

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# REPORTS FROM THE TECHNOLOGY PLANNING SESSIONS

During the fall of 1984, Jim Ellison, chair of the Technology Steering Committee, invited the total LCC staff (faculty, classified, and management) to join in the development of a plan for integrating technology into campuswide college activities. With the goal of preparing a Technology Master Plan, four groups met in two sessions. The issues and concerns determined by the staff groups are described in today's Daily and in subsequent Daily articles. Areas of major interest are in priority order for review by the wider college staff.

On September 7 and 10, Technology Master Planning Group #1 met to deliberate the direction of the integration of technology on campus. The group was facilitated by Rick Burkhart (ABE/LEAP) and Dolores May (Counseling). The participants were Ann Barrett, Ralph Cook, Jane Friesen, Helen Hunter, Pat John, Joyce Kofford, Cynde Leathers, Fred Loveys, Donna Morgan, Virginia Piper and Judy Ward.

The desired situations for the use of technology on campus identified by Group #1 are ranked below:

- Immediate access to available budget, registration, and inventory information.
- 2. Two-way interactive classrooms.
- 3. Use of technology to offer learning style alternatives, i.e., simulated learning, independent study, individualized learning, and group situations.
- 4. Establishment of a technology resource network.
- 5. Optimum telephone answering response for incoming phone calls.
- 6. Participation of all instructional departments in offering telecourses/alternative delivery courses.

NEXT: Tomorrow, the summary of the technology planning sessions provided by the second staff group will be made available for review by the wider college staff. After input from the four planning sessions is provided through The DAILY, Jim Ellison will describe how staff contributions will serve to guide the integration of technology at the college. The final article will review the overall priorities from all staff planning groups, and a brief description of the process for using this information will be included.

# REPORTS FROM THE TECHNOLOGY PLANNING SESSIONS

The first summary in this series of technology planning sessions appeared in the DAILY yesterday. Group #1 wants a college with immediate access to budget, registration, inventory and other information; interactive classrooms; improved learning style alternatives; a technology resource network; improved telephone response system for incoming calls; and telecourses available in all instructional departments.

The second planning group that worked on the Technology Master Plan was facilitated by Greg Harpole (Business) and Ann Marie Prengaman (Language Arts). The participants included I.R. Carlisle, Dwight Miller, Bob Farrand, Jr., and Sharon Rexford. This group identified the following objectives for further attention:

- 1. Purchase of appropriate technology for diverse needs (super micros) that may mean more "bang" for the buck for instruction and administrative purposes. (Save dollars-be efficient-be precise)
- 2. Full-time experienced programmers for instructional software.
- 3. Flexibility to tailor the hardware/software to the needs of each individual instructor.
- 4. Money and release time for faculty to develop and implement the instructional system.
- 5. Budgeting scheme whereby "saving" for purchases can be accomplished; earmark funds for long-term big budget items.
- No technological orphans—outreach centers must be tied technologically with main campus and vice versa.

NEXT: The third segment of this five-part series appearing tomorrow will describe the areas of interest and concerns about the development of technology on campus determined by the third planning group.

### REPORTS FROM THE TECHNOLOGY PLANNING SESSIONS

The previous summaries in this series of staff contributions to the Technology Master Plan revealed that staff want immediate access to information; more alternative learning/teaching styles; resource networks; a better telephone response system; wider use of telecourses; appropriate technology for diverse needs; instructional programmers; hardware/software flexibility for various instructional styles; release time for faculty to develop and implement the instructional system; improved budgeting methods to save for long-term expensive items; and inclusion of outreach centers in technological systems on main campus.

The third group of staff that met to work on development of the Technology Master Plan was facilitated by Jim Brock (Electronic Services) and Jim Dunne (Speech/Mass Communication). The participants in this group included Larry Brown, Tom Birkenhead, Marie Wiles, Don Ownbey, Velma Jesser, Cindy Zorich, Dan Hodges, and Carol Clarke.

The top five priority items to be considered in preparation of the Technology Master Plan from this group include the following:

- 1. A system is desired that would be sophisticated enough so all college units could be networked and interactive; this could be a large mainframe  $\underline{OR}$  a medium-sized mainframe each tied to peripheral (other) functions. This could mean many minis or micros that could talk to the mainframe. This would allow unit autonomy without dependence on the Data Processing Department.
- 2. The college should develop a budget process that would promote the securing of current technology more rapidly than the current process. It would provide for an ongoing maintenance program and regular funding for a systematic replacement program.
- 3. Inservice workshops should be developed to explain potential uses of the technology available to instructors. They need to know how to get started and need training on a continuing basis.
- 4. Course content of computer courses and curricula need to be evaluated, so there will be more coordination of instructional goals. Cooperation among faculty to enhance the quality of instruction.
- 5. Representatives of LCC need to investigate hardware/
  software presently in use across the country in other institutions.
  This should be a continuing process.

# REPORTS FROM THE TECHNOLOGY PLANNING SESSIONS

This final report from the staff planning groups provides further input for the development of a Technology Master Plan for the college. In addition to the numerous suggestions and areas of concern expressed by the other planning groups, this group addresses the issue of staff needed to maintain equipment, security of equipment and data, a software circulation library and standardized hardware and software.

