2) Three audio tapes for students: "How to Prepare for Tests and Take Them Effectively: What the Experts Say," "How to Lower Your Anxiety About Tests," and "How to Use the Keyword Method to Memorize New Words Fast and Surely." (Testing also has printed note for each tape.) 3) A readability analysis of your textbooks. This one is different. It is matched to the Degrees of Reading Power test given to entering students. So, in addition to getting the readability score, you also get figures as to what percentage of LCC students could and could not read it and understand 90, 75 and 50 percent. FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES - Innovations in High Tech Training: The state Legislature appropriated \$1 million in the current biennium, matched by private industry, for expanding and intensifying high tech training statewide. This program is research-directed, and an RFP should be out in mid-October. National Science Foundation: Etchics and Values in Science and Technology (EVIST) preliminary proposals are due Nov. 1; formal proposals are due Feb. 1. Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE) invites proposals to solve pressing problems in postsecondary education and to strengthen future opportunities for underserved populations of learners. Projects may receive support for one-, two- or three-year periods. The expected deadline for preliminary applications for 1984-85 funding is December 1983. The Mina Shaughnessy Scholars Program, Learning from Practice, which helps educators develop ideas emerging from their experiences as teachers and administrators within postsecondary education, will accept applications up to Nov. 1. DEPARTED - Adult Education coordinator Dick Newell died Saturday after a battle with cancer. He was 47. Newell, former chairman of LCC's Health and Physical Education Department and Athletic director, started at the college in 1967. He obtained his bachelor's degree from the University of Illinois, where he was an honorable mention his senior year for the football All-Big Ten. Newell went on to coach sports and teach in other communities. Among his community activities in this area were memberships on the Health Education Advisory Committee to the State Department of Education, the board of Pearl Buck School, and the Lane County Council on Alcoholism. Newell also was the former chairman of the Lane County Health Department Committee.

COMMEMORATION - "Because he was so tough, it took Dick Newell a long time to die. If he had not been such a fierce competitor, he would have foregone a lot of the suffering he went through. His bulldog tenacity to 'hang in there' would not let him quit. 'Give up' was just not a phrase in his vocabulary. The last time we talked, his body was wasted, but his jaw was set and there was still that spark of defiance in his eyes. It was important to him that he let us know he was still very much 'in the game.' In my heart I know as he left the arena for the last time, he was saying, 'Just wait until next year!'"-- Buck Bailey, Dave Roof, Nile Williams





That includes contracts with the City of Eugene and Lane County to serve 80 participants in the Clerical Training program. Another contract with the city and county will serve 160 dislocated workers. These projects are funded by the federal Job Training Partnership Act. This year, Classroom Training Programs will submit proposals with the Department of Education for additional projects.

GENDER GAP IN NATIONAL FACULTY PAY - The gap between salaries for women and men faculty continued to grow last year, with the average faculty woman making \$5,374 less than the average man. This comes from an NCES annual report (as noted in the Oct. 12 "Report on Education Research") based on survey responses from 2,748 colleges and universities. The report covers only faculty on nine-month contracts, who make up about 75 percent of all faculty. The gender gap has been growing steadily since the 1977-78 school year, according to the National Center for Education Statistics.
