PROFESSIONAL LEAVE - Faculty wanting to apply for winter term 1985 professional development leave can pick up forms at Staff Development or the Office of Instruction. Applications are due this Friday.

CAREER TALK - This Thursday, the Career Information Center will show a videotape of a talk given last term by Esther Mathews, University of Oregon professor emerita in counseling psychology. Mathews talked about the roots of career development in women and men. (How do women and men differ in their approaches to career choice? What part do "life's accidents" and crises play in career choice?) The program is scheduled from 3 to 4 p.m. in Center 219.

PROPOSALS REQUESTED - In order to make more appropriate decisions on major video and slide productions, Media Productions is establishing a biannual call for proposals. If you are interested in producing a major work, please contact Media Productions, ext. 2365, for a proposal format. A major work is defined as any videotape series of five or more half-hour programs - or any multi-projector slide program. Media Productions is currently scheduled through summer term. Proposals are due May 30 to be produced fall and winter 1984-85. Another call for proposals will occur in December to schedule productions for spring and summer 1985.

SUCCESSFUL RADIOTHON - As reported earlier, KLCC completed its spring radiothon - pulling in \$30,105 from 1,083 listeners, for an average gift of \$27.80. More than 150 businesses donated more than 200 different goods and services to KLCC for use as premiums to motivate calls with pledges. Donated premiums came from businesses in Bend, Corvallis, Mapleton, Florence and Lincoln City, as well as from the Eugene/Springfield metropolitan area. Local restaurants donated meals to feed hungry KLCC volunteers. The radio station will allocate \$5,000 from the spring radiothon to purchase and install a new transmitter this fall. A book faire with B. Dalton Booksellers brought in \$431.19.

WHAT HAPPENED TO YOUR IDEAS?

Remember last year's helicopter ride and planning for LCC's future? Your input in that project has been integrated by the President and Vice Presidents into the official college goals and objectives for the next three years. A progress report on projects from one of the five themes follows. Other themes include "Technology," "Planning and Decision Making," "Human Resource Development," and "Financial Resources." Progress reports on the remaining four theme projects are scheduled for later Daily publication.

Theme: QUALITY OF INSTRUCTION

Lead: GERRY RASMUSSEN

The planning group which met in February of 1983 to address this theme and who recommended the projects below included: RYAN ANDERSON, TITO BALDUCCI, TOM BIRKENHEAD, NICK CHESHIRE, RON EDELMAN, SHEILA GARDIPEE, JEROME GARGER, DAN HODGES, DIXIE MAURER-CLEMONS, CORINNE MEEHAN, LARRY MURRAY, NAN PHIFER, TOM REIMER, ADELINE ROMOSER, BETH WEBB and DOUG WHITE.

PROJECTS

1. Expand the Teaching Improvement Process (TIP) Program. This program is now being managed through the Staff Development Office by ANNE STEWART. JOIN KOCHER, an LCC Social Science instructor, is receiving training as a third consultant. A video promotion film has been prepared and various showings arranged. A proposal has been presented requesting funds for a fourth consultant for next year. In 1981-82, the TIP program served one client from one department; 1982-83, seven clients from four departments; and in 1983-84, ten clients from seven departments.
2. Use Industry for Teacher Training. A comprehensive plan to achieve this project was completed in April through the efforts of a committee chaired by CWE Department Head, BOB WAY. Committee members included BEV BEHRMAN, PEGGY MARSTON, DIXIE MAURER-CLEMONS, and DOUG WHITE, with assistance from ANNE STEWART of the Staff Development Office. The plan explores both direct industry/college exchanges as well as CWE approaches and presents considerations for implementation. A copy of this plan is on file in the Staff Development Office.
3. Teaching Effective Learning Techniques to Teachers. The Study Skills Department responded to this objective by offering a new class called "Teaching Effective Learning Strategies" during spring term. Since it provided University of Oregon graduate credits, it was particularly directed towards LCC staff and high school/middle school instructors. The higher tuition cost (\$204) resulted in low enrollment, so the class was cancelled. This concept is being re-explored.
4. Expanding Leave for Staff. A committee chaired by BILL PORTER with members BEV BEHRMAN, JAY JONES, LARRY WARFORD, JIM PIERCEY, DARLENE TURPIN, and ANNE STEWART, reviewed all existing staff leave programs and explored various ways of increasing the effectiveness of existing programs, and developing new programs. One committee recommendation was better utilization of existing leave resources. As a result, the Management Professional Leave Committee has revised leave procedures for managers and the Staff Development Office is researching and publicizing opportunities through their Daily column. This spring the Staff Development Office plans to offer an informational workshop featuring past leave recipients and members of the Faculty Professional Development Leave Committee.

