FAMILY STORY - The saga continues.... "Roots! My roots started in 1931 and within 1 1/8 miles of the LCC campus in the little valley beyond the wooded hills southwest of LCC, where I still live and raise cattle and hay with my brothers on the same farm that I grew up and that has been in the family since 1917. (I believe the Hoffman Chicken Ranch dates back further to homestead time.)

To me, the significant thing is the change that I've seen of an area I've known for 40 years. Anyhow, the question was asked about roots, so the following is offered in unity and interest and not competition - nor being first with the most.

We logged from the home farm to the area of the southwest parking lot of LCC. Our truck road ran east and west along a fence which was an extension of the cyclone fence that still parallels the east drive. It ran through what is now the Mechanics and Performing Arts buildings. I also hunted deer and searched for stray cattle on the flat where LCC now stands.

I remember playing in the old World War II gypo sawmill that used to be located near the southwest corner of LCC.

I met a former resident who some say burned in his house on the LCC site and whose ghost is said to occupy the Performing Arts building.

As one can see, the LCC site is also part of my roots and I can still see the deer and pheasants among the wild roses when we came to log in the morning. At that time I had no idea that I would be returning to work in the same area, but in a different world in later years.

MORE REGISTRATION FIGURES - At the end of new-student registration week, the total FTE enrollment was 1,596.3 - down 160.8 from the FTE total at the same time in spring term of 1983. A few departments experienced increases; they were Art & Applied Design, Health Occupations, Speech & Mass Communication, Human Development, Central Area and Study Skills. Other departments experienced drops in FTE, from spring 1983 to spring 1984. They ranged from a 31 percent drop in FTE enrollment in Electronics to a 19 percent drop in Flight Technology and 6 percent drop in Business.

MORE FTE FIGURES - The Oregon Educational Coordinating Commission estimated that community colleges on the average spend less per FTE student than do public universities and elementary/secondary schools. LCC's cost was \$2,462 per FTE in 1982-83. That was the second-lowest dollar figure for Oregon community colleges. Cheapest was Portland, with \$2,275 per FTE. At the other end of the scale was Clatsop, spending \$4,542 per FTE. The average public university cost was \$4,008; the average elementary/secondary school cost was \$3,111.

WHAT ACTIVITIES AT LCC DO YOU FEEL HAVE PRESENTED YOU WITH PROFESSIONAL GROWTH OPPORTUNITIES?

UNDERTAKING A RESEARCH PROJECT OR TEACHING A SPECIAL WORKSHOP OUTSIDE YOUR NORMAL AREA CAN BE A GROWTH OPPORTUNITY FOR SOME PEOPLE ON CAMPUS. Assistance in writing proposals for funding these activities can be found in the GRANTS OFFICE. LISL FENNER, Grants Office Coordinator, spends a large percentage of her time doing consulting for LCC staff members and for any group wanting information on how to prepare funding proposals. Lisl receives 75-90 inquiries for assistance each year, 55-60 of which result in finished proposals.

In 1983, ROBIN RUSSELL, Coordinator of Instructional Computing Support, received a grant to do a two-year pilot study to determine if computers can be used successfully in auto mechanics instruction in high schools and community colleges.

In 1982, ALLEN GUBRUD, Science instructor and Coordinator of Energy Programs, received a grant to present a one-week workshop for 15 high school physics teachers on "Installation of Solar Domestic Hot Water Heating Systems."

JOE SEARL, Geography instructor, was awarded a grant by the Oregon Committee for Humanities in 1979 to reconstruct the past townscape of Valsetz, Oregon from its founding in the early 1920s to 1979. In February of this year, JOE was contacted to act as historical geographer on a grant to study Oakridge, Oregon as groundwork for a play about Oakridge to be scored by Mason Williams, a resident of the area.

Lisl seeks grant funding for LCC by making formal presentations to corporate, public, and charitable entities. One major project on which she has been working since 1979 involves a consortium of six community colleges in Western Oregon. This consortium has received several grants to complete a large telecommunications project that will expand the geographic areas receiving telecourses. The project is scheduled for completion in 1988.

