Tonight's program will feature the symphonic band, directed by Edward McManus, and the chorus, directed by Wayte Kirchner. The band will play Gordon Jacob's "Music for a Festival" and a band arrangement of Carl Orff's secular cantata, "Carmina Burana" ("Songs from Beuron"). First performed in 1937, "Carmina" is a setting of medieval drinking poems found in a Beuron monastery. The chorus will sing two Glorias: one in Gregorian chant edited by the Benedictine monks of Solesmes Abbey and another--a contemporary composition by John Rutter--accompanied by brass, percussion and synthesizer.

Wednesday's free concert will feature the percussion ensemble, directed by Nathan Cammack; a women's chorus, "Harmony," directed by Dan Sachs; and jazz-rock fusion ensembles, directed by James Greenwood.

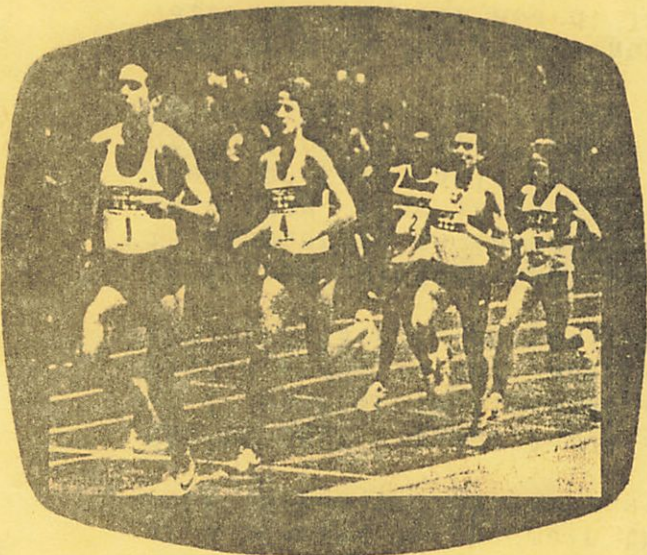

ANNOUNCING LEAGUE FOR INNOVATION INNOVATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

The League for Innovation in the Community College has created an award that is designed to recognize League College staff members who have designed and implemented a significant innovation during this past year. The recognition is known as the Innovator of the Year Award and is given annually to one individual from each of the 17 League member college districts. Any current Lane Community College employee, part-time or full-time, may be considered for the award.

The recipient of the Innovator of the Year Award will receive a plaque from the League for Innovation to be presented at an appropriate LCC function. The award winner will also be featured in the League publication, JOTTINGS.

Last year's award went to Business Instructor Velma Jesser. She developed a new Integrated Office Systems vocational program for the college. The 1983 award went to Spanish instructor Arden Woods.

The deadline for nominations is March 22.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

WHO MAY NOMINATE?

Nominations may come from anyone either inside or outside the college.

WHAT ARE THE SELECTION CRITERIA?

The award will be given to an individual who has designed and implemented a significant innovation at LCC. The League has established the following criteria for making the selection from among nominees. PLEASE NOTE THAT ONE OR MORE OF THE CRITERIA SHOULD BE MET, BUT IT IS NOT NECESSARY THAT ANY NOMINEE SHOULD MEET ALL CRITERIA.

1. Quality - Students and/or staff agree that the innovation increases quality in the course program, office, or institution. Evidence of quality may include student ratings or letters of support from colleagues.

INNOVATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

2. Efficiency - There is evidence that the innovation or outstanding program contributes to a more efficient way of doing things. Student ratings, perceptions of outside consultants, and pre- and post-comparison of time involved are examples of evidence.
3. Cost effectiveness - There is evidence that the innovation adds a value to the institution while at the same time containing or reducing costs. Cost data will serve as evidence.
4. Replication - The program selected can be used by other institutions with a minimum of difficulty. The description of the program should include any conditions necessary for replication.
5. Creativity - The selected program should be as original as possible or the adaptation should at least be creative. The description of the program or letters from experts are examples of evidence.
6. Timeliness - The award-winning program should not be more than five years old at that institution, but it must have been around long enough to have been tested so that it meets most of the criteria.

HOW WILL THE WINNER BE SELECTED?

LCC's Innovator of the Year Award Selection Committee will review the nomination and supporting materials and select one award winner by April 8. The committee will invite and encourage high-quality nominations, and in the event no nominations are deemed to be of a caliber worthy of nationwide recognition, no award will be made.