ON THE BALLOT - Among the items on your ballot next Tuesday, May 15, is LCC's proposed tax base increase. President Eldon G. Schafer says the new tax base, if approved, would support college operations for at least two years. The new tax base would permit financial and educational program planning, and allow LCC to continue present offerings. College district voters will be asked to support a \$1.6-million increase in LCC's tax base. The college's budget will go up an estimated 7.5 percent if district voters approve the new tax base. The proposed \$12.2-million base is estimated to increase the district tax rate to \$1.87 per \$1,000 assessed property value, or to \$112.20 for the owner of a \$60,000 home. The LCC District's present tax base is \$10,596,502. The tax rate is \$1.55 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, or \$93 this year for a \$60,000 home.

ELECTION DAY - Don't forget to vote today. Polls are open until 8 p.m. And, if you're not registered, you still may go to the Lane County Elections Department (135 East Sixth) to do so. On the ballot are numerous local, state and national candidates - as well as a few ballot initiatives and tax-related measures. LCC is proposing a new tax base limitation that would increase the current tax base by \$1.6 million. The tax base permits financial and educational program planning, controls cost increases to district taxpayers, allows funds for maintenance of buildings and for instructional equipment, and eliminates the need for a levy election. The new tax base would provide support for college operations for at least two years. In dollars and cents: The proposed \$12.2-million tax base is estimated to increase the district tax rate to \$1.87 per \$1,000 assessed property value, or to \$112.20 for the owner of a \$60,000 home. The LCC District's present tax base is \$10,596,502. The tax rate is \$1.55 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, or \$93 this year for a \$60,000 home. If approved, the new tax base limitation would apply to the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1984.

SERVICE FOR LEMKE - Carl Lemke, a former LCC aviation mechanics instructor, has died. A funeral service is scheduled at 10 a.m. on Wednesday, at Poole-Larsen at 1100 Charnelton St. in downtown Eugene. Contributions may be made to the heart fund. Lemke, who retired from LCC in 1976, was with the college from the beginning. "He was one of the most conscientious and smartest mechanics we ever had around here," says Lorelei Jossart, administrative assistant in Mechanics. Wife Nadine Lemke survives her husband.

PROJECTS

Lead: JIM ELLISON

1. Create a Task Force for Technology. A steering committee for technology was formed during fall term. Members JIM KEIZUR, VERNE WHITTAKER, LARRY WARFORD, BOB MARSHALL and JIM ELLISON met weekly and developed a process, in conjunction with the Vice Presidents, to guide the development of technology and estimate the capital outlay needs for technology in 1984-85.
2. Planned Expansion and Application of Technology. Within the next month the Technology Steering Committee will be meeting to work on a master plan for technology.
3. Computer Networking. This is a component of the Technology Master Plan. Two networks are currently being developed, one in Financial Services and the other in Student Services.
4. Establish Institutional Priorities for the Allocations of Technology Resources. This objective is met in project number one, above.
5. All Star Advisory Committee from Throughout Country Through Teleconferencing. This is part of the technology inservice activity which will start next year.
6. Technology Literacy. ANNE STEWART was appointed to chair a committee to work on this project. Committee members ANN BARRETT, JOHN LOUGHLIN, SUE JORDAN, JON SCHWARTZ, RENÉE LoPILATO, CAROL BECKLEY, BILL MULLIN and ROBIN RUSSELL began meeting in March and will submit recommendations to the Technology Steering Committee by the end of spring term.

Lead: BILL BERRY

7. Provide Release Time and Carrots for Staff Involvement. This is most likely a collective bargaining issue. Some release time is being granted by individual departments on an informal basis to allow staff to acquire technological skills, as one example.
8. Ways to Generate Resources to Pay for Technology. BILL BERRY has received an estimate of capital outlay requirements for technology from 1984 to 1986 from the Technology Steering Committee. Suggested ways to meet these needs include some monies from the regular budget, grant writing to acquire outside funding, and donated equipment. Bill states that talented staff from across campus are continually exploring methods of creative financing.
