

LENDING A HAND - Though LCC has its own budget problems, the college will lend a hand to three local agencies in the same plight. The Board of Education last week voted 6-0 to give \$14,132.20 to the Cooperative Museum Commission to support its 1983-84 budget. Also supporting the agency are the Lane Education Service District, City of Eugene, Lane County, and the University of Oregon. The commission hopes to construct a museum building in Alton Baker Park, in the next three to five years. The LCC board also authorized \$600 as LCC's share of support for the Southern Willamette Research Corridor Consortium. That group is working for economic diversification and improvement of the quality of life of the area. Its members include LCC, Linn-Benton C.C., Oregon State University, University of Oregon, Cities of Albany, Eugene, Junction City and Springfield, and the Oregon District 4 Council of Governments. The LCC administration announced it will loan accounting help to the Lane County assessor from Nov. 1 through Dec. 10 to help disburse property tax receipts. The 15 largest taxing districts in the county have been asked to help the understaffed assessment office, so that disbursements aren't delayed. LCC, for example, could lose about \$12,000 in interest earnings if receipt of taxes were delayed 10 days.

In other business at last Wednesday's meeting, the board was advised that LCC is making progress in affirmative action. Beth Webb, coordinator of the Dental Assisting program, said: "Overall, LCC seems to be doing very well...." She chaired a Compliance Review Committee which included Roy Summers, Bill Mansell, Rosco Wright, Dick Reid, Paquita Garatea, Patricia Creal and Nancy Cheffings. For a look at the report, check in your department office or, if none is available there, contact the President's Office.

A report to the board on student fees indicates the college collected \$194,286 last year in instructional fees and \$103,528 in student service fees. Board member Larry Perry, who had requested the summary, declared himself "pleased to see that fees generally are quite low."

PAY DISTRIBUTION - As a convenience, the college offers three methods of pay distribution. PAY FOR WORK-STUDY STUDENTS - College work-study checks will be disbursed at the Financial Services counter the day before payday, between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. All checks not picked up will be mailed after 2 p.m. the same day to students at their addresses on the Personnel Services data base.

ACCIDENT REPORT - In his 1982-83 safety/accident report, Bill Mansell says job-related accidents are up at LCC. "There were 56 job-related accidents totaling \$64,570 during 1982-83 - a 12 percent increase over 1981-82. The \$64,570 includes \$24,813 in reserves that cover the estimated final cost of accidents that are still on open status." Half of the accidents that occurred during the 1982-83 year resulted from falls or physical actions. Seven, serious, disabling accidents were responsible for the high accident cost total for 1982-83, according to Mansell, assistant to the vice president for administrative services.
