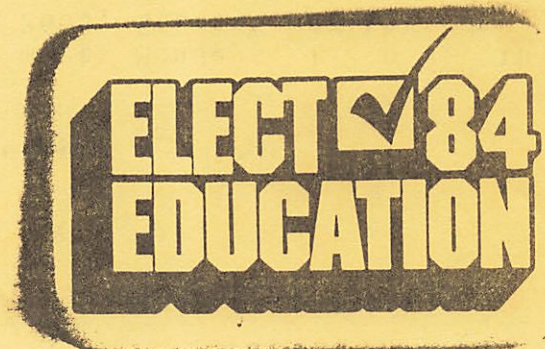

Speakers will be Phillip Alberts, M.D., and Suzanne Alberts, R.N. The two are affiliated with a Portland treatment center for premenstrual syndrome (PMS). According to the Alberts, PMS affects a large percentage of women of varied backgrounds, ages and races. Symptoms include irritability, bloating, and discomfort.

ELECTION RESULTS - Both Measure 2--the property tax limitation initiative--and LCC's proposed tax base apparently failed at the polls Tuesday. Results in both races were close. With 2,404 of 2,480 precincts reporting statewide, Measure 2 garnered 557,223 yes votes, and 576,046 no votes. LCC: The LCC tax base lost by approximately less than half a percent. Of those persons voting on the proposal, 56,931 (49.79 percent) voted yes; 57,389 (50.21 percent) voted no. A total of 114,320 votes were cast as yes and no votes on the measure. In Lane County, 56,441 voters said yes (43.98 percent); 56,372 said no (43.93 percent). In Lane County, the undervote was 11.99 percent. That means almost 12 percent of the voters didn't vote on the tax base proposal. A small percentage of Lane County voters "overvoted," or marked both yes and no. The LCC District also includes the Monroe Elementary School District in Benton County, Harrisburg Union High School in Linn County, and a small area south of Cottage Grove and Florence in Douglas County. How did voters in those pockets vote on the measure? Well in Lane County, LCC's tax base apparently carried by 69 votes. In Benton County, 169 voted yes; 340 voted no. In Linn County, 319 voted yes; 665 voted no. And, in Douglas County, 2 voted yes; 12 voted no. These results on Measure 2 and the LCC tax base proposal are unofficial, according to county clerks who have up to 20 days to tally official counts.

THE PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH

The search for someone to succeed President Schafer when he retires in July 1985 is underway. At its Wednesday night work session, the LCC Board of Education agreed to hire the Association of Community College Trustees to conduct the search process. Professional consultants in the search are: Dr. Marie Y. Martin, a former community college president and former director of the community college unit in the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and James B. Tatum, a trustee for Crowder Community College in Anderson, Mo. Martin and Tatum will initially screen applications, paring the number to about 20 for the search advisory committee to examine.

SEARCH ADVISORY COMMITTEE: A search advisory committee is being established to aid the LCC board and the ACCT consultants. On the committee will be two faculty members, two classified staff members, two management employees and two students. Also joining the committee will be one representative each from the University of Oregon, a local school district, the Eugene Chamber of Commerce, the Springfield Chamber of Commerce and the organized-labor community.**

WEDNESDAY WILL BE BUSY DAY: On Wednesday, Nov. 14, members of the search advisory committee will meet with the ACCT consultants. They will discuss what qualifications, competencies and personal characteristics they would like to see in the next LCC president. They also will receive a briefing on the search process. Later that day, an **OPEN MEETING** will be held in which staff and students can ask questions of President Schafer, the professional consultants and Larry Warford, LCC coordinator for the search. That meeting is scheduled from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. in the Board Room. Then, from 4 to 6 p.m., the LCC board will meet in a work session with the consultants.

