**INFORMATION NETWORK** - A new statewide education computer information network is planned for Oregon, according to the Oregon Community College Association (OCCA) "news digest." The network, ORE-NET, is a cooperative venture of the Oregon School Boards Association (OSBA), the Confederation of Oregon School Administrators (COSA), the OCCA and the Oregon Department of Education. ORE-NET will provide up-to-date information about education, business, job vacancies, current legal issues and other topics. Electronic mail also will be part of the service. The Oregon network will link subscribers with two national networks, THE SOURCE and ED-LINE. Most standard microcomputers, modems, word processors, data terminals and printers will connect members to the system. Network membership applications will be accepted after Sept. 1. Fees will range from \$25-75 a month (plus computer-connect time).



**NEW JOBS PAY LESS** - A report released July 30 by the Joint Legislative Committee on Trade and Economic Development, "Declining Numbers of 'Family Wage' Jobs: A Threat to Oregon's Economic Health?," finds that most of the high wage jobs lost during the recession are being replaced by jobs with low wages.

"While 60,000 of the 75,000 jobs Oregon lost to the recession were in industries paying an average wage of \$10/hour, only about half of the 25,000 jobs produced by the recovery have been in those industries," the report says. Most growth has been in service jobs paying between \$5 and \$6.50 an hour. The report also found that it is unlikely the loss in manufacturing and construction industry jobs will ever be made up and that a decline in the number of jobs paying about \$20,000 a year means a lower standard of living and poorer quality of life for most Oregonians.

**MOBILE CLASSROOM CONTINUES GROWING** - More people will be able to take advantage of more services this fall on Lane Community College's mobile classroom. The mobile classroom is expanding services with the arrival of a new, specially designed vehicle that will travel to Mapleton, Veneta, Oakridge and Junction City this fall. A 40-foot, fifth-wheel trailer will replace the old Navy bus the college converted into a classroom when the program started seven years ago.
