GRANT FOR INTERNATIONAL TRADE - The statewide Small Business Development Center Network, which has its headquarters at the LCC Downtown Center, has received an additional \$124,700 grant from the Small Business Administration to expand the network of small business centers around the state. Some \$14,000 of this money will go to the Willamette Valley World Trade Association, operated by the Eugene Area Chamber of Commerce, to expand its efforts to counsel small businesses interested in international trade.

NEW BUSINESS PROGRAM - LCC's three-year small business management program has been such a success that the Business Assistance Center is introducing a one-year version, called Being in Business, which offers workshops on many of the same basic business topics. Topics include selecting a business, going into business, business strategies, financing, recordkeeping, and increasing business effectiveness.

BOARD MEETING - The LCC Board of Education met Wednesday night. The board allocated \$9,950 from uncommitted plant funds as an advance for remodeling the old JAFCO building at 1149 Willamette St., future home of the Work Activity Center. The plant funds will be repaid with grant money. The board also voted to create a program of naming areas of campus or parts of buildings for people who contribute money to maintain the buildings.

The board also appointed David Koranda, a media buyer for his own Eugene firm, to the KLCC Advisory Commission. In other KLCC news, the board approved the station's application to the Oregon Arts Commission for a \$2,140 grant to upgrade recording and broadcasting equipment. At the suggestion of Larry Murray, dean of community education, the board okayed a policy that will allow full-time adult education students, enrolled in 15 or more contact hours per week, to enroll tuition-free, on a space-available basis, in one credit class per term.

The LCC board also agreed to hire two new staff members: Ron A. Gustafson, chief flight instructor, Flight Technology; and Joan D. English, compensation and benefits analyst, Personnel Services. Welcome to both.

In other business, the board heard a report that approximately 700 area high school students per year, or 25 percent of the area's graduating high school students, attend LCC. The board also learned that a large number of LCC students transfer here from other schools. This fall, LCC had nearly 1,300 of these reverse transfers.
