QUOTABLE - Portland Community College President John Anthony, before the Portland City Club, Feb. 4: "Education will increasingly be defined as learning how to get information, how to work at solving problems, how to self-renew and self-direct in the face of the new and unexpected."

IN WASHINGTON - According to the Feb. 5 Congressional Quarterly, U.S. legislative branch agencies are slated to receive \$1.6 billion in fiscal year 1984. The request includes: \$260 million for the operation of the Senate, including \$9 million in compensation for senators and \$161 million for staff salaries; \$420 million for the operation of the House, including \$34 million for members' compensation, \$35 million for committee employees and \$150 million for members to pay their personal staffs; and \$117 million for accounts funded by both House and Senate. The largest item in this last category is \$107 million in mailing costs - a 94 percent increase above the \$55.2 million so far appropriated for 1983. (Mail costs are higher in an election year, Congressional Quarterly reports congressional aides as saying.)

COLLEGE WEEK - Gov. Vic Atiyeh declared March 1-7 Community College Awareness Week. Some facts: LCC was established by voter approval on Oct. 19, 1964, and held its first classes in July 1965. In 1900, there were eight two-year colleges in the United States - all private. By 1960, there were 678 community colleges. That number grew to 1,091 by 1970 and to 1,200 in 1980. More than one-third of the country's college students are in community colleges. LCC enrolled about 30,000 students last year (headcount).

JOB TRAINING - HB2373, which would allow unemployed persons attending vocational programs to continue receiving unemployment insurance, has been amended by the Senate Labor Committee to avoid a threatened veto by Gov. Vic Atiyeh. Those speaking in favor of the bill on the Senate floor included Eugene Sen. Margie Hendriksen. Speaking for the bill in the House was Springfield Rep. Larry Hill. Rep. Peg Jolin of Cottage Grove also worked for bill passage. Atiyeh is expected to sign the bill next week.

Each leg of the relay will be about one-quarter mile. Bring a frisbee or obtain one from the P.E. Department at the event. The event gets started at 3 p.m. on Bristow Square by the Center Building, on Wednesday, March 9.

ENROLLMENT CRISIS - For the next 15 years, colleges will face the birthdeath generation, according to President Eldon G. Schafer's report to the LCC Board of Education on "The Coming Enrollment Crisis: What Every Trustee Must Know." President Schafer's memo further notes that the number of 18-vear-olds roughly doubled between 1950 and 1980, but a sharp drop will occur between 1979 and 1994 (a 26 percent decline forecast). What do the numbers hold for college enrollment? The competition for students in the "traditional college-age population" will grow stiffer, because recent high school graduates still comprise the bulk of full-time college enrollments. The most promising strategy for boosting enrollment of younger people is to increase retention rates of those already enrolled. Community colleges already have done a good job of enrolling slightly older students, with 27 percent of their students in the 25-34 age group in 1978. Costs will influence enrollment, and growing resistance to tuition and related price increases is expected. President Schafer's report concludes, " Colleges "Colleges should develop realistic enrollment projections and relate them to costs and revenues, should know the attrition rate from each program and take steps to reduce losses, should review pricing policies and decide whether to relate them to program costs, should review the mission to determine if new clientele groups should be cultivated, should find ways to shift program directions as appropriate to meet changing needs. Community colleges should prioritize programs based on community needs to quide any retrenchment, should endeavor to meet community needs but avoid becoming overextended, and should keep staff aware of possible effects on programs by enrollment declines."



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NOTABLE WOMEN - In a speech on the Senate floor last year, Oregon Sen. Bob Packwood recognized a number of women who contributed to the state's history. From the March 4, 1982, Congressional Record: "Among them are Tabitha Brown, a 66-year-old partial invalid, who led a wagon train through a disastrous shortcut - chosen by the train's male leadership - and brought it to a new life in the Oregon territory. Then in 1848, at the age of 71, this remarkable woman founded the Tualatin Academy, which is now known as Pacific University.... Governor Chamberlain's secretary, Mrs. C.B. Shelton, became the first woman to govern Oregon when, in the early 1900's, he took a seat in the Senate and left her in charge of State affairs....Margaret Jewett Bailey wrote the first novel printed on the Pacific slope, and Dr. Bethenia Owens-Adair had to receive a second medical degree, when her first was discredited, to become Oregon's first women physician."

