The colonel was also puzzled for a while, but after reviewing the pictures the answer came to him in a flash. "Ah," he said, "I have it. They are holding the horses."

HALFWAY THERE - Twenty-three of 45 accreditation reports have been submitted to Word Processing. That means there are 22 yet to go. To keep on schedule, all reporting units should submit their final drafts to Word Processing by Feb. 1.

UPS AND DOWNS - Registration at the end of the second week of this term was down 115.8 FTE from 2,054.6 FTE enrolled at the same time last year. The headcount also is lower this year. At the end of the second week of winter term 1983, 7,463 students were enrolled; of these 5,139 were full-time, 2,324 were part-time. At the end of last week, the headcount was 7,255 - with 4,920 full-time students and 2,335 part-time ones. By department, some of the drops came in Mechanics, which lost 28.7 FTE; Electronics, which lost 21.6 FTE; Special Programs, which lost 18.4 FTE; Mathematics, which lost 16.6 FTE; and the Siuslaw Area Center, which lost 8.2 FTE. Human Development gained 6.2, and Language Arts picked up 4.4 FTE.

ESCAPE THE PROCRASTINATION TRAP - Why do you procrastinate? How can you change? Summarizing from the newsletter, "The Office Professional":

****Procrastination is unnecessary delay in action. Rarely is it due simply to the obvious (laziness, poor time management) - other factors usually count. There's the fear of discomfort. But the discomfort you feel when doing a task is seldom as great as that imagined; and exaggerating an activity's difficulty produces procrastination. There's fear of failure. Perfectionists procrastinate, thinking, "Better no action than the wrong action." There's also fear of success. Have you put off reviewing and writing career goals? Why? Some procrastinate because they have excessive need for approval. Everything's a priority because the approval-seeker doesn't want to let anyone down. Still others need to passively rebel. Learn to assertively confront instead.

Once you've identified why you procrastinate, you can begin the process of change.

****Clarify your values. Make a list of the areas in your life that are important to you. Then search for conflicting values. Procrastination may be the result of such inner conflicts.
Pinpoint your fears. To combat procrastination, you need to discover the fears which are keeping you from moving ahead with important projects. Ask yourself, "What is it about this situation that scares me?"
Set realistic expectations. Attempting to do too many things can get you sidetracked and you're guaranteed to end up doing a lot of tasks that don't really matter.
Decide when procrastination makes sense. If it looks as if doing a task today will only result in redoing it tomorrow, skip it.
Record excuses. And make a second list of realistic statements to counter them.
Break big projects into smaller ones.
Time yourself. How long do tasks take to complete?
Use the five-minute trick. If you're avoiding a project, force yourself to work on it for five minutes. Decide then whether to continue or take up the project later.
Capitalize on your prime internal time. Tackle the tougher jobs when you have the most energy. Are you a morning person? An afternoon worker?
Avoid diversions. Eliminate busy-work.
Work with a friend. When possible, make projects a team effort.
Let go of perfectionism. Prove to yourself you won't die if something's not perfect. Deliberately complete one project without making it perfect.
Give up guilt. Stop putting yourself down, and start taking action.
Reward yourself. When you're successful, pat yourself on the back.

****"Every victory you achieve over procrastination will reduce the amount of stress in your life, will enhance your sense of control over your job, and will identify you as the type of self-manager who knows how to set priorities."