LEARNING ABOUT COMPUTER-BASED INSTRUCTION: RESOURCES AT LCC

The Staff Development Office has received two video tapes on COMPUTER-BASED EDUCATION. These tapes have been reviewed by five faculty members who see them as a good general overview for faculty who have had little exposure to computers and their application in instruction. Accompanying the tapes are 25 packets containing more specific information about instructional use of computers. Interested staff are invited to view the video tape and encouraged to seek out resource people here at LCC.

LCC RESOURCE PEOPLE

ROBIN RUSSELL, Coordinator for Instructional Computing Support in Data Processing, is one of many excellent instructional computer resource persons at LCC. Robin is hired on a state-funded grant as a specialist in computer-assisted instruction. Her duties are to assist individual faculty and staff with the selection of appropriate instructional hardware and software, provide computer training for staff and students and work with staff in developing instructional software. Robin is presently converting an instructional program developed by BETH WEBB, Coordinator of the Dental Assisting Program, for computer use.

NUMBERS GAME - Each term, The Daily prints figures from a registration analysis provided the Administrative Council by Jack Carter, dean of Student Services. In the past, we've run FTE enrollment changes, as in: Mechanics is 14.4 FTE down spring term 1984 from spring 1983; Math is 25.1 FTE down, and Study Skills is 1.4 FTE up. Departments didn't like this presentation of statistics because it offers no context - a 26.5 FTE drop in a department (Electronics) that had 84 FTE in spring 1983 means something different than a 24.1 FTE decrease in a department (Social Science) that had a 206.2 FTE in spring 1983. It was suggested The Daily provide percentage increases and decreases, so that departments' FTE figures could be more reasonably compared. It turns out that departments don't like this either. To uncomplicate the whole matter and provide information for information's sake, The Daily will provide a lot of numbers:

DO YOU ENJOY YOUR JOB BUT WISH THERE WAS MORE CAREER MOBILITY? YOU HAVE BEEN WORKING AT THE SAME JOB FOR 15 YEARS AND WOULD LIKE A CHANGE, BUT DO NOT KNOW WHAT OTHER OPTIONS YOU HAVE? Perhaps a career and life planning counselor could help, but private counselors in Eugene charge \$35 to \$48 an hour for consultations. WAIT...LCC has a counseling department and it is available to all staff members at NO CHARGE. The counseling department is scrupulous about protecting employee confidentiality, so actual numbers are not available, but a random check of three counselors revealed an average of five staff members seen a year by each counselor. With 20 counselors on campus, it is feasible that 100 staff members a year may be using the counseling resources at LCC.

Study Skills Counselor, JAN BRANDSTROM, sees an average to six to twelve staff members a year. Her consultations can occur formally once a week for several weeks, or informally over lunch, and are equally divided between males and females. JAN feels that the better job she can do counseling staff, the better the college will be, even if, as a result of counseling, her client decides that leaving LCC is best for them.

MARJE WYNIA, Science Counselor, emphasizes the additional role of counselors as referral agents. When a staff member comes to MARJE with a need that cannot be met by resources at LCC, she locates an appropriate off-campus agency and refers her client to them.

JEAN CONKLIN, Career Information Specialist in the Counseling Department, sees the Career Information Center as a tremendous resource for staff who are seeking career changes. JEAN is available to assist staff gather information about career options. All counselors will help staff through the stressful events involved with life and career changes.

For staff who have taken advantage of career planning classes, re-entry workshops, and individual counseling but are still searching, LCC also offers assistance through the Job Skills Lab. The services of the lab can be utilized to enhance success when applying for a job ON CAMPUS or OFF. With the job market changing daily, interviewing and resume writing skills may need to be updated. CONNIE MESQUITA, Job Skills Lab instructor, says the lab offers skill-building mini-sessions focusing on the "hidden" job market, employer expectations, resume writing and interviewing. The lab also assists their clients with techniques to develop their own networks and job leads.

To accommodate staff unable to use the counseling facilities during the day, the department is open until 8 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, with the Career Information Center open until 8 p.m. every Tuesday. With the exception of summer quarter, a Career and Life Planning class is scheduled in the evening each quarter. Contact for assistance with any phase of decision making can be made with individual counselors or through the department office at ext. 2204.
