GAS EXPLORATION - A Springfield firm which wants to drill for natural gas on the LCC campus won the right last Wednesday night to enter negotiations with the college administration. The LCC Board of Education heard talk of possible royalties of as much as \$100,000 a year for the college, if a producing well is found. The firm, Leavitt Exploration and Drilling Company, wants to drill in one of the dividers in the northeast parking lot. It could be next year before any work could begin.

OTHER BOARD BUSINESS - At last week's board meeting, it was decided that no further LCC levy proposals will be placed on the ballot this year. It also was announced that the Ford Motor Company will be conducting dealership technician training on weekends in the Mechanics Department. It means a windfall for Mechanics, which will get free repair manuals, engines and transmissions, and specialized tools. Management employees received an increase of \$50 in their annuities, and will share varying amounts of a 2½ percent raise in the salary package. President Eldon G. Schafer had his contract extended through June 1986 and received the same raise as other managers.

BUILDING PURCHASED - The LCC Board of Education decided to stop paying \$10,000 a year in rent for the Cottage Grove center and bought the building at 103 South Fifth St. for \$85,000. The money comes from previously received state construction funds. The 4,500 square-foot building was appraised at \$95,000. The seller, South Lane School District, originally asked for \$125,000.

NEW BOARD OFFICERS - Stephen Reid of Fall Creek will chair the LCC Board of Education this year. New vice chair is Larry Perry of Eugene. Reid joined the board in 1971 and was its chair from 1973 to 1975.
