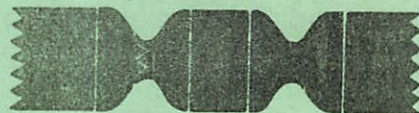

**POST-ELECTION THOUGHTS** - Final election totals for LCC's March 29 serial levy, in Lane and parts of Linn, Benton and Douglas counties, show 6,613 (35 percent) for and 12,246 against the proposal. Though recent special elections brought out only about 7 percent of the voters, this one attracted nearly 15 percent, Larry Romine (College/Community Relations) reports in a memo to President Schafer. LCC's support came from southeast Eugene, but the supportive precincts had light voter turnouts. Heavier voting in rural areas was not particularly supportive - 19 percent yes vote in Dunes City, 29 percent in Oakridge, 31 percent in Mapleton, and so on.

**AIR FARE '83** - KLCC begins its spring radiothon Saturday night at 6, with the program, Blackberry Jam. The station's goal is \$25,000. If KLCC reaches that goal by Monday, April 18, it will take additional pledges up to \$2,000 to meet a Corporation for Public Broadcasting Challenge Grant. This \$2,000 will give KLCC an opportunity to recover some of the budget cuts from both LCC and the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. For every \$3 above last year's membership contributions, CPB will donate \$1 to KLCC. More than a third of KLCC's budget comes from listeners and underwriters.

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**TODAY'S VISITORS** - More than 600 student delegates and their teachers from 33 Oregon high schools will participate in the Oregon State Thespian conference at LCC today, Friday and Saturday. Special guests of the conference are Peter Montgomery, a scholar and actor who will give the opening presentation and two workshops, all on various aspects of Greek drama; and Robert Johnson, assistant International Thespian Director, who will give a workshop on auditioning. Conference events are open only to delegates.

**LIVE...FROM D.C.** - Today, LCC puts its new satellite dish to work to bring a teleconference on nutrition live to local health professionals. The teleconference is being presented by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and is being sent by satellite to receiving sites around the country. Participants at the conference on this campus will hear and watch live presentations made by nationally known nutrition experts and have the opportunity to community by phone with panelists in Washington, D.C. The teleconference is LCC's first. LCC will provide use of the dish on a contract basis. The college initially will charge \$200 for the first hour and \$150 for each additional hour. The fee would include use of an LCC room equipped with television monitors and a telephone. The satellite dish was purchased for \$9,500 to improve and expand LCC's telecourse offerings. More than 1,000 students now enroll in telecourses each term. And the college anticipates that the use of the satellite to receive teleconferences will offset the cost of the dish. Today's teleconference will be held in Forum 308, starting at 10:30 a.m. It will focus on maternal and infant nutrition.

**ART AND FREEDOM** - Russian sculptor and painter Ernst Neizvestny will present an illustrated lecture, "Art and Freedom," at LCC on Friday, April 22. Since graduating in philosophy from Moscow University and in art from the Surikov Art Institute in Moscow, Neizvestny has gained an international reputation as the foremost Russian sculptor and philosopher of art. Neizvestny is humanist-in-residence at the University of Oregon this spring. A symposium on freedom and culture in the U.S.S.R. is planned by the university April 18-23. The lecture series will continue through June 4 in other Oregon communities.

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CONFERENCE TODAY - About 600 high school students from throughout Oregon are on campus today and Saturday for the 13th annual VICA Skill Olympics and Leadership Conference.
