PRE-COLLEGE SCIENCE EDUCATION - The National Science Foundation has announced the re-creation of a Directorate for Science Education which will focus on pre-college math and science. 

INVESTMENT EARNINGS DOWN - Investment earnings for the fiscal year's first quarter (July-September) were down from those for 1981 and 1982. According to Bill Mansell, Administrative Services, the decline in interest rates is the chief cause for the drop in earnings. Average interest rates were 8.89 percent for the 1983 quarter, 11.67 percent in 1982, and 16.71 percent in 1981, Mansell reports. LCC's earnings during the fiscal year's first quarter for each year were as follows: 1983, \$128,656; 1982, \$197,122; and 1981, \$197,161. (The average daily principle for 1983 was \$5,661,641 - compared to \$6,611,177 for 1982.)


