ANSWER received an anonymously filled out questionnaire, and so will respond here for all.(If you have questions regarding college activities or policies and wish to find out the why's and wherefore's, call ext. 2201 for your own ANSWER questionnaire. The appropriate supervisor or administrator will respond to your question, and you will remain anonymous with that person.)

Q. Does LCC use herbicide sprays on campus grass and shrubs? Some mornings when we come to work, there is a strong smell on the grounds. Some staff members are having breathing difficulties after walking through area.

A. In reviewing our records the only substance which has been recently applied on campus on some of the shrubs was Bacillus thuringiensus, a bacterial insecticide formulation for control of lepitopterous larval insect pest organisms. This material is very target specific to insects but does contain some odor. Spray formulations are applied between the hours of 12 midnight and 6 a.m. based upon guidelines established by President Schafer, Dean Berry, Walt Van Orden and Dave Wienecke. (Ed. note: Bacillus thuringiensus is considered an organic substance.) (Walt Van Orden, Plant Services, responded.)
