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BOARD TALKS WITH TURNER - The LCC Board of Education is negotiating with Dr. Richard Martin Turner III, 49, to be the college's fourth president. Dr. Turner would assume office July 1 after six years as president of South Central Community College in New Haven, Connecticut. According to board chairman Larry Perry, the board was looking for a candidate with solid community college experience, a commitment to the concept of a comprehensive community college, and experience in dealing with a limited college budget. The board is expected to take office action at its Wednesday night meeting.

PRESIDENT SCHAFER RETIRES - President Eldon G. Schafer has moved his retirement date from July 30 to April 30, and will enter Sacred Heart General Hospital Tuesday to begin the chemotherapy treatment which he expects to arrest his cancer and lengthen his life. President Schafer retired last Tuesday as part of qualifying for the most advantageous PERS benefits. He worked Wednesday through Friday of last week under the 600-hour post-retirement provision of PERS. The LCC board will consider President Schafer's retirement in its Wednesday night meeting and may choose to select an acting president to fill the vacancy until the new president's term begins in July.

COPYRIGHT MATTERS - The Daily will run four messages from Don Ownbey, Learning Resource Center (library), on copyright matters. Here's the first important message:

First, it is illegal for an individual, including instructors, to make (or have made) copies of copyrighted media items such as audiocassettes without copyright clearance. Section 108 of the Copyright Law permits libraries and archives to make one copy of audiocassettes for circulation. The LCC Learning Resource Center keeps one copy of many audiocassettes for circulation purposes. Motion pictures and videocassettes are more strictly regulated even for libraries. Since individuals, including instructors, can legally copy audiocassettes only by permission, persons should not expect Media Productions to duplicate audiocassettes without clearance. Duplicating videocassettes or recording video programs off-the-air must also comply with legal guidelines and Media Productions should not be asked to copy or record audiocassettes or videos illegally.

BOARD REPORT - The LCC Board of Education met briefly before Wednesday night's Budget Committee meeting. Board members decided to place a one-year levy for \$570,000 on the Sept. 17 ballot. According to college estimates, the levy would increase the taxes on a home valued at \$60,000 by \$4.80 for one year.

The college has just completed a thorough review of college expenditures and has reduced some programs and services. If the levy passes, some of these services would be restored. The board Wednesday chose not to consider a motion to reinstate the soccer program which was cut during the budget process.

Following the board meeting, the Budget Committee approved a 1985-86 general fund budget of \$27,839,000. This is approximately 3.7 percent higher than last year's budget, and includes the September tax levy. Without the levy, the college budget would increase by less than 2 percent.

EVALUATIONS DUE - Classified evaluations are due in Personnel Services no later than June 1. Management evaluation conferences should be held before June 1, and management evaluations are due in Personnel by July 1. Faculty performance evaluations are due in Personnel by July 1.

FOOD DISTRIBUTION - In conjunction with F.O.O.D. of Lane County, the Associated Students of LCC on Wednesday distributed 4,080 pounds of cheese and 2,250 pounds of flour to needy members of the community. We served 730 individual households with 1,897 people. Thanks to all the staff for their help and to Schawna Crawford in particular. Schawna coordinated the sign-up sheet volunteers and put in seven straight hours. Thank you! Thank you! This will be the last food distribution this term. As for next year, the federal administration plans to cut this program unless public opinion changes that decision.

Exercises for Reducing Stress in the Office

The following program was developed by Denise Austin, BS, an exercise consultant in Alexandria, Virginia, and is endorsed by the American College of Sports Medicine. Austin says that for best results these exercises should be done in conjunction with a regular aerobic exercise program that includes strength training, flexibility, and sound nutrition.



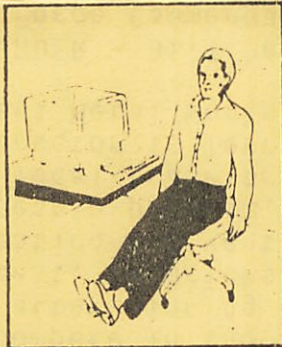
Fingers. With palms down, spread your fingers apart as far as you can. Hold for the count of five. Relax. Repeat.



Knee Kiss. Pull one leg to your chest, grasp with both hands, and hold for a count of five. Repeat with opposite leg.



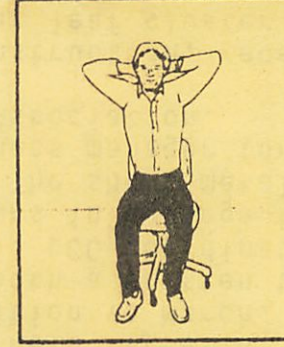
Back Relaxer. Sit on chair. Bend down between your knees as far as you can. Return to upright position, straighten, and relax.



Quadriceps. Bring your legs straight out in front of your body, and then hold them in that position for five seconds. Make sure you are sitting up straight. Relax. Repeat.



Windmill. Sit in a chair. Place your feet apart on the floor. Bend over and touch your right hand to your left foot with your left arm extended up. Alternate sides repeatedly.



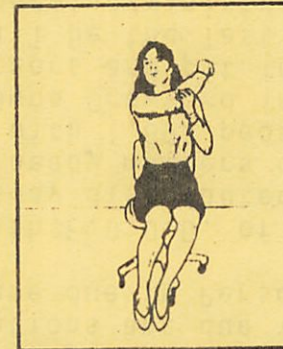
Pectoral Stretch. Grasp your hands behind your neck and press your elbows back as far as you can. Return to starting position, then drop your arms and relax. Repeat.