TUITION DECISION POSTPONED - It was getting late and only four LCC Board of Education members still were in the room Wednesday night when the issue of raising tuition for next year was considered. So, the matter was carried over to the April 13 meeting. The administration proposal is to hike in-district credit tuition \$11 a term to \$198 for a full-time student, and to raise Community Education tuition by \$2 to \$27 for a 30-hour course. The move would raise an additional \$245,000 in revenue for next year's budget. Board member Larry Perry said he opposes the increase because tuition and cost of books are rising faster than student income.

CLOSING - The Library will be closed from March 21-25. Instructors wanting to place books on reserve for spring term should contact Jeremy Gunn in the Library, ext. 2273, by March 18.

PLANNING FOR INSTRUCTIONAL QUALITY -

The Quality of Instruction Planning Session participants identified the following nine priorities to emphasize in assuring the continuance of quality of instruction at LCC. A hearing will be held in the Board Room on Tuesday, March 15 from 3:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. for all persons who would like to comment on these or suggest ways in which they can be incorporated into LCC's planning and curriculum. Note that three of the nine are conceptual in nature, while the remaining six are objectives which can be matched with performance objectives.

- 1. Expand the teaching improvement program
- 2. Keep student learning as our top priority.
- 3. Concentrate more effort on how people learn.
- Teach all teachers content of Study Skills' <u>Effective Learning</u> class so they can teach students these techniques (e.g., mnemonics).
- 5. Maintain an environment in which we can practice self-renewal.
- 6. Support risk taking by reducing hazards of doing so.
- Emphasize use of business and industry teacher training.
- 8. Expand the concept of professional development leave.
- Recognize that the underlying prerequisite for quality is an environment of freedom.

MORE BOARD BUSINESS - Dean of Administrative Services Bill Berry and Dean of Instruction Gerald Rasmussen presented priority lists for expenditures, if the serial levy on the March 29 ballot is approved. Berry cited roofing, parking lot repair, exterior painting, and some carpet replacement as his leading priorities. Roofing of the Health, Forum, Science and Electronics buildings would get first attention next year. Rasmussen gave high priority to teaching equipment totaling some \$402,084 for 20 instructional departments. Mechanics, Business, Data Processing, Special Training Programs and Flight Technology would get the largest allocations in the first year, based on pressing needs.

NIOSH REPORT - Arvin Apol, industrial hygienist, and Steven Helgerson, M.D., from the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), were on campus Wednesday to present their formal report on their investigation of the Health Building. They conclude that "no detectable concentration of substances potentially capable of producing peripheral neuropathy existed in the environment on the days and under the conditions the sampling was conducted" and that "neither the pattern of reported symptoms nor the results of the nerve conduction velocity tests suggested that a neurotoxic substance had been responsible for the symptoms." They made 10 suggestions for improving the building ventilation system and work practices. Copies of the report are available for reading by those interested. 

THREE PASS, FOUR FAIL - Community colleges had a so-so in Tuesday's elections around the state. Chemeketa in Salem won a one-year operating levy which did not increase the tax rate. Clatsop in Astoria won a one-year operating levy which raised the tax rate from 97 cents to \$1.34, but which featured a rate below the average of recent years. Blue Mountain in Pendleton won a one-year operating levy which increased the tax rate by a nickle. None of the three has a tax base. In addition to Lane, losers included Linn-Benton at Albany, which had both A and B measures on the ballot; Treasure Valley in Ontario, which lost a B proposal; and Southwestern in Coos Bay, which lost A and B measures.

REELECTED - Steve John, Science, was reelected to a second four-year term on the Pleasant Hill School Board in Tuesday's election. He chairs Pleasant Hill's budget committee this year and last year chaired the school board.

RATIFIED - Karen Locke, Language Arts, reports that members of the Part-Time Teachers Association have ratified a 1983 contract.

COMEDY - Comedy-Rorschach Test, a comedy troupe starring LCC faculty members Bjo Ashwill of Counseling and Gary Russell of Math, performs an all-new show Friday. It will begin at 8 p.m. at the Condon Magnet Arts Elementary School. The cost is \$2 at the door.
