PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH - The search for a new LCC president shifts into high gear this week. The field of 122 applicants has been narrowed to 15 semifinalists. On Wednesday, the 13-member search advisory committee (staff, students and community members) will join search consultants from the Association of Community College Trustees, Marie Y. Martin and James B. Tatum, to narrow the field to five finalists. At 4 p.m. on Wednesday, the consultants will meet with the LCC Board of Education in executive session to present the names of those finalists. The board is scheduled to interview finalists April 11, 12 and 13. May 1 still is the target date for naming a new president. President Eldon G. Schafer plans to retire this summer.

INSTALLATION WILL FEATURE KINETIC SCULPTURE - Lights, sound and movement characterize the works of Ken Butler, a Portland artist who will be showing his kinetic sculptures at LCC today through April 19. Butler creates installations and hybrid musical instruments. The LCC show will include a piece, "Key Light," that measures 5 feet by 35 feet by 12 feet, and is partially viewer activated. The show is in the Art & Applied Design Department gallery, located on the first floor of the Math/Art Building. Gallery hours are 8 a.m. to 10 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday. Butler will give a slide lecture and play his hybrid musical instruments next Monday, at 1 p.m. in the gallery. A public reception will follow.

MORE ART - From Tuesday through April 19, Kathy Hoy will display her Chinese brush paintings in the Learning Resource Center (library) gallery. Hoy, who studied this special painting media in Taiwan, obtained a Master's of Fine Arts degree from the University of Oregon and has taught at LCC and the Maude Kerns Arts Center. An artist's reception is planned Wednesday, 1:30 to 3 p.m., in library room 316. The gallery is located on the mezzanine level of the library and is open from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday.

GETTING DOWN TO BUSINESS - The LCC Business Assistance Center is presenting a television series, "Getting Down to Business," designed to help individuals select and run a small business successfully. The 10-part series will begin this Wednesday evening. Each half-hour program will be broadcast from 6 to 6:30 on Group W Cable channel 20 each Wednesday through June 5. EDUCATIONAL SOFTWARE EVALUATION CLASS AND TELECONFERENCE

The Center for Advanced Technology in Education (CATE) is pleased to announce a 2-credit graduate course in software evaluation. The course, taught by Sam Miller--Lane ESD Curriculum Specialist-- and Mike Caley--Teacher, Eugene District 4J--will be held in conjunction with a nationwide teleconference on educational software.

Designed for K-12 classroom teachers, media specialists and librarians, the course focuses on: 1) hands-on experiences with a variety of educational software; 2) becoming familiar with various criteria for evaluating software; 3) locating reviews and resources for selecting; and 4) reading about issues pertinent to software selection.

The first three course sessions will be taught in room 129 at CATE, 1787 Agate Street, Eugene, Oregon, (previously Condon School). The final class session will involve a national video teleconference at Lane Community College on "Educational Microcomputer Software: Identification, Evaluation, and Integration."

The teleconference will combine presentations by a panel of experts drawn from across the United States, demonstrations, videotapes of model classroom situations which illustrate the effective use and integration of microcomputer software, and two extended question-and-answer periods, during which questions from sites throughout the United States can be phoned in to the studio and asked live on the air.

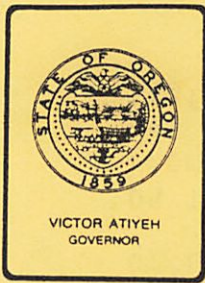

PRESIDENTIAL FINALISTS VISIT - Finalists in the LCC presidential search begin visiting campus today. Richard Turner is here today. James Heinselman begins his rounds today and winds up his interview Friday. Gerard Moseley and Allan Kurki also will be here Friday. Jared Sharon will visit Friday and Saturday. All five will participate in such activities as visits with students and staff representatives, a campus tour, and board interview. May 1 remains the target date for the LCC Board of Education to name a new president.

BE PREPARED - This Sunday, LCC will have a full-page ad in the Cross-roads issue of The Register-Guard. To make it easy on potential callers, we used a main phone number, Counseling's 726-2204, and the outreach center numbers. But the ad covers a wide range of college programs and services and your area may get calls. Some of these calls might be from people who haven't had any previous contact with the college, so it's especially important to see that callers are referred to the right campus department.

SPEAKING OF THE "CUSTOMER" - According to George Miaoulis, a University of Southern Maine marketing professor writing in Marketing News, nonprofit organizations frequently miss the point when they are developing marketing strategies. Miaoulis describes a museum that spent a great deal of money trying to enhance its image, yet, when he visited the museum, he found "confined exhibit space, long lines, a lack of signs and programs, poor service, and other problems." He says organizations that don't pay attention to their customers "usually discover that any image they create, any research they conduct, and any new programs they develop have little or no value."
