BUSINESS COUNSELING PAYS OFF - Business counseling at LCC's Small Business Development Center is making a difference, according to an evaluation of the service's impact. Center clients are doing better than national averages in a number of areas. For instance, clients surveyed reported a net employment gain of 6 percent, almost twice the national average. Particularly significant were reported increases in sales or profits. Forty-four percent of client businesses indicated increases in sales or profits attributable to the business counseling the center provides, with 22 percent reporting increases of 10 to 20 percent. The national gain for small businesses was 4.3 percent.

CLASSIFIED HAVE CONTRACT - After several months of negotiation by bargaining teams of the LCC Employees Federation and the college, a proposed contract was approved Wednesday by the LCC Board of Education. LCCEF members okayed the proposal last week. The total package represents a 5.57 percent salary/benefit increase for employees for 1984-85 and a 5.10 percent increase for 1985-86. **In the contract for 1984-85:** Eligible employees receive step advancements, and the salary schedule increases by 1.5 percent - both items retroactive to July 1, 1984. Insurance benefits are maintained. Full-time employees who've completed at least three years on Step 8 as of July 1, 1984, receive a \$200 "bonus" in January. (The bonus will be pro-rated for eligible part-timers.) President's Day now will be a paid holiday. **In the 1985-86 contract:** The salary schedule increases 2.5 percent, and eligible employees receive step advancements on July 1, 1985. Insurance benefits are maintained. The contract contains other changes, including the creation of a staff development fund. It is expected bargaining-unit members will receive step advancements, salary-schedule increases and retroactive pay in October.

NEW PURCHASING EXPENDITURE GUIDELINES - New guidelines were adopted by the LCC board Sept. 12, and the next BOM revisions will detail the changes. Major changes now in effect:

PURCHASES UNDER \$1,000.....Obtain competitive quotes when feasible; not required.

PURCHASES OVER \$1,000.....Must obtain minimum of three competitive quotes which must be documented on official LCC quote forms (available from Purchasing). These forms must be attached to your purchase order before it can be processed.

PURCHASES OVER \$10,000.....Formal advertised, sealed bid is required.

NOTE: Each contract must be for a single project, not a component of, and not related to any other project. Don't break up orders to circumvent the law's intent.

MISSION QUESTIONED - California community colleges were gently chided in a Sept. 10 article in the Los Angeles Times for not placing more emphasis on transfer programs. Arthur Cohen, a UCLA education professor who also heads the Center for the Study of Community Colleges, was quoted as saying: "Community college leaders have successfully blurred the image of their institution in the public's eyes so that serious students avoid them. They've tried to be all things to all people." Cohen says the colleges have been beset by unprepared students, but they also have failed to create "structured programs" and a "demanding atmosphere" that can help students learn, and ultimately allow them to compete and succeed in senior-level college classes. Few colleges test their students upon entrance, Cohen says, to "see if they can read the textbooks," few counsel students to make sure they are taking the needed courses for transfer, and few courses require the writing and library research that is a common feature of most university instruction.

ARE YOU POLITICAL? - If you're politically active, the following information will be a useful guide for on-campus activity. According to college policy, materials supporting or opposing ballot measures, candidates, etc., may be distributed on campus if: they bear the name and address of the person(s), or organization(s) publishing the material; and they have been authorized by the director of Student Activities and Auxiliary Services. Materials supporting or opposing ballot measures, candidates, etc., may be posted only on designated bulletin boards as identified by the Office of Student Activities and Auxiliary Services. College furniture, walls, doors, etc., including offices assigned to individuals, are not to be used to display such materials. Now, according to state law, no public employee shall solicit money, influence, or otherwise promote or oppose a candidate or ballot measure while on the job during working hours. But state law says public employees shall have the right to express personal political views. According to the Oregon Attorney General's office, state law is intended to prevent spending of public money for political purposes. The question arises: Can we wear political buttons? The Attorney General's office says "Yes, in most cases." In a letter to another community college, the Attorney General's office said the wearing of a button "is merely the expression of personal political views, expressly permitted by the statute. It does not cost the taxpayers money or detract from the employee's ability to perform his or her assigned duties in any way."

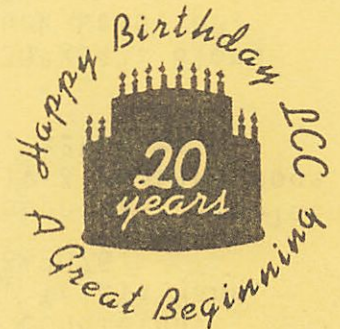

MEASURE 2 DEBATES - At noon today, the KLCC news department sponsors a debate on Measure 2 - the state ballot measure that would limit property taxes to $1\frac{1}{2}$ percent of their 1981 assessed value. The debate, featuring state Rep. Mary McCauley Burrows and realtor Jean Tate on the opposing side and John Barnett of Corvallis on the proposing side, takes place in the Board Room. Attend the debate or tune to 89FM. If you miss the debate, there's another on Measure 2 tonight. It begins at 7 at Kennedy Middle School, 2200 Bailey Hill Road, Eugene.

MEASURE 2 AND LCC - LCC would lose about \$6 million - and about 20 percent of its staffing - if voters approve Measure 2 on Nov. 6, according to Vice President Bill Berry. The \$6-million figure includes an estimate of the college's potential unemployment liability which would result from terminating about 140 staff positions. Berry says college officials haven't identified where cuts would be made if Measure 2 passes. The college may consider: limiting enrollment; consolidating operations, using fewer buildings and reducing use of utilities and maintenance; increasing the teacher-student ratio; offering some classes every other year instead of annually; and raising fees and tuition. If the measure passes, the major portion of the initiative would go into effect July 1, 1985.

BOARD COMES OUT AGAINST MEASURE 2 - Wednesday night, the LCC Board of Education passed a resolution opposing state Ballot Measure 2, the property tax limitation measure that will appear on the Nov. 6 ballot. According to an impact report from college administrators, if Measure 2 passes, LCC will lose about \$6 million - and be forced to cut staff by about 20 percent and student enrollment by about 12 percent. The board gave several reasons for opposing the measure, including the loss of local control over funding local services. In other business, the board discussed its search for a successor to President Schafer, who will retire this summer. The board voted to negotiate a contract with the Association of Community College Trustees to coordinate a national search. Larry Warford is the local contact for the search.

The board also accepted a revised 1984-85 budget that reflects the loss of funds LCC would have received with passage of a levy last month.

The board also viewed "20 Years: A Great Beginning..." the college's 20th anniversary slide show. Special guests included Eugene businessman Maurie Jacobs, former assistant to the president Bert Dotson, a representative from Harrisburg Union High School, and former board member John L. Barber, Jr., and his wife Derelle Barber. Members of the Business Department's advisory committees also attended part of the meeting for a look at the slide show.

SOME PERSONNEL DECISIONS - The board Wednesday night appointed the following to staff positions: Mary Lou Lynch, instructor, Nursing; Vicki Reed, instructor, Study Skills; Nels F. Noble, instructor, Aviation Maintenance; Charles W. Pendleton, instructor, Mechanics; Paul V. Maher, instructor, Aviation Maintenance; Dean Bergen, instructor, Mechanics; Donald F. Savoie, instructor, Home Economics; Kelly K. McGean, instructor/coordinator, Business Assistance Center; and Sheila Christensen, administrative secretary, Division of Applied Technology.