The selection committee consists of three LCC employees representing management, faculty and classified personnel, and two members from the community. Larry Warford, League representative, chairs the committee.

HOW ARE NOMINATIONS MADE?

Nominations should consist of the name and department of the innovator and a one-page description of the project, process, item, or activity supported by relevant materials. If materials are visual, or in some other form, it may be necessary for the nominee to make arrangements for the Award Selection Committee to have access for viewing purposes.

Nominations should be directed to League representative Larry Warford (President's Office, Administration Building).

WHAT CAN YOU DO ABOUT CAREER MOBILITY?

We all know that a healthy working environment is one in which the employee is encouraged to take advantage of all available opportunities for professional growth. The college supports your growth as an individual and as an employee and offers you some suggestions for planning your own career growth.

WHERE ARE YOU NOW? Start by identifying the most satisfying and dissatisfying things about your job. You might consider such things as salary, working conditions, work content, chance for recognition, work relationships. Determine whether there's a growth potential for you in your present job, then decide if it's time to begin planning your next career step.

WHAT DO YOU WANT TO DO NEXT? There are lots of resources on campus to help you research the availability of other kinds of jobs. Check with Personnel about on-campus possibilities, visit with the folks in the Career Information Center, consult experts (e.g., supervisors, instructors, etc.) in your chosen field, use the library's resources. Identify the type of job you think you'd like the most, then study the growth potential of that position. Will it lead to additional career growth?

HOW ABOUT YOUR QUALIFICATIONS? What education and work experience have you had? How about special skills, knowledge and/or training? Have you done volunteer work, worked on special projects, served on college or community committees? Compare your qualifications to what's needed to get the job you want. If you don't presently have all the qualifications necessary, talk with college career counselors, employees in your chosen line of work, or experts in the field to give you the information you need to plan the your next step.

DEVELOP A PLAN TO GET THE EXTRA TRAINING AND/OR EXPERIENCE YOU MAY NEED. Use your tuition waiver benefit to take LCC courses that will help you on your way. Look for on- and off-campus workshops that will provide you with the training you need. Contact the Staff Development Resource Center (ext. 2577) for information about current workshops/seminars. Volunteer for college committees and community service activities where you may have an opportunity to meet people involved in your chosen line of work.

BEGIN THE JOB SEARCH PROCESS. Consider taking "The Complete Job Finder," a class offered every term through the Counseling department (under "Human Development" in the class schedule). You need a strong resume and you may need some brushing up on your interviewing skills. This class will help you, or you may simply consult the Job Skills Lab or Personnel Services for advice. If your job choice is a position at LCC, keep in touch with Personnel, call the Job Line number, watch for new postings on the job board. If you find an LCC job for which you qualify, apply for it. Present employees automatically are granted an interview for any college position for which they are qualified. Check periodically with the State Department of Employment for information about the availability of off-campus positions in your chosen field.

REMEMBER--IF YOU'RE INTERESTED IN MAKING A CHANGE, notify all your contacts on campus and in the community. Don't keep it a secret. The more contacts you make, the better chance you'll have to find the position you want.

ELECTION NEXT TUESDAY - In the March 26 election, LCC is proposing a three-year serial levy to raise additional funds for operating expenses and repair of aging campus buildings. The proposed levy, which would raise about \$444,000 a year over the next three years, would provide funds for several other LCC projects. These include: upgrading vocational equipment, expanding college links with business and industry, developing a more comprehensive and coordinated system for providing students information and services, and extending the outreach of television courses with the installation of a new transmitter in southern Lane County. The proposed levy would cost the owner of a \$60,000 home an estimated \$4.20 a year--or \$12.60 over the next three years. The levy would begin July 1985 and end June 30, 1988.

Also on the ballot: Incumbent Charlene Curry is running unopposed for the Zone 3 position on the LCC Board of Education. The seat represents the Springfield and Marcola school districts. The name of LCC student Meredith Meyers also will appear on the ballot. Meyers, vice president for the Associated Students of LCC, says she has left the race after reconsidering her priorities for the future. She withdrew too late to remove her name from the ballot. Curry is a Springfield resident who has served on the LCC board since 1978. She also was on the board during the 1973-74 year. LCC's board members serve four-year, unpaid terms. Members must live in the zone they represent, but are chosen in a districtwide vote.
