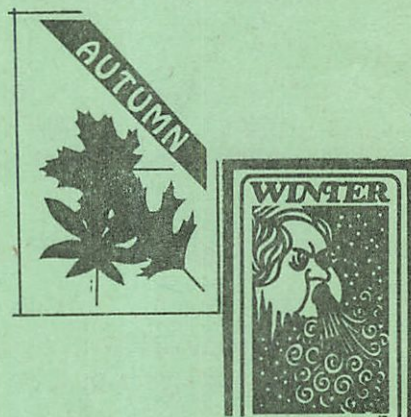

HOLIDAY RECIPE - The following is Virginia Mansell's oft-requested pecan fruit cake recipe, brought to The Daily's attention by her husband Bill Mansell, Administrative Services. He guarantees its good taste.

PECAN FRUIT CAKE 2 c. sifted flour
 2 t. baking powder
 ½ t. salt
 4 eggs
 1 c. sugar
 1½ # cut pineapple
 1 # whole cherries
 1½ # coarsely cut dates
 2 # (8 cups) pecan halves

Double-line pans w/brown paper, and grease both papers and pans.

Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add pineapple, cherries and dates, and mix well. Beat eggs until frothy; beat in sugar. Add egg mixture to fruit and mix well. With hands, mix in pecans. Press firmly in three small bread pans. Bake at 300° 1½ hours. Let cakes stand in pans for 5 min. before removing. Carefully remove paper. Cool. Store in plastic bags. They're ready to eat in a day or two. (Can use 9 or 10 12-oz. orange juice cans - double-line with paper at least 1" higher than cans, and bake for one hour.)

TO THEIR CREDIT - Telecourses this fall at LCC enrolled 1,080 students and more than 72 FTE (fourth week report). That's 301 students more than were enrolled last spring, and 809 more than were enrolled in spring 1981. The term's most popular course, Making It Count, will be repeated winter term. This fall, it enrolled 606 students. Business English I and II and Your Health, Your Choice each enrolled 65 students. Eighteen telecourses in all are offered this term, and students signed up for college-transfer and vocational credit. Courses ranged in subject matter from career planning, consumer education and shorthand to child development and airplane piloting. Telecourses are offered at varying times and channels. Some are aired on Oregon Public Broadcasting, Group W Cable, and cable channels in Junction City, Cottage Grove, Florence, Oakridge and Creswell.

In addition to Making It Count, a computer introduction course, LCC will offer 14 others this winter. They are: An Invitation to Fly: Private Pilot Ground School; Understanding Human Behavior, a psychology course; Voyage: Challenge and Career Life Planning; Your Health, Your Choice; The Drama of Child Development; Business English I and II; Introduction to Business; The Art of Being Human, an interdisciplinary humanities course; Math for Modern Living; Consumer Education; Gregg Shorthand; Shorthand Skillbuilding; and Focus on Society, a sociology course.

IT WILL COST - Contrary to information in the newly released winter term 1983 schedule, persons 62 and older will be charged for LCC credit classes. Senior citizens pay \$10 tuition for each class, credit and noncredit. They were able to take classes for free until summer term 1982. The mistaken and outdated information passed into the winter term schedule from the computer memory of an off-campus typesetter.