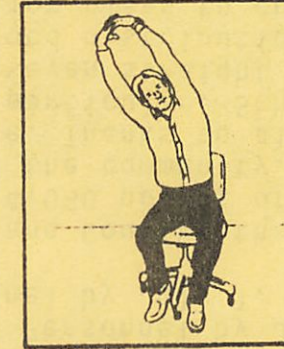
Shoulder Roll. Slowly roll your shoulders forward five times in a circular motion using your full range of motion. Then roll your shoulders backward five times with the same circular motion.



Neck. Let your head drop slowly to the left, then to the right. Slowly drop your chin to your chest, and then raise your chin as high as you can. Turn your head to the left, return it to the normal position, and then turn it to the right.



Middle-Upper Back Stretch. Raise your right arm and grasp it below the elbow with your left hand. Gently pull your right elbow toward your left shoulder as you feel the stretch. Hold for five seconds. Do both sides.



Side Stretch. Interlace your fingers. Lift your arms over your head, keeping your elbows straight. Press your arms backward as far as you can. Then slowly lean to the left and then to the right until you can feel stretching.

ARE YOU A PUTTER-OFFER? Procrastination is the bane of a good many people's existence. The first thing to do is to quit feeling guilty about it. Stop putting yourself down and start taking some action. Try some of these well-known helps to get you on the track:

1. When you're faced with a pile of work, stop and think a minute. What tasks in that pile really need to be accomplished by you and what can you delegate to someone else? Do all those "urgent" items really have to be done right away, or can some of them be delayed until you have more time? Don't allow yourself to feel overwhelmed. Prioritize that pile!
2. Breaking big projects into more manageable small parts really works well. You begin to see that the task is not as awesome as it may first appear; you take heart; and you move ahead.
3. You may be stalling on starting something because you think it's going to take a long time. The next time you start to do that, go ahead with the job, but **time yourself** and find out how long it actually takes. You may be surprised to find that the task really didn't take as long as you'd imagined it would.
4. Fill small spaces with small things. The pile won't get so high if you squeeze those work activities which "only take a minute" (such as making a phone call or scanning that material you "never have time" to read) into those last five minutes before it's time to go on your break or lunch or head for home or while you're waiting for someone to give you further information before you can continue with whatever you're doing.
5. Another good way to use those odd five or ten minute blocks during the day is to start one of those projects you've been putting off. Sometimes, all it takes is a slight shove like that to get you rolling with the motivation and the ideas.

We wish to inform the LCC community of four aspects of copyright matters that have come up recently. Three of these aspects are serious because they involve potential litigation.

First, it is illegal for an individual, including instructors, to make (or have made) copies of copyrighted media items such as audiocassettes without copyright clearance. Section 108 of the Copyright Law permits libraries and archives to make one copy of audiocassettes for circulation. The LCC Learning Resource Center keeps one copy of many audiocassettes for circulation purposes. Motion pictures and videocassettes are more strictly regulated even for libraries. Since individuals, including instructors, can legally copy audiocassettes only by permission, persons should not expect Media Productions to duplicate audiocassettes without clearance. Duplicating videocassettes or recording video programs off-the-air must also comply with legal guidelines and Media Productions should not be asked to copy or record audiocassettes or videos illegally.

Second, the use of illegal copies of audiocassettes or videocassettes invites lawsuits. In civil cases, if an infringement occurs, the law allows actual damages or statutory damages. Each time an infringing act of copying occurs without permission and each time an illegal public performance occurs without permission, a separate monetary claim for damages may be assessed. If a cassette is illegally copied and played (even for educational purposes) for 29 times, there is a total of 30 violations, which could result in fines from \$7,500 to \$300,000. If you think it can't happen, the courts awarded \$78,000 in damages against the Board of Cooperation Education Services (BOCES), Erie County, New York, in 1983 in a suit originally involving millions of dollars. In addition, copyright suits not only involve the infringer but their supervisors, their administrators, and their organization. A suit against an LCC instructor could involve a department chairperson, a dean, a vice president, the president, and the college. There are many copyright exemptions granted educators through fair use and other provisions of the law but educators who are caught in illegal copying practices can, along with their schools, incur heavy penalties.

Third, the computer software industry is beginning efforts to combat software piracy, also called softlifting. The Association of Data Processing Service Organizations (ADAPSO) has started a campaign against softlifting called "Thou Shalt Not Dupe." The next step in such efforts is typically the development of guidelines and then enforcement, usually with heavy monetary fines. Any operation within the college that uses or relies on illegal copies of software needs to make an effort to secure legal software to maintain operations and to erase any illegal copies of software. It may be less expensive in the long run than to operate with softlifted software and run the risk of an expensive lawsuit.

Fourth, the Television Licensing Center (TLC) publishes the TLC Guide which gives information on the recording of off-the-air video. The TLC Guide relates what programs require a license, what programs can be copied free for educational purposes, and how long you can keep recorded copies. Pertinent articles on the whole matter of video copying are included in this periodical which is published monthly during the school year. The Learning Resource Center (Library) receives a subscription as a member of the Television Licensing Center. Faculty may have access to the TLC Guide by contacting Cheryl Coleman in the LRC.
