ATIYEH'S BUDGET - Gov. Vic Atiyeh's budget request for 1983-85 mixes old and new ideas to protect all state-funded programs from further cuts, according to the Oregon Community College Association. The old ideas include: a 1 percent personal and corporate net receipts tax; Atiyeh's own property tax limit proposal; adjusting the brackets of the existing income tax to make it more progressive; reconnecting the state and federal tax codes, benefiting businesses because the federal deductions are more liberal than state deductions; and discontinuing the 30-percent property tax relief program (and A/B ballot approach) in favor of an extended version of the Homeowners and Renters Relief Program (HARRP). The new include: replacing the \$1,000 personal income tax exemption with an \$85 tax credit; discontinuing the income tax surcharge - one of the "stop-gap" revenue proposals used to cover the 1981-83 budget shortfall; and continuing the one-time cigarette tax increase, but at a reduced level of three cents (for 12 cents total).

Atiyeh's total budget proposes a 15 percent ($$430\ million$) increase in state spending during the next two years and a 25 percent increase in income taxes to pay for it.

The OCCA provides further explanation....
* The 1 percent net receipts tax on personal and corporate income would raise
\$650 million. It would be a flat 1 percent levied on gross income before any deductions or exemptions. It broadens the income tax base, because everyone pays, and thus is more regressive than a graduated income tax. Social Security and public assistance payments are excluded from the tax, and the revenue committees of the Legislature would have to consider other exemptions.

* Atiyeh proposes to freeze property tax rates at 1982-83 levels and limit assessed value increases to 5 percent per year statewide.

Atiyeh's proposed budget would make appropriations to education in the following ways: \$895.4 million to basic school support for a 4.9 percent increase; \$372.3 million to higher education for a 23.3 percent increase; \$103.7 million to community colleges for a 5.8 percent increase.

The governor's request allows community colleges an increase of state support of 7 percent in 1983-84 and 7 percent in 1984-85, recognizing expected inflations but allowing no enrollment increases. Complicating the picture is Atiyeh's plan to seek property tax limitation. (information drawn from the Dec. 1, 1982, OCCA news digest.)

SERIAL LEVY CONSIDERED - Because of tight budgets, maintenance of LCC's physical plant and updating of instructional equipment has been put off for years. LCC's Board of Education was advised Wednesday night that it's time to pay the piper. The flat roofs have bubbles and the pitched roofs have broken shingles. Paint is peeling off exterior building walls. Much teaching equipment is worn out or no longer reflects what's happening in the job market. It'll be several months before a decision is made. (continued on next page.)

SERIAL LEVY, cont. - The LCC board Wednesday night discussed the possibility of a serial levy on the May 17 ballot. Such a levy might run for about three years, cost about 20 cents per \$1,000 true cash value, and raise about \$4 million. The next step may be the appointment of a blue ribbon citizens committee. Its members would come to campus to see if they agree on what should be done.

MORE BOARD BUSINESS - In other business, the board Wednesday considered the possibility of avoiding a levy election next spring for operating monies. The governor's budget proposal calls for about \$600,000 in new monies for LCC. In addition, the automatic 6 percent increase in the property tax levy would produce another \$600,000. With sufficient cash carry-forward and other economies, the college might be able to get through 1983-84 without a levy. But there are a lot of ifs. Stay tuned.

Dean Bill Berry reported receiving a call from NIOSH regarding a chemical analysis of mid-October air samplings in the Health Building. The building is safe, the physicians say. Meanwhile, the laundry exhaust stack atop the building has been extended upward. Fans ordered for the dental area will be installed this month. Major work involving more exhaust ducts in the dental lab and extension of a fresh air intake toward the tennis courts will be done next summer.

Dean Jack Carter reported that enrollment this year won't reach the expected 9,000 FTE students. It will likely be closer to 8,700. That compares to 9,300 last year and 9,500 the year before. Summer session this year was cut from 12 to eight weeks to save money and that cut FTE production. This fall, enrollment is down in adult education, adult basic education and high school completion. Credit classes, on the other hand, are holding their own. Data Processing enrollment is up almost 100 percent, Dean Gerry Rasmussen told the board.

1 c. flour c. butter 3 T. conf. sugar 2 eggs, slightly beaten 1 c. gran. sugar

1, c. flour
1, t. baking powder
1, t. salt
1 t. vanilla
3/4 c. chopped nuts
1, c. coconut
1, c. quar. maraschino cherries

Heat oven to 350° . Measure flour by dipping method or by sifting. Mith hands, mix one cup flour, butter and conf. sugar until smooth. Spread thin with fingers in ungreased square pan, 8x8x2. Bake for about 25 minutes.

Stir rest of ingredients into eggs. Spread over top of baked pastry (no need to cool). Bake about 25 minutes. Cool. Cut into bars. Makes $18~\mathrm{bars}$.
