REGISTRATION/COMPUTERIZED WAITING LISTS - With winter term underway, the Admissions Office staff want to remind instructors that when a student receives a consent card overriding the enrollment limitation of a class and processes that card before the second week of classes, the student will be added to the waiting list. There are no waiting lists after the first week. If the student receives the card and processes it during the second week of classes, the student will be added to your class list.

PROMOTION - Larry Murray, head of Special Training Programs, has been named acting associate dean for Community Education. The Board of Education, at its Jan. 12 meeting, will be asked to formally approve appointment of Murray to succeed Nile Williams, who retired Dec. 31.

ENROLLMENT OFF A LITTLE - It appears that winter term enrollment will be down 10 to 15 FTE students, compared to a year ago. Headcount should hold its own. Fewer students are carrying a full-time load, according to Dean of Students Jack Carter. FTE production for the year is expected to be down 6 to 7 percent.

MORE CIRCLES - Five more quality circles are gearing up, reports Casey Fast of the Productivity Center. Groups will begin in the Bookstore, in Science, among Math's lab paraprofessionals, in Media Productions, and in Word Processing. Eight circles continue from last year.

MOVING IN - People are beginning to occupy the Health Building again, according to Associate Dean Joyce Hopps. Target date for reoccupying the Child Development Center is Jan. 20.

KLCC IN BEND? - Central Oregon has the state's largest population unserved by public radio, but listeners might be able to tune in KLCC beginning this summer. The LCC Board of Education next week will be asked to authorize submission of an application to the Federal Communications Commission for a KLCC translator in the Bend area. Station Manager Jon Schwartz reports that the Deschutes County Planning Commission has okayed a translator site, and administrators at Central Oregon Community College have approved the idea. The successful fall radiothon enables KLCC to afford the \$2,000-3,000 translator cost, he says. Schwartz adds that the station could "make back" the expenditure. While KLCC's commission was investigating the possibility of a Bend-area translator, Schwartz says the station received an unsolicited petition with the signatures of 709 Central Oregon residents wanting KLCC in their area. If the pattern holds, 7-10 percent of those potential listeners would help support the station through financial donations.

UNITED WAY CAPSULE - LCC employees have donated \$11,660.58 to the 1982 United Way effort. That is \$1,173.83 and 9 percent above the 1981 total. For the second year in a row, LCC set an all-time giving record. A total of 286 people participated - seven more than last year. LCCEA and other faculty contributed \$5,569.50, with 132 people participating. Those numbers are \$945.50 and 35 donors above 1981 numbers. Dal Haverland, Counseling, led the faculty effort. The classified effort was led by Sue Kangas, Adult Basic Education. LCCEF and other classified raised \$2,371.08 from 79 donors. Those totals are down \$129.67 and 31 donors from 1981, but Kangas is soliciting additional gifts. The classified effort got a very late start (contract negotiations were underway as the United Way campaign geared up), but the group did well in the time available. The Management Group had 75 participants who donated \$3,720 - topping last year's record by \$477 and adding three people to the donor list. Bill Mansell, Administrative Services, led the effort. United Way chairperson at LCC was Larry Romine.

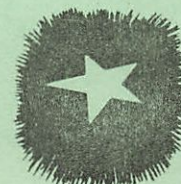

Dear L.C.C. Board:

I am extremely grateful to Ann O'Brien and the whole nursing lab staff for being both flexible enough and interested in me enough to help me out. I had lived in Eugene for 12 years before going to work overseas with my husband in 1978.

Recently I became interested in finishing a degree in nursing and enrolled in N.Y. Regents external degree nursing program; the only way for me to get my nursing degree from a U.S. college and still live overseas.

In October I came back to the States to investigate possibilities for getting the kind of laboratory experience that might prepare me for my final exam, the Clinical Performance Examination. I presented myself to Ann O'Brien with this problem, fully expecting her to say "Sorry, you're not a nursing student here in the regular program, we can't help you." She didn't at all, instead she checked with the lab staff and with the dean and suggested that if I were to enroll as an independent study student in nursing then I could use the lab. It would have been just as easy, if not easier, for any of those people to say No and they didn't. I appreciate it tremendously.

SHHHHH, THERE'S A LEVY ON THE BALLOT - Secretary of State Norma Paulus says she'll get a bill introduced in the State Senate to prohibit all public agencies from spending any tax monies to inform voters about the potential effects of any ballot measure. That report comes from the Legislative Bulletin of the Oregon School Boards Association. Public agencies already are prohibited from using tax monies to urge passage or defeat of any ballot measure. The latest proposal apparently would make it necessary for citizen committees to raise funds and disseminate information if agencies were to get information out about their levies.

WE'RE STILL ON THE SHORT END - The governor's recommendation for education fund increases for the 1983-85 biennium has community colleges trailing higher ed and K-12 districts, as was the case in the last biennium. For 1983-85, higher ed would get a 23 percent increase in funding and K-12 would get a 6.5 percent hike. Community colleges would get a 5.9 percent increase; this would result in an estimated 10,000 unfunded FTE students statewide by the end of the two-year period. The Legislative Bulletin of the Oregon School Boards Association says funding in the past two years amounted to a 12.9 percent increase for higher ed, 6.3 percent for K-12 districts, and 4.5 percent for community colleges.

BARGAIN - The college has acquired computing equipment at a bargain, and has alleviated the problems that come with rapidly rising enrollment in the Data Processing Department. For a number of years, the department averaged the equivalent of about 40 full-time students (FTE); however, last year, enrollment shot up to 240 FTE, and this academic year the department is projecting 400 FTE. The biggest problem created by this rapid growth is that the demand for computing time exceeds the capacity of LCC's computing equipment. The problem will be partially alleviated by the recent purchase of used computer equipment from a college in Arizona. Jim Keizur, head of Data Processing, was ecstatic to find equipment compatible with LCC's and at a bargain. The college spent \$8,000 for equipment Keizur estimated is worth \$130,000.

FUNDING NEWS - LCC has received a \$10,000 gift from area businesswoman Donna P. Woolley. The gift is in addition to the \$20,000 Woolley gave the college last year. Her original gift helped launch LCC's Business Assistance Center at the Downtown Center. Woolley is president of Eagles View Management Company. Her recent contribution to LCC was made through the Oregon Community Foundation in Portland. President Eldon G. Schafer announced the recent gift on Wednesday, at the annual meeting of the LCC Development Fund Board of Trustees. The gift, he said, will be used to "improve the resources available to the community through the LCC Business Assistance Center."

DEVELOPMENT FUND PICKS OFFICERS - At its annual meeting Wednesday, the LCC Development Fund Board of Trustees selected officers for the coming year.