THE TENTATIVE TIMELINE: Applications will be accepted from LCC presidential candidates after Dec. 1. Consultants will begin screening as batches of applications arrive. Deadline for applications will be March 1, 1985. From March 1 to 15, the search advisory committee and ACCT consultants will examine the 20-or-so applications yielded from the initial screening. The search advisory committee members are expected to submit the names of not fewer than five finalists to the LCC board by March 15. The board is tentatively scheduled to select a president by May 1. The new president will begin duties in July.

You also can get answers to your questions by attending the Nov. 14 meeting open to staff and students. Larry Warford, executive assistant to the president, is LCC coordinator for the search. 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BOARD REPORT - The major topic of discussion at the Wednesday night meeting of the LCC Board of Education was the college's search for a new president. The board approved a budget of \$20,000 for the national search and earmarked \$9,000 of that for a team of consultants to assist the college's search advisory committee and board members. The board hopes to name a new president by May 1, 1985. President Schafer will retire in July 1985. The board also considered a plan to name parts of buildings and other areas of campus for donors. The college isn't asking donors to pay to build new buildings, but pay to help maintain existing buildings. The board will vote on the building proposal at a later meeting.

The college will be open on Thursday, Dec. 27; Friday, Dec. 28; and Monday, Dec. 31.

ABOUT NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET - Preparation of the 1985-86 fiscal year budget has begun. Vice President Bill Berry says he sees revenues for next year as about the same as this year. Because it usually takes about \$1.5 million annually for salary and benefit changes, the college is reexamining the budget process. One possibility being discussed is a reallocation process which would start each department with about 80 or 90 percent of this year's budget, with the remaining funds reserved for future distribution. Another option is a property tax election. However, because of a change in the law, the college gets only one try for a 1985-86 fiscal-year levy. And LCC hasn't won an election since 1980. Of course, what the Oregon Legislature does in its January-June 1985 session and the outcome of Governor Atiyeh's sales tax proposal likely will have major effects on LCC's budget picture, too.

FORECAST - What's ahead for business and the economy? Several experts will offer their expectations for 1985, in a forecast sponsored by the LCC Business Assistance Center on Wednesday, Dec. 5. The annual forecast examines local, state, regional and national trends in business and the economy. Register today. Call ext. 7530 for information.

SPORTS - In soccer, the Titans travel to Auburn, Wash., today for the consolation match in the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges tournament. LCC's players, southern division champions, face Green River C.C., northern division champions. In basketball, Titan women will travel to Washington tonight to play against Tacoma C.C. They return home to host Southwestern Oregon C.C. at 6 p.m. Saturday. The men's team plays against Ft. Steilacoom C.C.--here at 8 tonight. Saturday features another home game, against Centralia C.C., at 8 p.m.

DEBATE - Next Wednesday, Peter Murphy, Jr., and Charles O. Porter will debate U.S. policy in Central America. The Associated Students of LCC sponsor the debate, which is scheduled from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the Board Room.

BACK TO THE ELECTION - In our Nov. 6 tax base election, LCC won only 42 of 180 precincts. The college carried Lane County, barely, and lost in the district areas of Benton, Douglas and Linn counties. The yes votes came from south Eugene, where the turnout was 65 to 70 percent in some precincts. According to a report by Larry Romine, Public Relations/Development, the outlying areas gave the college about one vote in three while turning out 85 to 88 percent in many precincts. Low-support areas were Dunes City, Coast Fork, Mapleton and Oakridge (precinct 2), all of which registered yes percentages in the 20's. Outside of south Eugene, the college received 51 percent approvals in River Road 1, and Springfield 102 and 208.

PERHAPS OF INTEREST - The Nov. 28 issue of the Chronicle of Higher Education includes the text of "To Reclaim a Legacy," the National Endowment of the Humanities report on humanities instruction in colleges and universities. William J. Bennett wrote the report, basing it on the findings of the endowment's Study Group on the State of Learning in the Humanities in Higher Education. Robert Berdahl, dean of arts and sciences at the University of Oregon, was a member of that study group.