The fourth group that worked on the Technology Master Plan was facilitated by Janet Anderson (Health and Physical Education/Athletics) and Linda Sue McDonald (Financial Services). The participants in this group included: Christi Atkinson, Roger Cardinal, Cheryl Coleman, Carmel Decroos, Sue A. Jordan, Barbara Mathewson, Duane O. Mick, Craig T. Leavy, Al Owens, Mari Reed, Verne W. Whittaker II and Kathleen Wiederholt.

This group ranked in priority order the following desired situations for development of a master plan:

- 1. A wiring system throughout campus for voice, video, data, and microwave to outlying centers.
- 2. Sufficient technical staff to maintain equipment.
- 3. A master plan for technology.
- 4. Good security of equipment and data.
- 5. A library of software for faculty and students to check out for home use.
- Interlinked data bases available to staff/student/community (business, industry, and citizens).
- 7. Standardized hardware and software.
- 8. All phone systems/data/etc. integrated in one system.

NEXT: Tomorrow, a summary of the needs and desired situations determined by college staff in a series of technology sessions will be presented. The summary will compile information given high priority by four groups of faculty, classified, and management staff. A description of how the contributions of the staff will be used to develop the Technology Master Plan for incorporation in the College Plan will be included.

BOARD MEETING - On Wednesday night, the LCC Board of Education voted to join other local school districts in suing Lane County for interest the county earned on tax money it collected for the college. As a group, 18 taxing districts are seeking \$2.1 million in interest dating back four years to 1980-81. According to LCC's attorney, the board action does not rule out the possibility of a compromise settlement with the county. In the Wednesday meeting the board also learned that more new students enrolled at LCC winter term than had been expected. College enrollment is down this year, but not as much as fall term enrollment might have indicated.

The LCC board also accepted a bid from Stone Piano Company of Salem to purchase a Steinway grand piano costing \$18,875. The board voted to accept a \$294,944 proposal from the Honeywell Corporation for a mainframe computer. The board also appointed Tom Thompson, district manager of Pacific Power and Light in Cottage Grove, to the LCC Budget Committee. Thompson was recommended by board member William Manley.

In personnel matters, the board approved several appointments: Russell Hendricks, forestry instructor in Science; Mary Lou Lynch, nursing instructor in Health Occupations; Patricia Hawkins, administrative assistant in Personnel Services; and Ted Kotsakis, department head for Mechanics.

The president and vice presidents Bill Berry, Jack Carter and Gerald Rasmussen will provide staff with the most current information on budgets, enrollments and staffing. A question-and-answer period is planned. The one-hour meeting will begin at 3:30 p.m. in the Performing Arts theater.

### REPORTS FROM THE TECHNOLOGY PLANNING SESSIONS

The Technology Steering Committee has presented a summary of staff contributions to a master plan for the integration of technology at LCC. The committee gratefuly acknowledges the talent and time of the staff who participated and will review the ideas when developing the plan. The planning efforts elicited information about the current and proposed status of technology that can guide the thinking of the committee. Participants are commended for voluntarily sharing in this decision—making aspect of technological planning. Major areas identified by the staff for consideration appear below. Since the planning groups prioritized their concerns independently, certain concepts appear in several areas.

PRIORITY 1. Immediate access to budget, registration, and inventory information; purchase of appropriate technology for instructional and administrative purposes; a system that is networked and interactive among all college units that is independent of the Data Processing Department; and a campuswide wiring system for voice, video, data, and microwave to outlying centers.

PRIORITY 2. Two-way interactive classrooms; full-time experienced instructional programmers; budget process designed to obtain technology rapidly and provide for maintenance and systematic replacement; and sufficient technical staff to maintain equipment.

PRIORITY 3. Use of technology to offer several learning style alternatives; flexibility to tailor hardware/software to needs of individual instructors; inservice workshops to help instructors get started and continue to use available technology; develop a master plan for technology.

PRIORITY 4. Establish a technology resource network; provide money and release time for faculty to develop and implement the instructional system; coordinate computer course content and curricula; and maintain good security of equipment and data.

PRIORITY 5. Optimize telephone answering system; improve budgeting process to save for long-term expensive items; investigate hardware/software presently used at other institutions on a continuing basis; and maintain a circulation library of software for faculty and student use.

PRIORITY 6. Participation by all instructional departments in offering telecourses/alternative delivery courses; inclusion of outreach centers with main campus technological systems; and interlinked data bases available to staff/student/community (business, industry, and citizens).

USING STAFF INPUT: The individuals who chose to participate in the technology planning sessions gave thoughtful attention to this topic. The Technology Steering Committee will carefully consider the staff priorities and will use them to recommend goals for the College Plan. The committee's recommendations will undergo staff and administrative review before being included in the College Plan.

ENROLLMENT - According to an analysis of registration through the second week of this term, LCC's enrollment is down about 11 percent--the equivalent of 213 full-time students--from winter term 1984. Registration was down to varying degrees in many departments. It rose only in Art and Applied Design, Health Occupations, Flight Technology, the Library, and the Central Area Education Center in Cottage Grove. Although head-count and full-time registrations are down from last winter, FTE is up for part-time and evening registrations. As explained in Wednesday afternoon's all-staff meeting, enrollment can have an impact on the college budget and staffing.

According to Gerald Rasmussen, vice president for Instruction, part-time faculty have been cut back because of the enrollment decline. 
