CHANGES ANNOUNCED - The three deans have new titles, a couple of associate deans are to be relocated, and two departments have new names and assignments in changes announced by President Eldon G. Schafer.

The deans now are vice presidents. Gerald Rasmussen is Vice President for Instruction, Jack Carter is Vice President for Student Services, and Bill Berry is Vice President for Administrative Services. For some years, the common title for second-line administrators at U.S. community colleges has been vice president, President Schafer said.

Special Training Programs now is known as Industrial Technology Programs, with Carl Horstrup as coordinator. A welding quality circle proposed the name change as one which more accurately describes what is taught. Instructors in ITP approved the change , as did the Instructional Senate and, subsequently, President Schafer. Programs in ITP include welding technology, construction technology, landscape development and woodworking. Another new unit, Classroom Training Programs, under Leslie Rasor, takes responsibility for industrial orientation and CETA. The mobile classroom (bus) now reports to Loretta Daniel, coordinator for the Central Outreach Area. Earlier, other parts of the old STP were reassigned to the new Business Assistance Center, which Sandy Cutler directs. In the BAC are small business management, farm business management and rural small business resource center.

The Development Fund, from which Lyle Swetland retired June 30 as director, now is part of Community Relations and Development, which is headed by Larry Romine. Development moves from the Downtown Center to the President's Complex on the second floor of the Administration Building. At a time yet to be determined, the Resource Development office, now located in the Library, also will become part of the new development organization. To make room for the people moving in, Associate Deans of Instruction Z. Joyce Hopps and Jim Piercey will move out of the Administration Building to offices yet undesignated elsewhere on campus. Consolidation of community relations and development activities also is a trend at community colleges across the country, President Schafer said.

IN OTHER NEWS - The Health & Physical Education Department has a new department head, Jim Dunne, who will continue to head Mass Communication. Judy Dresser leaves the HPE post to remain as department head in Home Economics.

BOARD MEETS BY PHONE - Because no regular LCC Board of Education meeting is scheduled during August, the board meets today by telephone in a special session to handle a couple of bid awards. Glass Spray Service of Eugene, the only bidder, is expected to be awarded a job to apply a moss-killing agent on shake roofs on the main campus at a cost of \$6,996. Facilities seeks approval of a plant fund allocation of \$4,500 to pay for code compliance projects for the recently purchased facility at Cottage Grove.

In other reports sent to the board, Administrative Services Vice President Bill Berry advises that about \$1.9 million in cash carryover is being realized, as was expected and planned as part of the fiscal year 1983-84 budget...Berry also reports that the state-reimbursed FTE total for this year has been increased 57 to 7,618...Bill Mansell says investment earnings continue to generate income for LCC. Last year's earnings totaled \$768,828 in spite of a sharp drop in interest rates. Total investment earnings for the last five fiscal years total \$4.2 million...Negotiations for the possible drilling of a natural gas well on campus continue. Attorney Ed Harms suggests the state geologist be brought in to offer advice and that competitive bidding processes be used to determine who should get a drilling agreement.

TECH COMMITTEE APPOINTED - President Eldon G. Schafer has appointed a Technology Steering Committee to coordinate the increasing use of new technology in instruction and administration. Associate Dean Jim Ellison heads the group, which includes Jim Keizur of Data Processing, Verne Whittaker of Financial Services, Bob Marshall of Admissions, and Larry Warford of the President's Office. A planning process is to be developed between now and Dec. 31.

ELECTED - Linda Kluver, Student Employment coordinator, has been elected to the board of directors of the Northwest Placement Association. The group has members from colleges and private industry. Dixie Maurer-Clemons of the Science/CWE faculty is president-elect of the organization.

BACK AT WORK - After colon cancer surgery just a week ago last Friday, Howard Bird is on the job at the Work Activity Center. Wife Shirlee Bird reports her husband is doing well and, though the doctor's report is about a month away, the prognosis looks very good.
