**WHAT ACTIVITIES AT LCC DO YOU FEEL HAVE PRESENTED YOU WITH PROFESSIONAL GROWTH OPPORTUNITIES?** -Jay Marston, an instructor in the Science Department, says his work in the Science Quality Circle has helped him and his department. The quality circle "allows me to have a better perspective of problems in the department and makes me see that there are no easy, quick answers to problems - but there is a scientific process one can use to come up with the best possible solution," he says.

Coordinated by the Productivity Center, quality circles are entering their third year at LCC and continue to stress staff involvement in problem solving and decision making in work units. This term, seven quality circles are meeting weekly. Each group has 4 to 12 members. The Productivity Center, with assistance from Staff Development, trained 10 new facilitators Jan. 26 and 27. **OREGON EXTERN PROGRAM** - The Oregon Extern Program is looking for a few good people! **TECHNICAL SKILLS UPDATE: MINI-GRANTS** - Want to visit a business, industry or agency to learn new skills? Need to take a class for recertification or want to update your technical skills? Stipends of up to \$75 for these purposes now are available to vocational instructors from the Oregon Department of Education through the Lane Education Service District and Staff Development. Last year, 16 LCC staff participated in this opportunity and \$1,373 was spent.

**George Alvergue**, Social Science, requested a technical skills mini-grant to visit power plants in Washington, Oregon and British Columbia to familiarize himself with the interworkings of coal burning and hydroelectric power plant and their tie-in to the Bonneville Power Administration supply system.

**Albert Rowe**, Industrial Technology Programs, helped fund the "High Technology Welding Application" show held at LCC last February. The show provided participants exposure to high technological developments in the welding and fabrication fields and encouraged further education and understanding of future industrial practices and trends.

I was under the impression that doctor appointments were to be entered on a sick leave form, even if only for one hour. Awaiting your answer in The Daily..."

A. "Accumulated sick leave can be used by classified employees, as needed, for doctor appointments. With the supervisor's prior approval, both vacation leave and personal emergency leave also can be used for this purpose. Except when employees use accumulated compensatory time for doctor appointments, all such absences should be reported through the leave reporting system as either paid or unpaid absences."

## ANNOUNCING LEAGUE FOR INNOVATION INNOVATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

The League for Innovation in the Community College has created an award that is designed to recognize League College staff members who have designed and implemented a significant innovation during this past year. The recognition is known as the Innovator of the Year Award, and is given annually to one individual from each of the 18 League member college districts. Any current Lane Community College employee, part-time or full-time, may be considered for the award.

The recipient of the Innovator of the Year Award will receive a plaque from the League for Innovation to be presented at an appropriate LCC function. The award winner will also be featured in the League publication, JOTTINGS.

Last year's award went to Spanish Instructor Arden Woods. She implemented the use of the computer in her Spanish instruction and has developed a program that is of interest nationally.

The deadline for nominations is March 16.

## CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

### WHO MAY NOMINATE?

Nominations may come from anyone either inside or outside the college.

### WHAT ARE THE SELECTION CRITERIA?

The award will be given to an individual who has designed and implemented a significant innovation at LCC. The League has established the following criteria for making their selection from among nominees. PLEASE NOTE THAT ONE OR MORE OF THE CRITERIA SHOULD BE MET, BUT IT IS NOT NECESSARY THAT ANY NOMINEE SHOULD MEET ALL CRITERIA.

1. Quality - Students and/or staff agree that the innovation increases quality in the course program, office or institution. Evidence of quality may include student ratings or letters of support from colleagues.

(over)

2. Efficiency - There is evidence that the innovation or outstanding program contributes to a more efficient way of doing things. Student ratings, perceptions of outside consultants, and pre- and post-comparison of time involved are examples of evidence.
3. Cost effectiveness - There is evidence that the innovation adds a value to the institution while at the same time containing or reducing costs. Cost data will serve as evidence.
4. Replication - The program selected can be used by other institutions with a minimum of difficulty. The description of the program should include any conditions necessary for replication.
5. Creativity - The selected program should be as original as possible or the adaptation should at least be creative. The description of the program or letters from experts are examples of evidence.
6. Timeliness - The award-winning program should not be more than five years old at that institution, but it must have been around long enough to have been tested so that it meets most of the criteria.

#### HOW WILL THE WINNER BE SELECTED?

LCC's Innovator of the Year Award Selection Committee will review the nomination and supporting materials and select one award winner by April 15 of each year. The committee will invite and encourage high quality nominations, and in the event no nominations are deemed to be of a caliber worthy of nationwide recognition, no award will be made that year.

The selection committee consists of three LCC employees representing management, faculty, and classified personnel and two members from the community. Larry Warford, League representative, chairs the committee.

#### HOW ARE NOMINATIONS MADE?

Nominations should consist of the name and department of the innovator and a one-page description of the project, process, item or activity supported by relevant materials. If materials are visual, or in some other form, it may be necessary for the nominee to make arrangements for the Award Selection Committee to have access for viewing purposes.
