BOARD MEETING TONIGHT - The LCC Board of Education meets tonight at 7:30, in the Board Room. On the agenda: consideration of a tax base increase proposal for the Nov. 6 ballot, reports on investments and safety, personnel matters, and other items. The meeting is open to the public.

OPEN HOUSE - The LCC Central Area Education Center in Cottage Grove holds an open house Thursday, Sept. 13, from 3 to 7 p.m. You are invited to the LCC center, located at 103 South 5th St. The open house offers an opportunity for welcoming Deborah Holmes as the center's new coordinator. Holmes, formerly coordinator of the Rural Small Business Program, is no stranger to LCC or the Cottage Grove community.

ENROLLMENT DECLINING - Applications to enroll at LCC are lagging 10 to 12 percent behind last year at this time, according to Vice President Jack Carter. The result could be a 5 to 6 percent drop in enrollment, he says. LCC might enroll about 8,300 full-time equivalent students this year instead of the budgeted 8,500. Some faculty cutbacks could occur as a result among part-timers. Reports are that the same decline is happening across the state among two-year colleges. Causes probably include the aggressive recruiting by fouryear institutions, competition from proprietary schools and the military, and the shrinking number of people in the high school pool.

ELECTION NEXT WEEK - On the Sept. 18 ballot are several money measures, from: Port of Siuslaw, Siuslaw Library, Bethel School District and South Lane School District. Also on the ballot is a one-year tax levy proposal from LCC. The college is seeking voter approval of the levy to maintain job training, educational programs and other services at last year's level. Passage of the levy would reduce uncertainty for enrolling students, according to college administrators, who emphasize the levy cannot be continued beyond a year without another vote of college district voters. Local voters last approved a college budget measure in 1980. The proposed \$652,625 levy would balance a proposed \$28.2-million operating budget for 1984-85. Voter approval of the levy would raise the LCC property tax rate an estimated nine cents above this year's rate of about \$1.63 per \$1,000 assessed value.

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REPORT FROM BOARD MEETING - Wednesday night, LCC Board of Education members continued their discussion of college funding, then voted unanimously to ask for a new \$12.4-million tax base at the Nov. 6 election. The board also heard where the \$566,626 in cuts will come if the college's one-year levy fails Tuesday. Projected cuts would include: reductions in part-time personnel of \$125,000; elimination of program improvements totalling \$118,403; reductions in capital outlay of \$50,000; and reductions in the college contingency fund of \$50,000. In addition, seven full-time positions vacated by retirement or resignation would not be filled.

The board also learned the Work Activity Center will be moved from its present crowded quarters in the Downtown Center to a building across from the Eugene Clinic at 1149 Willamette. The 4,700-square feet building will be leased with money from a mental health grant.

In personnel actions, the board hired Rita A. Hennessy as a parttime instructor in Social Science, James F. Webb as accounting/ reporting supervisor in Financial Services, and Deborah Holmes as coordinator of the Central Area Education Center. The board also accepted the resignations of Douglas M. Partridge, Mechanics; Richard White, Counseling; Mark A. Johnson, Flight Technology; and Casey Fast, Productivity Center. The board acknowledged with regret the planned retirement on March 31 of Howard Dull, Mechanics Department head. At the board meeting, President Eldon G. Schafer announced that Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts will replace Casey Fast as director of the Productivity Center.

VOTERS TURN DOWN LEVY - Tuesday voters in Lane County said "no" to LCC's \$652,625 levy request. As reported at last week's LCC Board of Education meeting, projected cuts would include: reductions in part-time personnel of \$125,000; elimination of program improvements totalling \$118,403; reductions in capital outlay of \$50,000; and a reduction in the college contingency fund of \$50,000. In addition, seven full-time positions vacated by retirement or resignation would not be filled. The college will ask for a new \$12.4-million tax base at the Nov. 6 election.

AND THE WINNER IS - Nancy Burian received the 1983-84 Classified/ Support Staff Award in Wednesday's all-staff session. Burian, a scheduling specialist, has worked at LCC since 1968. In her job, she assigns times and rooms to LCC's more than 1,500 classes each term. One person nominating Burian for the annual award wrote, "Nancy handles one of the most crucial jobs on the entire campus. Having the responsibility of scheduling all departments... must be a high pressure position. However, Nancy seems to handle this with complete calm and assurance, always completely level headed, ready with the right answer to soothe the caller who might be overwrought at the prospect of an 'eleventh hour' schedule change." Burian was selected from among 17 nominees. She received 12 separate nominations representing all segments of campus. Previous winners of the award have been Selmer Looney, 1979-80; Jo Anderson, 1981-82; and Nancy Fausone and Jerry Sirois, 1982-83. No award was given in 1980-81.

STILL NEWS - It must have seemed too obvious to include in Thursday's Daily...but, for those who didn't already hear it, LCC President Eldon G. Schafer has announced plans to retire as the college president - effective July 30, 1985. The LCC Board of Education will conduct a national search for his successor. Schafer has been president of LCC since 1970. He says he is looking forward to fishing and golf and "truly does intend to retire." The president announced his retirement at Wednesday's all-staff meeting, where he assured his audience the decision to retire was "only tangentially" related to his health. In 1979, Schafer was diagnosed as having multiple myeloma, cancer of the bone marrow. On Wednesday, the president said he and his wife decided 20 years ago to retire when their son completed college (which will occur this school year). During his years in education, Schafer has served in many national offices and won many awards, including in 1981 the Marie Y. Martin Professional Educator Award, considered to be the highest honor available to a community college administrator. In 1982, he received the University of Oregon's Pioneer Award for community leadership. The president also has twice been invited by the government of the People's Republic of China to advise them on the establishment of a network of polytechnic schools. He made the first trip in 1982 and will return the first two weeks of October of this year.

WORSE THAN EXPECTED - At the end of regular registration last Friday, the college's enrollment was down 12.3 percent in full-time equivalent (FTE) students and down 11.5 percent in headcount, compared to fall term 1983. Vice President Jack Carter says all categories are down - full-time, part-time and evening. Only three departments experienced increases: Language Arts, Health Occupations and the Library. Total college FTE for the year could dip below 8,000, Carter says. Staffing adjustments are occurring to cover budget deficits which accompany enrollment slippage.
