BILLS OF INTEREST - The Oregon Community College Association has identified the following bills as important ones to watch; some of them may interest you. HB 2194 - Removes A/B ballot requirements for elections on question of levying property tax. HB 2056 - Changes the date for election of members from district boards from March to May of odd-numbered years. Requires that districts hold regular elections for board members every other year, in odd-numbered years. Extends the terms of incumbents from districts holding annual elections so that their terms will end and successors elected in odd-numbered years. HB 2050 - Allows voting by mail for elections in which candidates are listed on the ballot. Changes the last day for registering to vote from the 30th day before the election to 20th day. SB 182 - Excludes "managerial employee" from definition of "public employee" for purposes of collective bargaining. Defines "managerial employee" as employee "whose program area responsibilities create a community of interest that rests with the employer." Amends ORS 243.650. SB 20 - Continues the Educational Coordinating Commission, subject to sunset review. Requires the ECC to submit a comprehensive statewide plan to the next legislative assembly. Authorizes the ECC to disapprove programs, if they are not consistent with the statewide plan.

EARNING MONEY - At the half-year mark, the college's investment program still is earning a good revenue yield - despite a 30 percent total rate decrease from last year. The average daily invested principal, according to Bill Mansell, Administrative Services, was 22 percent higher than last year, and a total of \$385,005 in interest earnings was gained during the period. Mansell earlier reported that any delay in tax turnover processings by the county assessor could cost the college. He says now that the delay was brief and, by his calculations, LCC lost only about \$10,800 in total interest income.

The Board of Education on Wednesday night agreed to put a request for \$1.5 million a year before voters with the expectation of being able to collect at least \$1.3 million of it. Its cost would be about 20 cents per \$1,000 true cash value per year, an estimated \$12 annually for the owner of a home assessed at \$60,000. Board members said they didn't want to put a levy before voters in the current climate of recession, but felt responsible to let the public know what's happening to the aging campus. Some \$965,000 is needed for reroofing, \$243,000 for painting building exteriors, \$923,800 for new Mechanics Department instructional equipment, \$331,600 for new Business Department instructional equipment, and on and on. A great deal of instructional equipment is outdated or "on its last legs," Dean Gerald Rasmussen told the board.

Rather than Cancel Classes, 75 to Teach Without Pay

More than 75 administrators
and faculty members at Central
Piedmont Community College
volunteered to teach courses
without pay, rather than cancel
classes, after the North Carolina
legislature cut the college's ap-
propriations by 6 per cent last
month.

The volunteers, who will each
teach one or two courses during
the 11-week winter quarter, will
donate a total of 2,640 classroom
hours, saving \$31,000, a college
spokesman said.

Without the volunteers, the col-
lege, which lost more than \$1-mil-
lion in the cut, would have been
forced to cancel some scheduled
classes in every department. The
volunteers said they saw no rea-
son to penalize students for some-
thing that wasn't their fault, the
spokesman said.

Faculty Pay Cuts Proposed at Los Angeles Colleges

Trustees of the Los Angeles
Community College District have
called for a 10-per-cent cut in fac-
ulty salaries and increases in fac-
ulty workloads and average class
size to erase a projected \$28-mil-
lion budget deficit in 1983-84.

The trustees proposed increas-
ing the workload of the 1,800 full-
time faculty members from 30 to
40 hours a week and increasing
class size from 35 to 45 students
per class. Teachers also would be-
gin paying for certain fringe bene-
fits now financed by the district.

Other cuts have also been pro-
posed as a result of California
Gov. George Deukmejian's new
budget, which provides no addi-
tional money for community col-
leges.

LEAGUE FOR INNOVATION

INNOVATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

The League for Innovation in the Community College has created an award that will be given for the first time this year. The recognition is to be known as the Innovator of the Year Award. The award will be given annually to one individual from each of the 18 League member college districts.

Any current Lane Community College employee, part-time or full-time, may be considered for the award.

The recipient of the Innovator of the Year Award will receive a plaque from the League for Innovation. The plaque will be presented at an appropriate local gathering. The award winner will also be featured in the League publication, JOTTINGS, and may be invited to give a presentation at the annual League conference (usually in the fall).

The deadline for nominations is March 30.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

WHO MAY NOMINATE?

Nominations may come from anyone either inside or outside the college.

WHAT ARE THE SELECTION CRITERIA?

The award will be given to an individual who has designed and implemented a significant innovation at LCC. The League has established the following criteria for making their selection from among nominees. PLEASE NOTE THAT ONE OR MORE OF THE CRITERIA SHOULD BE MET, BUT IT IS NOT NECESSARY THAT ANY NOMINEE SHOULD MEET ALL CRITERIA.

1. Quality - Students and/or staff agree that the innovation increases quality in the course program, office or institution. Evidence of quality may include student ratings or letters of support from colleagues.

2. Efficiency - There is evidence that the innovation or outstanding program contributes to a more efficient way of doing things. Student ratings, perceptions of outside consultants, and pre- and post-comparison of time involved are examples of evidence.
3. Cost effectiveness - There is evidence that the innovation adds a value to the institution while at the same time containing or reducing costs. Cost data will serve as evidence.
4. Replication - The program selected can be used by other institutions with a minimum of difficulty. The description of the program should include any conditions necessary for replication.
5. Creativity - The selected program should be as original as possible or the adaptation should at least be creative. The description of the program or letters from experts are examples of evidence.
6. Timeliness- The award-winning program should not be more than five years old at that institution, but it must have been around long enough to have been tested so that it meets most of the criteria.

HOW WILL THE WINNER BE SELECTED?

LCC's Innovator of the Year Award Selection Committee will review the nomination and supporting materials and select one award winner by April 15 of each year. The committee will invite and encourage high quality nominations, and in the event no nominations are deemed to be of a caliber worthy of nationwide recognition, no award will be made that year.

The selection committee consists of three LCC employees representing management, faculty, and classified personnel and two members from the community. Larry Warford, League representative, chairs the committee.

HOW ARE NOMINATIONS MADE?

Nominations should consist of the name and department of the innovator and a one-page description of the project, process, item or activity supported by relevant materials. If materials are visual, or in some other form, it may be necessary for the nominee to make arrangements for the Award Selection Committee to have access for viewing purposes.

Nominations should be directed to League representative Larry Warford (President's Office, Administration Building).
