PERS AND SOCIAL SECURITY - Effective Jan. 1, 1984, payments into the Public Retirement System which are designated as employee contributions will be wages subject to Social Security contributions for both the employer and employee - even though they are picked up by the employer and paid with employer funds. As a result, employees who are PERS members will notice increases in Social Security withholding from their wages, beginning in January 1984. The change results from 1983 amendments to the Social Security Act (PL 98-21). Recent attempts to reverse the change have been stalled in Congress and will not be considered until some time in 1984.

Smoking in public meetings is prohibited." Facilities Director Paul Colvin reports that signs are being made in Printing/Graphics to designate smoking/nonsmoking areas. As approved by the Oregon Legislature, the state law requires stores, restaurants, bowling alleys, banks, schools, auditoriums and other public buildings to ban smoking or set aside designated smoking areas.
